A PROCLAMATION,

*For Dissolving the present Parliament, and Declaring
the Calling of another.*

VICTORIA, R.

WHEREAS We have thought fit, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, to dissolve this present Parliament, which stands prorogued to Tuesday the twenty-ninth day of this instant June: We do for that end publish this Our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby dissolve the said Parliament accordingly; and the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burghesses, and the Commissioners for shires and burghs, of the House of Commons are discharged from their meeting and attendance on the said Tuesday the twenty-ninth day of this instant June: and We, being desirous and resolved, as soon as may be, to meet Our people, and to have their advice in Parliament, do hereby make known to all Our loving subjects Our Royal will and pleasure to call a new Parliament: and do hereby further declare, that, with the advice of Our Privy Council, We have given order that Our Chancellor of that part of Our United Kingdom called Great Britain, and our Chancellor of Ireland, do, respectively, upon notice thereof, forthwith issue

out writs in due form, and according to law, for calling a new Parliament: and We do hereby also, by this Our Royal Proclamation under Our Great Seal of Our United Kingdom, require writs forthwith to be issued accordingly by Our said Chancellors respectively, for causing the Lords Spiritual and Temporal and Commons, who are to serve in the said Parliament, to be duly returned to, and give their attendance in, Our said Parliament; which writs are to be returnable on Thursday the nineteenth day of August next.

Given at Our Court at Buckingham-Palace, this twenty-third day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-one, and in the fifth year of Our reign.

A PROCLAMATION,

*In order to the Electing and Summoning the Sixteen
Peers of Scotland.*

VICTORIA, R.

WHEREAS We have in Our Council thought fit to declare Our pleasure for summoning and holding a Parliament of Our United Kingdom of

Great Britain and Ireland, on Thursday the nineteenth day of August next ensuing the date hereof; in order, therefore, to the electing and summoning the Sixteen Peers of Scotland, who are to sit in the House of Peers in the said Parliament, We do, by the advice of Our Privy Council, issue forth this Our Royal Proclamation, strictly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to assemble and meet at Holyrood-house, in Edinburgh, on Thursday the fifth day of August next ensuing, between the hours of twelve and two in the afternoon, to nominate and choose the Sixteen Peers, to sit and vote in the House of Peers in the said ensuing Parliament, by open election and plurality of voices of the Peers that shall be then present, and of the proxies of such as shall be absent (such proxies being Peers, and producing a mandate in writing, duly signed before witnesses, and both the constituent and proxy being qualified according to law), and the Lord Clerk Register, or such two of the Principal Clerks of the Session as shall be appointed by him to officiate in his name, are hereby respectively required to attend such meeting, and to administer the oaths required by law to be taken there by the said Peers, and to take their votes; and immediately after such election made and duly examined, to certify the names of the Sixteen Peers so elected, and to sign and attest the same in the presence of the said Peers the electors, and return such certificate into Our High Court of Chancery of Great Britain. And We do, by this Our Royal Proclamation, strictly command and require the Provost of Edinburgh, and all other the Magistrates of the said city, to take especial care to preserve the peace thereof, during the time of the said election, and to prevent all manner of riots, tumults, disorders, and violence whatsoever. And We strictly charge and command that this Our Royal Proclamation be duly published at the Market-Cross at Edinburgh, and in all the county towns of Scotland, twenty-five days, at least, before the time hereby appointed for the meeting of the said Peers to proceed to such election.

Witness Ourselves at Westminster, this twenty-third day of June, one thousand eight hundred and forty-one, and in the fifth year of Our reign.

WHEREAS by an Act, made in the session of Parliament holden in the third and fourth years of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to enable Her Majesty to carry into effect certain stipulations contained in a treaty of commerce and navigation between Her Majesty and the Emperor of Austria, and to empower Her Majesty to declare, by Order in Council, that ports, which are the most natural and convenient shipping ports of states within whose dominions they are not situated, may, in certain cases, be considered, for all purposes of trade with Her Majesty's dominions, as the national ports of such states," it was, amongst other things, enacted, that, from and after the passing of the said Act, it should be lawful, notwithstanding any thing contained in the Act of the third and fourth of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, for Her Majesty, from time to time, to declare by Her Order in Council, to be published in the London Gazette, that all Austrian vessels arriving from the ports of the Danube, as far as Galatz inclusively, should, together with their cargoes, whether such cargoes were the produce of Austria or not, be admitted into the ports of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and of all possessions of Her Majesty, exactly in the same manner as if such vessels came direct from Austrian ports; and that thereupon, and for so long a time as such Order should be declared to be in force or remain unrevoked, it should be lawful to import into the British dominions from such ports of the Danube, in Austrian ships, any goods which, by the laws in force at the time of such importation, might be there imported in Austrian ships from Austrian ports:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased, in pursuance of the power and authority in Her vested by the said Act, to order and declare, and doth hereby order and declare, that all Austrian vessels arriving from the said ports of the Danube, as far as Galatz inclusively, shall, together with their cargoes, whether such cargoes shall be the produce of Austria or not, be admitted into the ports of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and

of all possessions of Her Majesty, exactly in the same manner as if such vessels came direct from Austrian ports :

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the first year of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend an Act for the regulation of municipal corporations in England and Wales," it is, amongst other things, enacted, that if the inhabitant householders of any town or borough in England or Wales shall petition Her Majesty to grant to them a charter of incorporation, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by any such charter, if she shall think fit, by the advice of Her Privy Council, to grant the same, to extend to the inhabitants of any such town or borough, within the district to be set forth in such charter, all the powers and provisions of the Act of the fifth and sixth William Fourth, cap. 76, for regulating corporations, whether such town or borough be or be not a corporate town or borough, or be or be not named in either of the schedules to the said Act; provided, nevertheless, that notice of every such petition, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same may be taken into consideration by Her Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette one month at least before such petition shall be so considered;

And whereas the inhabitant householders of the towns or boroughs of Tynemouth, Sheffield, Huddersfield, and South Shields, have presented certain petitions to Her Majesty in Council, praying charters of incorporation for the said towns or boroughs, Her Majesty is this day pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on Friday the twentieth day of August next :

And Her Majesty is further pleased to order and

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direct, that all petitions and documents, whether in favour of or against the said charters, shall be lodged by the respective parties, at the Council Office, on or before the thirteenth day of August next.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for granting to His Majesty, until the fifth day of July one thousand eight

" hundred and thirty-seven, certain duties on sugar imported into the United Kingdom, for the service of the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-six," it was, among other things, enacted, that, on and from and after the fifth day of July one thousand eight hundred and thirty-six, and until the fifth day of July one thousand eight hundred and thirty-seven, there should be raised, levied, collected, and paid unto His Majesty, His heirs and successors, among other duties of Customs therein mentioned, the duty on sugar, being the growth of any British possession within the limits of the East India Company's charter, into which the importation of foreign sugar might be by that Act prohibited, and imported from thence, of one pound four shillings (£1 4s.) the hundred weight :

And by the same Act it was further enacted, that before any sugar should be entered, as being of the produce of a British possession, at the lower rate of duty fixed by that Act (being the said duty of one pound four shillings the hundred weight), the master of the ship importing the same should deliver to the Collector or Controller of the Customs at the port of importation, a certificate, under the hand and seal of the Collector of Sea Customs of the port where such sugar was taken on board, being a British possession, testifying that there had been produced to him by the shipper of such sugar a certificate, under the hand and seal of the Collector, or Assistant Collector, of the Land or Custom Revenue of the district within which such sugar was produced, that such sugar was of the produce of the district, and that the importation into such district of foreign sugar, or sugar, the growth of any British possession into which foreign sugar could be legally imported, was prohibited; which certificate so granted by the said Collector of Sea Customs should state the name of the district in which such sugars were produced, their quantity and quality, the number and denomination of the packages containing the same, and the name of the ship in which they were laden, and of the master thereof; and that such master should also make a declaration before the Collector or Controller that such certificate was received by him at the place where such sugar was taken on board, and that the sugar so imported was the same as was mentioned therein :

And it was by the said Act further enacted, that it should be lawful for the Governor General of India in Council to appoint any officer or officers

other than the said Collector and Assistant Collector of Land Revenue and the Collector of the Customs, to give such certificates :

And whereas by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the seventh year of the reign of His said late Majesty King William the Fourth, and the first year of the reign of Her Majesty, it was, among other things, enacted, that the duties imposed on sugar by the said hereinbefore recited Act should be further continued until the fifth day of July one thousand eight hundred and thirty-eight :

And whereas by another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the first and second years of the reign of Her Majesty, intituled " An Act for granting to Her Majesty, until the fifth day of July one thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine, certain duties on sugar imported into the United Kingdom, for the service of the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-eight," the said duties on sugar were continued until the fifth day of July one thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine :

And whereas by another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the second and third years of the reign of Her Majesty, intituled " An Act for granting to Her Majesty, until the fifth day of July one thousand eight hundred and forty, certain duties on sugar which should be imported into the United Kingdom, for the service of the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine," the said duties on sugar were further continued until the fifth day of July one thousand eight hundred and forty :

And by the same Act it was enacted, that if, at any time, satisfactory proof shall have been laid before Her Majesty in Council that the importation of foreign sugar into any British possession, within the limits of the East India Company's charter, was prohibited, it should be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, or by Her Majesty's Order in Council, to be published, from time to time, in the London Gazette, to allow the importation of sugar, the growth of any such British possession, at the lower rate of duty in the said first and therein and hereinbefore recited Act :

And whereas by an Ordinance enacted by the Governor of Ceylon, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council of that island, dated the twenty-third day of October one thousand eight hundred and forty, the importation of foreign sugar, and of any sugar which may be the growth of any

British possession into which foreign sugar can be legally imported, except to be warehoused for exportation only, was prohibited :

And whereas it is considered by Her Majesty to be expedient to allow the importation of sugar, the growth of the island of Ceylon, at such lower rate of duty as hereinbefore mentioned, Her Majesty is therefore pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that, from and after the time when the provisions of the above-mentioned Ordinance shall be carried into effect in the island of Ceylon, there shall be paid upon sugar, the produce of, and imported from, that island into the United Kingdom, the same duties as may, at the time, be payable upon sugar the produce of, and imported from, the British possessions in India :

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, and the Right Honourable Lord John Russell, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

THE following is a copy of an Order of Her Majesty in Council, for the assignment of a district to St. Cuthbert's Chapel, at Shadforth, in the parish of Pittington, in the county of Durham, under the 16th section of the 59th Geo. 3, cap. 134:

At the Court at Buckingham-Palace, the 8th day of May 1841, present, the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the 58th year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "that in every case in which the Commissioners appointed for carrying into execution the purposes of the said Act, shall be of opinion that it will be expedient to divide any parish into two or more distinct and separate parishes, for all ecclesiastical purposes whatever, it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners, with the consent of the Bishop of the diocese in which such parish is locally situated, signified under his hand and seal, to apply to the patron or patrons of the church of such parish for his consent to make such division, and for such patron or patrons to signify his or their consent thereto, under his hand and seal; and the said Commissioners shall, upon the consent of the said patron or patrons so signified, represent the whole matter to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which it is proposed, with such consent as aforesaid, to divide such parish, together with the relative and respective proportions of glebe land, tithes, moduses, or other endowments, which will by such division arise and accrue, and remain and be within each of such respective divisions, and also the relative proportions of the estimated amount of the value or produce of fees, oblations, offerings, or other ecclesiastical dues or profits, which may arise and accrue within each of such respective divisions; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division; provided always, that no such division of any parish into distinct parishes shall completely take effect until after the death, resignation, or other avoidance of the existing incumbent of the parish to be divided;" and it is by the 21st section of the said Act further enacted, "that in any case in which the said Commissioners shall be of opinion that it is not expedient to divide any populous parish, or extra parochial place, into such complete, separate, and distinct parishes as aforesaid, but that it is expedient to divide the same into such ecclesiastical districts as they, with the consent of the Bishop, signified under his hand and seal, may

deem necessary, for the purpose of affording accommodation for the attending divine service, according to the rites of the United Church of England and Ireland, to persons residing therein, in the churches and parochial chapels already built, or in additional churches or chapels to be built therein, and as may appear to such Commissioners to be convenient for the enabling the spiritual person or persons who may serve such churches or chapels, to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the districts attached to such respective churches and chapels, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendence of such district, and the preservation and improvement of the religious and moral habits of the persons residing therein, the said Commissioners shall represent such opinion to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which such districts are proposed to be described; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division: and whereas by an Act, passed in the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners, in the same manner and with the like consents as are required in case of division into ecclesiastical districts under the said hereinbefore recited Act, or the said Act now in recital, to assign a particular district to any chapel of ease or parochial chapel already existing, or to any chapel built, or which might thereafter be built, or acquired under the powers of the said former Act, or the said Act now in recital; and such district shall be under the immediate care of the Curate appointed to serve such chapel, but subject, nevertheless, to the superintendence and controul of the incumbent of the parish church; and all such Curates shall be nominated by the incumbent of the parish to the Bishop for his licence, except where the right of nomination shall already be legally vested in any other person or persons, and in every such case by the person or persons possessing such right of nomination, subject to all the laws in force relating to Stipendiary Curates, except as to the assigning of salaries to such Curates; provided always, that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners, with the consent of the Bishop of the diocese, to determine whether any and what part or proportion of the fees or dues for marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials shall be assigned to any such Curate; and whether banns of marriage shall be published, and marriages or baptisms, churchings or burials, shall be solemnized or performed in any such chapel or not; and in any case in which marriages shall be allowed in any such chapel, the Commissioners shall cause the boundaries of the district assigned to such chapel to be enrolled in the High Court of Chancery, and in the office of the Registry of the diocese, any thing in the said recited Act to the contrary notwithstanding; and no such chapelry shall become a benefice by reason of any aug-

mentation of the maintenance of the Curate, by any grant or bounty under the provision of any Act or Acts of Parliament, or law or laws for augmenting small livings, any thing in such Act or Acts of Parliament, or law or laws, to the contrary notwithstanding; and whereas by another Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and by another Act, made and passed in the 1st and 2d year of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His late Majesty, intituled 'An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;'" and also by another Act, made and passed in the 2d and 3d year of His said late Majesty, intituled "An Act to render more effectual an Act, passed in the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;'" further provisions are made for carrying such divisions into effect:

And whereas the said Commissioners have made a representation to Her Majesty in Council, in the words following, viz.

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches, appointed by virtue of an Act, passed in the 58th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" continued by an Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and further continued by an Act, passed in the 1st year of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to prolong, for ten years, Her Majesty's commission for building new churches;" beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, when the last census was taken, the parish of Pitlington, in the county and diocese of Durham, contained a population of 2205 persons, which has since considerably increased, and is now estimated at 6100:

"That besides the parish church, which affords accommodation to 350 persons, there is one chapel recently erected in the said parish, called Saint Cuthbert's Chapel, which affords accommodation to 500 persons, including 380 free seats appropriated to the use of the poor:

"That the said chapel has been consecrated, and divine service is regularly performed therein:

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent to your Majesty, that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances attending this parish, it appears to them to be expedient, that a particular district should be assigned

to the said chapel, under the provisions of the 16th section of an Act, passed in the 59th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and that district should comprize the whole of the township of Shadforth, and a part of the township of Sherburn, lying to the west of the said township of Shadforth, and should be named "St. Cuthbert's District, Shadforth."

"The boundary thereof to commence on or towards the south of the lane or road leading from Sherburn-house to or towards Hartlepool; thence proceeds in a north westerly direction along the boundary, dividing the township of Cassop and Shadforth, to the place at which the township of Cassop joins the township of Sherburn-house; from thence runs in a northerly direction to a stream of water called Shadforth Beck, where a bounder stone is, or is intended to be, erected or placed, denoting the boundary of the said chapelry of Saint Cuthbert's; from thence continues in a straight line in a north easterly direction on the west side of the village of Sherburn-hill to a point in the lane leading from Sherburn to Low Haswell, where another bounder stone is, or is intended to be, placed, denoting the boundary of the said chapelry; and from thence in a south easterly direction to the boundary which divides the townships of Pittington and Low Haswell-house, in a south easterly direction along the boundary line which divides the said township of Shadforth from the several townships of Low Haswell, High Haswell, and Shotton; and from thence in a westerly direction along the boundary line which divides the said township of Shadforth from the townships of Wingate and Thornley until it reaches the said lane leading from Sherburn-house to or towards Hartlepool, at which the boundary commences, as the same is more particularly delineated in the plan hereunto annexed, and therein coloured yellow:

"That marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized and performed in the said chapel; and that the fees arising therefrom should be received by and belong to the Minister of the said chapel:

"That the consent of the Lord Bishop of Durham has been obtained thereto, as required by the above-mentioned section of the said Act, passed in the 59th year of His Majesty King George the Third; in testimony of which the said Lord Bishop has signed and sealed this present instrument:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners therefore beg leave to lay before your Majesty the before-mentioned circumstances, and humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to

order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment be accordingly made and effected, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts.
