Ist. All Orders for Bounty, which are to be acted upon in 1841, are to be sent to this Office before the 1st of September next.

2d. After the 1st of September next, no Certificates of Emigrants will be received at this

3d. No Bounty will be payable in respect of any Passenger who shall leave this Country after the 1st November next.

4thly. All persons who possess, and intend to make use of, Orders on Bounty shall produce at this Office, on the 1st of March 1842, and in each succeeding year, the authorities under which they act, exhibiting the numbers for whom they are authorized to look for payment in the Colony.

> > Church Commissioners'-Office, August 4, 1841.

THE following is a copy of an Order of Her Majesty in Council, for assigning a district, to St. James's Chapel, at Emsworth, in the parish of Warblington, in the county of Hants, under the 16th section of the 59th Geo. 3, cap. 134:

At the Court at Buckingham Palace, the 4th day of June 1841, present, the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the 58th year

the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, en-acted, " that in every case in which the Commissioners appointed for carrying into execution the purposes of the said Act shall be of opinion that it will be expedient to divide any parish into two or more distinct and separate parishes, for all ecclesiastical purposes whatever, it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners, with the consent of the Bishop of the diocese in which such parish is locally situated, signified under his hand and seal, to apply to the patron or patrons of the church of such parish for his consent to make such division, and for such patron or patrons to signify his or their consent thereto, under his hand and seal; and the said Commissioners shall, upon the consent of the said patron or patrons so signified, represent the whole matter to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which it is proposed, with such consent as aforesaid, to divide such parish, together with the relative and respective proportions of glebe land, tithes, moduses, or other endownients, which will by such division arise and accrue, and remain and be within each of such respective divisions, and also the relative proportions of the estimated amount of the value or produce of tees, oblations, offerings, or other ecclesiastical dues or profits, which may arise and accrue within each of such respective divisions; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division; provided always, that no such division of any parish into distinct parishes shall completely take effect until after the death, resignation, or other avoidance of the existing incumbent of the parish to be divided;" and it is by the 21st section of the said Act further enacted, "that inany case in which the said Commissioners shall be of opinion that it is not expedient to divide any populous parish, or extra parochial place, into such, complete, separate, and distinct parishes as aforesaid, but that it is expedient to divide the same into such ecclesiastical districts as they, with the consent of the Bishop, signified under his hand and seal, may deem necessary, for the purpose of affording accommodation for the attending divine service, according to the rites of the United Church of England and Ireland, to persons residing therein, in the churches and parochial chapels already built, or in additional churches or chapels to be built therein, and as may appear to such Commissioners to be convenient for the enabling the spiritual person or persons who may serve such churches or chapels, to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the districts attached to such respective churches and chapels, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendence of such district, and the preservation and improvement of the religious. and moral habits of the persons residing therein, the said Commissioners shall represent such opinion to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which such districts areproposed to be described; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty of the reign of His late Majesty King George in Council shall be valid and good in law for the

purpose of effecting such division:" and whereas in the 59th year of His late Majesty King George by an Act, passed in the 59th year of His late Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and late Majesty King George the Third, intituled render more effectual an Act, passed in the last " An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners, in the same manner and with the like consents as are required in case of division into ecclesiastical districts under the said hereinbefore recited Act, or the said Act now in recital, to assign a particular district to any chapel of ease or parochial chapel already existing, or to any chapel built, or which might thereafter be built, or acquired under the powers of the said former Act, or the said Act now in recital; and such district shall be under the immediate care of the Curate appointed to serve such chapel, but subject, nevertheless, to the superintendence and controul of the incumbent of the parish church; and all such Curates shall be nominated by the incumbent of the parish to the Bishop for his licence, except where the right of nomination shall already be legally vested in any other person or persons, and in every such case by the person or persons possessing such right of nomination, subject to all the laws in force relating to Stipendiary Curates, except as to the assigning of salaries to such Curates; provided always, that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners, with the consent of the Bishop of the diocese, to determine whether any and what part or proportion of the fees or dues for marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials shall be assigned to any such Curate; and whether banns of marriage shall be published; and marriages or baptisms, churchings or burials, shall be solumnized or performed in any such chapel or not; and in any case in which marriages shall be allowed in any such chapel, the Commissioners shall cause the boundaries of the district assigned to such chapel to be enrolled in the High Court of Chancery, and in the office of the Registry of the diocese, any thing in the said recited Act to the contrary notwithstanding; and no such chapelry shall become a benefice by reason of any augmentation of the maintenance of the Curate, by any grant or bounty under the provision of any Act or Acts of Parliament, or law or laws for augmenting small livings, any thing in such Act or Acts of Parliament, or law or laws, to the contrary notwithstanding;" and whereas by another Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and by another Act, made and passed in the 1st and 2d years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His late Majesty, intituled 'An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and also by another Act, made and passed in the 2d and 3d years of His said late Majesty, intituled "An Act to render more effectual an Act, passed

render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of l'arliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" further provisions are made for carrying such divisions into effect:

And whereas the said Commissioners have made a representation to Her Majesty in Council,

in the words following, viz.
"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches, appointed by virtue of an Act, passed in the 58th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" continued by an Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and further continued by an Act, passed in the 1st year of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to prolong, for ten years, Her Ma-jesty's commission for building new churches;" beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, when the last census was taken, the parish of Warblington, in the county of Hants and diocese of Winchester, contained a population of 2118 persons:

" That besides the parish church, which affords accommodation to 430 persons, there is one chapel in the said parish, called St. James's Chapel, at Emsworth, which affords accommodation to 566 persons, including 334 free seats appropriated to the

ase of the poor:

"That the said chapel has been consecrated, and divine service is regularly performed therein:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners beg leave further to represent to your Majesty, that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances attending this parish, it appears to them to be expedient, that a particular district should be assigned to the said chapel, under the provisions of the 16th section of an Act, passed in the 59th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and that such district should be named "Saint James's District, Emsworth," with boundaries as follows:

"The boundaries commence at the boundary post, on the road going by Wade Way to the island of Thorney, at the south east angle of the parish of Warblington, and follow the boundary of the parish of Warbiington, between it and the adjoining parish of Westbourne, northward, till they arrive at the mill stream, opposite Lumley Mill; there they turn to the south west, down the mill stream till they come to the corner of the hedge of the garden belonging to Hurst's-row, which hedge, in a few yards, bounds a foot-path leading over meadows from Westbourne; the boundaries of the district follow this path, westward, till they arrive at a large parish road, leading from Emsworth to Westbourne

and Horndean respectively, which road they follow, northward, leaving Flint Cottage in the angle, where the two roads separate, to the right, till they come to a bridge which crosses the Horndean road; here they turn to the south, and follow a small brook which rises in Emsworth-common, and flows through Cold Harbour Farm, till it reaches the bridge on the turnpike road leading from Emsworth to Havant; the boundaries pass under this bridge, through the middle of the mill pond, through the mill sluice, and thence to the boundary post again, as the same is more particularly delineated in the plan hercunto annexed, and therein coloured red:

"That marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized and performed in the said chapel; and that the fees arising therefrom should be received by and belong to the Minister of the

said chapel;

"That the consent of the Lord Bishop of Winchester has been obtained thereto, as required by the above-mentioned section of the said Act, passed in the 59th year of His Majestv King George the Third; in testimony of which the said Lord Bishop has signed and sealed this present instrument:

" Your Majesty's Commissioners, therefore, beg leave to lay before your Majesty the beforementioned circumstances, and humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet.

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment be accordingly made and effected, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts.
