

Troops are likewise expected from the Electors of Saxony and Brandenburg. The Count de Hohenlohe, Envoy Extraordinary from the States of Franconia, had yesterday a Conference with the Count de Comingssecque to adjust matters concerning the march and subsistence of the Troops which that Circle is to furnish. We do not hear that the Treaty with the Princes of Lunenburg is yet concluded. The Duke of Lorraine is gone to meet the Queen Dowager of Poland his Wife, who is coming hither from Insprucke.

Vienna, January 10. The News of the Turks having put a supply of Provisions into Newbenfels is confirmed, but with this difference, that some Letters say, it was not brought in Wagons, but by 3900 Horsemen, who had each a Sack of Corn behind him, of whom there got about 300 into the Town. It is not yet publicly known what Business the Armeian, we mentioned in our last, is sent hither upon.

Ratisbonne, January 11. The Imperial Commissioners have acquainted the Dyct that the Emperor will for this time allow that the States assembled here shall depute some persons to be joined with his Commissioners, for settling the Limits between the Empire and the Crown of France, but upon condition that it be of no consequence for the future, and that the method lately observed at Francfort between the Imperial Ministers and the Deputies of the Empire be likewise practised in this occasion.

Brussels, January 19. The Count de Bergeycke returned hither on Tuesday last from visiting the Gaissons in Brabant, who have all received a months Pay; and this morning he parted again from hence to Muster the Troops in the Province of Haynault. And that the Soldiers may be punctually paid, the Marquis de Grana has stopt the Penions of the several Councils and of the Chamber of Accounts, resolving to apply all the publick Moneys for the payment of the Army, till supplies come from Spain. On Wednesday last was kept the Annual Feast of St. Anthony, at which the Marquis de Grana and all the Nobility were present; The Entertainment, which was very magnificent, was given by Don Antonio d'Agurto Maître de Camp General of the Forces in these Countries, the Prevost, and the Prince de la Tour was chosen Prevost for the next year. The Letters from Vienna of the 7th Instant tell us, that the Turks have put a Convoy of Provisions into Newbenfels.

Brussels, January 23. We are told that the intended Reform of the Troops will now be very suddenly put in execution. The English Regiment is removed from Gaunt to Damme, and the Irish from Audenarde to Newport. Our Spanish Letters inform us of the Prince de Chim's arrival at Madryd, and that he was in nomination to be General of the Horse in Catalonia; And that 2000 men were raising in that Kingdom for the service of Milan.

La Hague, January 23. The States of Holland were from their meeting on Wednesday last till Saturday, when they adjourned again for three or four days, almost wholly taken up with the Business depending between the Court of Justice and the Town of Dort; And agreed, it's said, at last upon this Expedient, That the Proceedings on both sides should be annulled and made void, as if they had never been, but without any consequence or prejudice to the Rights or Priviledges of either; And that this being done, the Town of Dort should

make the Nomination of their Magistrates as they have been used to do; Hereupon the Deputies which we told you in our last were come hither from that City returned home again on Saturday; and since we are informed that the several Companies or Trades of Dort have made a new Nomination of persons to be presented to the Prince of Orange, who is to choose out of them the Magistrates for that City; and the Commissioners of the Court of Justice that were sent thither, are expected back to morrow.

Paris, January 27. The King has named the Count de Cheverny, at present his Envoy Extraordinary at Vienna, to go in quality of his Ambassador to the Court of Denmark. The Courier which the Popes Nuncio sent to Genoua, upon his obtaining a prolongation of the Term which his Most Christian Majesty had given that Republick, is expected back here to morrow or next day. The march of the Guards is fixed for the first of the next month. The Mandarims of Siam parted from hence on Tuesday last for Brest, whither they will in few days be followed by the Chevalier de Chaumont, and the Abbot de Choisy, Ambassadors to the King of Siam, in order to their embarking and taking that Voyage together.
