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A PROCLAMATION.

For Continuing the Collection of the Customs and Subsidies of Tonnage and Poundage.

JAMES R.

WE have upon mature Consideration, thought fit to Call a Parliament speedily to be Assembled in which we make no doubt but Care will be taken for Settling a sufficient Revenue on the Crown for the Support of the Government; The Necessities of which, in maintenance of the Navy for Defence of Our Kingdom, and the Advantages of Trade Requiring, That the Customs and Subsidies of Tonnage and Poundage, and other Sums of Money, payable upon Merchandizes Exported and Imported, be continued to be Collected, as in the time of Our Dearest Brother lately Deceased. We do therefore by and with the Advice of our Privy Council Require, And Our Will and Pleasure is, That the said Duties be Collected accordingly, by all and singular the Officers and Collectors within all and every Our Ports in any of Our Dominions, not doubting of a ready Compliance herein from all Our Loving Subjects.

Given at Our Court at Whitehall, the Ninth Day of February, In the First Year of Our Reig.

FOrasmuch as it hath pleased Almighty God lately to call unto his infinite Mercy the most High and Mighty Prince, Charles the Second of most Blessed Memory, the Kings Majesties most Dear and most Entirely Beloved Brother, by whose Decease, the Authority and Power of the most part of the Offices and Places of Jurisdiction and Government within His Majesties Dominions did cease and fail, the Sovereign Person failing from whom the same were derived. The King's most Excellent Majesty in His Princely Wisdom and Care of the State (reserving to His own Judgment hereafter, the Reformation and Redress of any Abuses in Misgovernment, upon due Knowledge and Examination thereof) is Pleas'd, and hath so expressly Signified, That all Persons that at the time of the Decease of the late King His dearly beloved Brother, were Duly and Lawfully Possessed of, or Invested in any Office, or Place of Authority or Government, either Civil or Military within His Majesties Realm of England, and Ireland, Islands of Jersey and Guernsey, Sark or Alderney, or within his Majesties Colonies and Plantations in America; And namely, all Governors, Lieutenants, or Deputy Governors, Cancellors, Judges, Justices, Provost-Marschals, Sheriffs, Justices of the Peace, and all others in place of Government, either Meaner or Superior, as aforesaid; And all other Officers and Ministers, whose Interest and Estates in their Offices are determined, shall be, and shall hold themselves continued in the said Places and Offices, under the same Condition as formerly they held and enjoyed the same, until his Majesty's Pleasure be further known, or that other Provision be made pursuant to His late Majesties Commission and Instructions to his Governors and Officers of the Islands, Colonies and Plantations aforesaid. And that in the mean while, for the Preservation of the State, and necessary Proceedings in matters of Justice, and for the Safety and Service of the State; All the said Persons of whatsoever Degree or Condition may not fail, every one severally, according to his Place, Office, or Charge, to

proceed in the Performance of all Duties thereunto belonging, as formerly appertained to them, while the late King was living. And further, His Majesty doth hereby Will and Command all and singular His Highnesses Subjects, of what Estate, Dignity, and Degree, they or any of them be to be Aiding, Helping and Assisting, and at the Commandment of the said Officers and Ministers, in the Performance and Execution of the said Offices and Places, as they and every of them Tender His Majesty's Displeasure, and will, answer the Contrary at their uttermost Perils. And further His Majesty's Will and Pleasure and Express Commandment is, That all Orders and Directions Made or Given by the Late King, of most Blessed Memory, the Lords of his Privy Council, or his Principal Secretaries of State, or other Legal Authority, derived from His said Majesty in His Life-time, shall be Obedyed and Performed by all and every Person and Persons, and all and every Thing and Things to be done thereupon, shall Proceed as Fully and Amply as the same should have been Obedyed or Done, in the Life of the said Late King, His Majesty's most Dearly and most Entirely Beloved Brother, until His Majesties Pleasure be further known thereupon.

Given at the Court at Whitehall the Sixth day of February, In the First Year of His Majesty's Reig of England, Scotland, France and Ireland, and other his Majesties Territories and Dominions.

God Save the King.

WHereas His Majesty hath been pleased to Command me to take Care that this present Mourning may be Performed with that Decency that becomes so Great an Occasion: This is therefore to Inform all Persons Concerned, That 'tis expected They put themselves into the Deepest Mourning that is possible; (Long Cloaks onely excepted) And that as well all Lords, as Privy-Councillors, and Officers of His Late Majesty's, and now Majesty's Household, do Cover their Coaches, and Chairs, and Clothe their Livery Servants with Black Cloth; And that none presume to use any Farnish'd or Bullion Nails to be seen on their Coaches or Chairs; Except His Majesty, the Queen Consort, Queen Dowager, and their Royal Highnesses.

Genova, January 27. This week arrived here
three of this States Gallies from *Corsica* under the
Command of Signior *Hippolito Centurione*; they
are in a very bad condition, having lost a great
many men by Sickness. The Governor of *Milan*
has been here these three days, and has had several
conferences with the chief men of this Government.
The *America* is Sailed for *Gallipoli*; and the *Robert*
and *Andrew* for the *Riveria* to lade Oyls for
England.

Genova, February 3. This day arrived here the
Tyger Brigat from *Cadix*, and the *Centurion* from
Leghorne. The Senate have at last resolved to
send their Doge and four Senators to *Paris*; and
the Governor of *Milan* is gone home again. The first
instant arrived here the *Loyal Subject* from *Spain*;
the *Hopewell* from *Naples*, and the *Benjamin* from
England.

Hague, February 12. The Deputies of the Town
of *Dort* have by order of their Principals presented
to the States of *Holland*, a large deduction of
what hath lately passed in relation to the second
Nomination made by the Deacons of the several
Trades of that City, &c. Together with a Protest
against these irregular and Exorbitant Proceedings
of the Commissioners of the Court of Justice,
which they desired might be entered in the
publick Register. The States did not think fit
to receive the said Protest, but declared that if the
Magistrates of *Dort* did bring the matter before
them by way of Complaint or Appeal, they
would examine it, and do therein that which is
Right. The City of *Amsterdam* does very
much press that the Forces of the State which
are at present about 40000 men, may be reduced
according to the state of the War in the year 1650,
to 26000 Foot, and 3000 Horse and Dragoons, and
that the Pay and allowances of the General Officers
may be likewise Regulated by the Ancient
Establishments. The Sieur *Camprich* the Imperial
Minister has given in an other Memorial to
the States General, demanding the payment of

the Arrears of Subsidies that remain due to the
Emperour. The Deputies of the States General
for Maritime affairs, have had several Conferences
with the Deputies of the Admiralties about the
Building of some New Ships. The Heer *d' Amerongen*
late Envoy Extraordinary from this State to the
Electour of *Brandenburgh*, made this day his report
in the Assembly of the States General. The
Heer *Diest* is expected here this week in the same
quality from the Electour of *Brandenburgh*.

Paris, February 17. Signior *Ranzuzi* the Popes
Nuncio, and the Marquis *de Marini* Envoy Extraordinary
from the Republick of *Genova*, have signed with the
Sieur *Colbert de Croissy* Secretary of State, several
Articles, by which all things concerning the
Submission which the Republick is to make to his
Most Christian Majesty, and the reception of their
Doge, are agreed. The 17 instant the Marquis
de Priez Envoy Extraordinary from the Duke of
Savoy had his first Audience of the King at
Versailles. The Chevalier *de Chaumont*, and
the Abbot *de Choisy*, Ambassadors to the King of
Siam, parted from hence the last week for *Brest*,
where they are to Embarque on one of the Kings
Ships.

Whitehall, February 9. This day his Royal Highness
Prince George, Hereditary Prince of *Denmark*, being
by his Majesties Command called into the
Council Chamber, took his Place at the Board.
