For Continuing the Collection of the Cultoms and Subfidies of Ionnage and Poundage.

JAMES R.

E bave upon mature Consideration, thought fit to Calla Parlia ment speedily to be Assembled in which we make no doubt but Care will be taken for Setling a suffi-

cient Revenue on the Crown for the Support of the Government; The Necessities of which, in maintenance of the Navy for Defence of Our Kingdom, and the Advan-tages of Trade Requiring, That the Customs and Subsi-dies of Tonnage and Poundage, and other Sums of Moin 7, payable upon Merchandizes Exported and Im ported, Be continued to be Collected, as in the time of Our Dearest Brother lately Deceased. We do therefore by and with the Advice of our Privy Council Require, And Our Will and Pleasure is. That the said Duties be Collected accordingly, by all and singular the Officers and Collectors within all and every Our Ports in any of Our Dominions, not doubting of a ready Compliance bearing from all Our Positions. berein from all Our Loving Subjects.

Porasmuch as it hath pleased Almighty God lately to call unto his infinite Mercy the most High and Mighty Prince, Charles the Second of most Blessed Memory, the Kings Majesties most Dear and most Entirety Beloved Brother, by whose Decease, the Authority and Power of the most part of the Ofices and Places of Jurisdistion and Government within His Majesties Doni-nions did cease and fail, the Soveraign Person failing, from whom the same were derived. The King's most Excellent Mujelly in His Princely Wildom and Care of the State (rejevuing to His own Judgment bereafter, the Reformation and Redress of any Abuses in Mis-government, upon due Knowledge and Examination thereof) n Pleased, and bash so expressly Sign fied, That all Pe sons that at the time of the Decease of the late King His dearly beloved Brother, were Duly and Law-fully Possessed of, or Invested in any Office, or Place of Authority or Government, either Civil or Military within His Majesties Realm of Englands, and Ireland, Islands of Jerzey and Guernsey, Sark or Alder-tey, or within his Majesties Colonies and Pluntations in America; And namely, all Governors, Lieutenants, or Deputy Governors, Councellors, Judges, Fustices, Provost-Marbals, Sheriffs, Fustices of the Peace, and all others in place of Government, either Meaner or Superior, as aforesaid; Ard all other Officers and Ministers, whose Interest and Estates in their Offices are determined, frall be, and shall hold them-selves continued in the said Places and Offices, under the same Condition as formerly they held and enjoyed the same, until his Majestr's Pleasure be further known, or that other Prevision be made tursuant to His late Majesties Commission and Instructions to ha Governors and Officers of the Islands, Colories and Plantations aforesaid And that in the mean while, for the Preservation of the State, and needsary Proceedings in mutters of Justice, and, for the Safety and Service of the State, Althossaid Persons of whatsower Degree or Condition may not fait, every one severally according to his Place. Office, or Charge, to the same, until his Majesty's Pleasure be further TAPIZE occording to his Place, Office, or Charge, to Reign over us.

proceed in the Performance of all Duties thereunto b longing, as formerly appertained to them, while the late King was living. And further, His Majest doth hereby Will and Command all and firgular H19 Highnesses Subjects, of what Estate, Dignity, and D gree, they or any of them bet to be Aiding, Helping and Assisting, and at the Commandment of the said Officers and Ministers in the Parketment and England Tolling. Officers and Ministers, in the Performance and Ex-ecution of the said Offices and Places, as they and every of them Tender His Majesty's Displeasure, and will answer the Contrary at their utterme ft Perils. And further His Majesty's Will and Pleasure and Express Commandment is, That all Orders and Directions
Mide or Given by the Late King, of most sleffed
Memory, the Lords of bis Privy Council, or this
Principal Secretaries of State, or other Legal Authority, derived from His said Maj ity in His Life-time, shall be Obeyed and Performed by all and every Person and Persons, and all and every Thing and Things to be. done thereupon, shall Proceed as Fully and Amply as the same should have been Obeyed or Done, in the Life of the faid Late King, His Majesty's most Dearly and most Entirely Beloved Brother, until His Maj jesties Pleasure be further known thereupon.

The City of Amsterdam does very much press that the Forces of the State which much press that the Forces of the State which are at present about 40000 men, may be reduced according to the state of the War in the year 1650, to 26000 Foot, and 3000 Horse and Dragoons, and that the Pay and allowances of the General Officers may be likewise Regulated by the Antient Establishments. The IT instant the Marquis de Priez Envoy Extraordinary from the Duke of Savoy had his first Audience of the King at Verfailles. The Chevalier de Chaumont, and the Abbot deChoify, Ambassadors to the King of Siam, parted from hence the lastweek for Brest, where they are to Embarque on one of the Kings Ships.
