Edinburgh, February 10.

**L**ast Night arrived here a Flying Pacquet, which brought us the most sorrowful News of the Death of our late Gracious Sovereign; Whereupon the Lord Chancellor and the Lord Treasurer caused the Privy-Council immediately to meet; and having expressed their just grief for the loss of so good a King and Master, they unanimously and with great acrimony resolved to Proclaim the next Morning our Dread Sovereign King *JAMES* the Seventh. Accordingly at Eight this Morning the Privy-Council met again, and having read His Majesty's Gracious Letter to them, the Lord Chancellor took the Oath of Allegiance, the Oath of a Privy-Councillor, and the Test, and then Administred the same to the other Councillors; which done, they all Signed the Proclamation for Proclaiming His Majesty, and then went to assist at the Solemnity of it. The Lord Provost, Magistrates, and Town-Council in their Formalities marched bare-headed, next the Lyon and Heralds in their Coats of Arms displayed; then the Lord Chancellor, Lord Treasurer, and the rest of the Officers of State, and Councillors, and other Lords Spiritual and Temporal; and after them the Lords of the Session in their Robes, the Trained Bands standing on both sides the Streets. Being come to the Cross, and mounting it, the Lord Chancellor proclaimed the King, which was followed with an universal Acclamation from more than 30000 of all Ranks of People present, who with up-lifted Hands swore Allegiance to His Majesty. And then was Proclaimed His Majesty's Gracious Proclamation for continuing all Officers by Lyon King at Arms: After which they marched back in the same manner to the Council-House. In the Afternoon the Privy-Council met again, and went with the Magistrates to the Cross, where they Drank the King and Queens Health, and the rest of the Royal Family. The Town was full of Bonfires, the Cannon from the Castle fired all the while, and the Night concluded with all imaginable Demonstrations of joy and satisfaction.

(Whom GOD preserve and Bless with a Long, Glorious, Happy Life and Prosperous Reign) And whom we shall humbly Obey, Dutifully and Faithfully Serve, Maintain and Defend with our Lives and Fortunes, against all deadly, as our only Righteous King and Sovereign, over all Persons, and in all Causes as Holding His Imperial Crown from GOD alone. And for Testification whereof, We here, in presence of the Almighty God, and a great number of His Majesty's Faithful People, of all Estates and Qualities, who are assisting with us, at this Solemn Publication, of our Due, Humble, and Faithful Acknowledgment of his Supreme Sovereign Authority, at the Mercat Cross of the City of Edinburgh, Declare and Publish, That Our said Sovereign Lord, by the Goodness and Providence of Almighty GOD, is of Scotland, England, France, and Ireland, and Dominion therunto belonging, The most POTENT, MIGHTY, and undoubted KING. And hereby give Our Oaths, with up-lifted Hands, that we shall bear True and Faithful Allegiance, unto Our said Sacred Sovereign, *JAMES* the Seventh, King of Great Britain, France, and Ireland, Defender of the Faith, &c. And to His Lawful Heirs and Successors, and shall perform all Duties, Service, and Obedience to him, as becomes his Faithful, Loyal, and Dutiful Subjects.

And so their so doing, This shall be to them, and every one of them respectively, a full Warrant.

Given under Our Royal Hand, at Our Court at Whitehall, the Sixth day of February 1684. And of Our Reign the Fifth Year.

A Letter to His Majesty from His Privy Council of Scotland.

May it please your Sacred Majesty,  
Nothing could support us under this great load of just Grief and Sorrow, for the removal of our late Gracious Sovereign, who transcended all that ever Reigned before him, in Wisdom, Justice, and Clemency; But that He being thereby become without doubt, more happy and Glorious, hath left us under your Sacred Majesties most auspicious Government, who are the undoubted and just lineal Heir of his Authority and Sovereignty, and the true Successor of His Royal Virtues, with all those great Qualities which can fit a Prince for the Glorious Dignity of being Vice-gerent to Almighty God; In whom also the your ancient Kingdom cannot but be happy in a most especial manner, your Majesty being the lineal and legal Successor of that most ancient Race of Kings by whom for so many Ages this Kingdom hath been Governed, with so much Justice, and defended by so much valour; And your Sacred Majesty having been so instrumental in your own Person, to secure us against those Confusions and Distractions, in which we were involved, before your Majesty did us the Honor to spend some time amongst us.

We therefore Your Majesties Privy Council, being Authorized by your Gracious Letter, did meet, and in recognition of your just Right and Title we did renew to your Sacred Majesty your late Reigns the usual Oaths of Privy Counsellors, and thereafter attended by the Nobility and Clergy of this your ancient Kingdom, the Lords of your Council and Session, and the Magistrates of your City of Edinburgh, did at the Mercat Cross of this City, as usual, Proclaim and Declare your Majesty our King and Sovereign, binding our selves by a solemn Oath to hazard our Lives and Fortunes in the defence of your Majesties Title and Person, which was most Dutifully and joyfully seconded by the universal Acclamations of those great crowds of your Majesties Subjects, who were then present. After which, we likewise promulgated your Gracious Proclamation for continuing your Officers, Judges, and Magistrates in their former Employments; And also those wherein your Majesty is Graciously pleased to continue us, we shall make it our chief endeavour to improve the same with all Zeal and Faithfulness, for the good of your Majesties Service. And that Almighty God by whom Kings Reign, may preserve your Royal Person, and make your Government Glorious and Successful, is, and ever shall be the hearty Prayers of,

A Letter to His Majesty from the Archbishops and Bishops of Scotland.

Most Sacred Sovereign,  
Our deep and just Sorrow for the death of our late Blessed and Gracious King would certainly swallow

us up, did not the Righteous and peaceable Succession of your Majesty support us under our unexpressible affliction.

Had we the Honor and Happiness to prostrate our Persons at your Royal Feet, Our Tears would prove our best Orators for the former, as our Prayers and Thanksgivings to the only Ruler of Princes; and our best and most faithful endeavors to serve your most Sacred Majesty, shall ever express our Joy and Zeal for the latter.

Your pious Zeal for the Honor and Interest of your Royal Brother our late Sovereign now in Glory, and for this your ancient Kingdom, whilist we enjoyed the happiness of your Presence amongst us, as it did then deny us a Traitor, so be the best and most Obedient of Subjects; It did it prognosticate your being the Kindest, and most Rational of Sovereign Princes to your People.

At this distance from your Royal Presence, we are able in our present circumstances, to do no more than humbly to Address to your Majesty in Paper, to pay that Duty we owe upon so solemn an occasion, but are reserved (if your Sacred Majesty shall allow) to desire the Arch-Bishop of St. Andrews, (who is most desirous and ambitious to congratulate your most righteous Succession to the Thrones of your Royal Ancestors), to address himself to your Royal Presence, more fully to express our Sense and Duty, than a Letter can allow, and humbly to implore your Majesties Protection and Favour to this National Church, and to our Order and Persons; which we are humbly confident to obtain, when we reflect upon your Piety and Zeal for all these Interests, during your abode in this Kingdom.

To Honor, Serve, and Humbly Obey your Sacred Majesty in all our Capacities, as God's Vice-gerent over us, is not only incorporated into our Religion, but is the most zealous inclination of,

Dublin, Febr. 11. His Grace the Duke of Ormond, Lord-Lieutenant of this Kingdom, having received last Night an Express with the sad News of our inestimable loss in the Death of our late Sovereign King CHARLES the Second, immediately summoned the Privy Council, and there gave the Orders that were necessary on this occasion. This Morning the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, the Privy Council, the Judges, the Lord Mayor and Aldermen, and the Officers of the Army, as many of each Degree as were in Town, with many other Gentlemen of Quality, all in the Habits proper to their several Capacities, attended his Grace in the great Hall of the Castle; and having there Ananimously subscribed a Recognition of the Indubitable Right and Title of His Majesty King JAMES the Second, took Hold in the Castle-Yard, and Riding out from thence, attended with the Heralds, the several Banners of Authority, and the Trumpets and Kettle-Drums Proclaimed His Majesty in three places of this City, first at the Castle-Gate, then at the Toll, and lastly in the publick Corn Market, with Volleys of Shot from the great Guns at each Proclamation. The whole Procession was performed with all the splendor and solemnity the shortness of time would permit, and with all possible Demonstrations of Joy and Satisfaction. In the Afternoon the Council was summoned again, and two Proclamations were Signed to be sent forthwith to all the Counties of the Kingdom, the one for Proclaiming the King in all Shire-Towns and Towns Corporate, and the other for continuing all Magistrates and Officers both Civil and Military in their several Employments; and the Night was begun with Banners and ringing of Bells. The Recognition and Proclamation was according to the form used in England.

Whitehall, Febr. 17. This day was published the following Proclamation.

JAMES R.  
WE Hereby the Commissioners of the Treasury of the late King Our Dearly beloved Brother deceased, Sidney Lord Godolphin, Sir John Ernely Knight, Sir Stephen Fox Knight, Sir Dudley North Knight, and Frederick Thynne Esquire, on the Fifth day of this instant February, for the better improvement of the Revenue arising by the Duty of Excise, did Contract, Conclude, and Agree with Sir Peter Apdley Knight, Sir Benjamin Bathurst Knight, and James Graham Esquire, That they the said Sir Peter Apdley, Sir Benjamin Bathurst, and James Graham, their

Executors

Executors, Administrators and Assigns, should have received and take the full and whole Duty of Excise for the Term of Three years to Commence from the Date of the said Contract, rendering to the late King, His Heirs and Successors, the yearly Rent of Five hundred and fifty thousand pounds payable by Quarterly payments, The first payment to be made at the Feast of the Annunciation of the Blessed Virgin Mary next ensuing under such Covenants and Agreements for payment and securing the said Rent, as in and by the said Contract are provided for.

And whereas We have been Certified by the Opinion of Our Judges (whose Opinion for Our greater Satisfaction herein We have Required) That the said Contract made by the said Commissioners of the Treasury of Our late Dear Brother is good and valid in Law, and hath Continuance during the said Three years, as well for that part of the said Revenue which was Granted to our said Dear Brother for Life, as for that part which was Granted to Him, His Heirs and Successors, by virtue of the Acts of Parliament which gave those Duties, notwithstanding the decease of Our said Dear Brother; To the intent therefore the said Sir Peter Apley, Sir Benjamin Bathurst and James Grahme, who have made such Contract with the said Commissioners of the Treasury, may have no pretence to withhold the said Rent from Us, and that Our loving Subjects, who are chargeable with the payment of the said several Duties, may not incur the Penalties inflicted by the Laws of Excise, for not making due Entries, or Non-payment or concealing of any part of the said Duties, during the said Term of Three years; We do hereby signify and Publish to all Our loving Subjects, That Our said Judges have Certified to Us their Opinions in Law, That the said Contract hath Continuance notwithstanding the Decease of Our said Dear Brother: Our Will and Pleasure therefore is, And We do hereby strictly Charge and Command all Our Commissioners, and Sub Commissioners of Excise, and all other Our Officers employed, or to be employed in the Collection of the said Duties, That they be aiding and assisting to the said Sir Peter Apley, Sir Benjamin Bathurst, and James Grahme, and their Assigns, in the Collecting and Levying of the said Duties during the said Term of Three years, according to the several Powers and Authorities placed in them by the several Acts for Granting of the Excise. And that all Our loving Subjects chargeable with the payment of the said Duties do make their due Entries and Payments, as is provided by the Laws of Excise during the said Term of Three years, upon the Pains and Penalties to be inflicted thereupon, according to the said Laws of Excise.

*Newport* in *Buckinghamshire*, Febr. 10. Yesterday His Majesty was Proclaimed here with great Joy and Duty. To-morrow the like will be done at *Stony Stratford*; and on Monday at *Olney*.

*Dorset*, Febr. 10. Yesterday His Majesty was Proclaimed here by the Mayor and his Brethren in their Formalities, which was performed with great solemnity, and with all the demonstrations of Loyalty and affection to His Majesty. The like has been done in all the other Towns of this County.

*Shrewsbury*, Febr. 10. This day His Majesty was solemnly Proclaimed here by the Mayor, Aldermen and Common-Council in their Formalities, the Deputy-Lieutenants and a great many other Gentlemen being present; The Trained-Bands were in Arms, and gave several Volleys, the People expressed their Satisfaction with repeated Acclamations, and the day ended with Bonfires and ringing of Bells. The like has been done in all the other Market-Towns of this County.

*Lyne*, Febr. 10. This Afternoon Captain A'Ford our Mayor, with all the Magistrates in their Formalities, and the most considerable Inhabitants of this place, Proclaimed His Majesty with the solemnity befitting the occasion; The great Guns were discharged, and the Evening was concluded with Bonfires and repeated Acclamations of Joy.

*Briggwater*, Febr. 10. His Majesty was this day Proclaimed here with much solemnity, and all imaginable expressions of Joy.

*Gloucester*, Febr. 9. This day the Mayor and Aldermen of this City in their Formalities, the High Sheriff and very many of the principal Gentlemen of the County being present, Proclaimed His Majesty King JAMES the Second, with very great Acclamations, and all imaginable expressions of Joy, the Conduct ending with Wine, from hence the Sheriff went to all the chief Towns in the County, and sent his Officers to the rest, where his Majesty was likewise Proclaimed with like expressions of Joy, all the Gentry of the adjacent parts being present.

*Hereford*, Febr. 11. Yesterday the Mayor and Aldermen of this City in their Formalities Proclaimed His Majesty, a very

great number of the Gentry of the County being present, with all expressions of Joy and Satisfaction, and immediately after the Sheriff went to the chief Towns, and sent his Deputies to other Towns from whence we have an account of the great numbers of People that was present at the Proclamations, and the great Acclamations.

*Worcester*, Febr. 11. The whole concluded at Night with Bonfires in the several Colleges, and all other testimonies of zeal and affection & loyalty to His late Majesty.

His Majesty was pleased this Afternoon in Council to Declare the Right Honourable the Lord Marquis of *Salisbury* Lord President of His Privy Council; who took his place at the Board. His Majesty was likewise pleased to Declare the Right Honourable the Earl of *Clarendon* Lord Privy Seal, and His Grace the Duke of *Beaufort* Lord President of *Wales*; who were accordingly Sworn.

His Majesty has been pleased to make the Right Honourable the Lord *Godolphin* Lord Chamberlain to the Queen.
