Those Gentlemen who are to be presented are hereby informed, it is absolutely necessary that their names, with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to present them (not that of the Lord in Waiting), should be sent to the Lord Chamberlain's-Office, before twelve o'clock on the day but one previous to each Levee, in order that they may be submitted for the Queen's approbation; it being Her Majesty's command, that

no presentation shall hereafter be made at the Levees, but in conformity with the above regulations; and further, that no person shall be admitted, on any pretence whatever, who has not been so presented.

It is particularly requested, that Gentlemen who are to be presented at the Levees will have their names *distinctly* written upon the card to be delivered to the Lord in Waiting, in order that there may be no mistake in announcing them to the Queen.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half past one o'clock.

NOTICE is hereby given, that all persons, having Petitions or Addresses to present to Her Majesty at the Levees, are to write on two cards, with their names, a statement of the object of such Petitions or Addresses, and of the persons from whom they come; one card to be delivered to the Page in the Ante-Room, and the other to the Lord in Waiting, who will read its contents, at the time of presentation, to Her Majesty; and, on these occasions, no other statement is to be addressed to Her Majesty.

*May it please your Majesty,*

WE, the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Councillors of the borough of the city of Dublin, beg leave to approach your Majesty's Throne with the expression

of our most cordial and respectful congratulations at the auspicious event of the birth of a Prince, the undoubted Heir to the Crown of these realms, an event calculated to confer that happiness on your Majesty and your illustrious Consort which we fervently pray may be increased and perpetuated ; an event which also affords to your Majesty's loyal and devoted subjects, throughout the wide spread dominions over which your Majesty's sceptre has control, the fairest and the brightest hope of the continuance of that benevolent sway of which your Majesty holds out so brilliant and consolatory an example to the Sovereigns of the earth.

We beg most respectfully to assure your Majesty, that your faithful subjects, the citizens of Dublin, with one unanimous sentiment, concur in the heartfelt gratulations which we lay at the foot of your Majesty, animated as they are with the purest allegiance to the Throne and respect for the Person of your sacred Majesty ; they join with us in a fervent prayer to the Divine Dispenser of all Good, that He may bestow upon your Majesty the uninterrupted possession of all the blessings which this world can confer, and of the pure enjoyment of an eternal crown of glory hereafter. To the **QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty.**

The humble Address of the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the city of London, in Common Council assembled.

*Most Gracious Sovereign,*

WE, your Majesty's loyal and dutiful subjects, the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the city of London, in Common Council assembled, approach your Majesty with renewed assurances of our loyalty and attachment to your Majesty's Person and Family.

Deeply sympathising in the expressions of regret which your Majesty has addressed to your Parliament, at the continued distress of your Majesty's subjects, we beg leave most humbly to state, that we have observed with unfeigned concern, that, notwithstanding the benevolent anxiety expressed by your Majesty for the relief of that distress, the Commons' House of Parliament has refused to sanction the free importation of corn; and that your Majesty's Government, instead of introducing a law to remove, has proposed a law for re-adjusting, the injurious and oppressive restrictions upon the importation of food.

We beg leave most dutifully and humbly to state to your Majesty, that it is our conviction that a permanent and sufficient remedy for the extensive and deep-rooted distress of the manufacturing and

labouring classes of the community can only be effected by abolishing all laws restricting the importation of food; we, therefore, most humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to withhold your royal sanction from any Act which may be passed to tax articles of food, or restrict their free importation into this country.

A CHAPTER of the Most Noble Order of the Garter having been summoned for this day, the following Knight Companions, in their mantles and collars, assembled at the Palace, viz.

Their Royal Highnesses the Prince Albert of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha, the Duke of Cambridge, and Prince George of Cambridge; his Grace the Duke of Rutland, his Grace the Duke of Wellington, the Marquess of Anglesey, the Marquess of Exeter, his Grace the Duke of Richmond, his Grace the Duke of Buccleuch, and his Grace the Duke of Sutherland, attended by the under-mentioned Officers, in their mantles, chains, and badges, viz. the Lord Bishop of Winchester, the Prelate of the Order; the Honourable and Reverend the Dean of Windsor, Registrar of the Order; Sir William Woods, Knight, Garter Principal King of Arms; and Sir Augustus-William-James Clifford, Baronet, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod.

Shortly after one o'clock, the Knights Companions were called over by Garter, and, with the Officers of the Order, proceeded into the presence of the Sovereign in the Throne-room.

The Sovereign being seated in the chair of state, and the Knights Companions having taken their respective places at the table, the Prelate of the Order, by Her Majesty's command, read a new statute, declaring His Majesty Frederick-Augustus King of Saxony, a Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter.

The Prelate then signified to the Chapter the Sovereign's royal will and pleasure that the four vacant stalls in the Royal Chapel of St. George at Windsor be filled; and as, by the statutes, none but a Knight can be elected, His Grace Henry Duke of Beaufort was introduced by Garter and Black Rod, and knighted by Her Majesty with the Sword of State, and His Grace, having kissed the Sovereign's hand, retired. After which James-Brownlow-William Marquess of Salisbury, and Henry Duke of Cleveland were, in like manner, severally and successively introduced and knighted with the same ceremonies.

The Knights Companions then proceeded to the election; and the suffrages having been collected by the Prelate were by him presented to the Sovereign, who was pleased to command him to declare, and he accordingly declared, that the Most Noble Henry Duke of Beaufort had been duly elected a Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter.

Then, by the Sovereign's command, His Grace was received, at the door of the Chapter-room, by the Duke of Buccleuch and the Duke of Sutherland, the two Junior Knights Companions present, and conducted between them to Her Majesty, preceded by Garter (bearing the ensigns of the Order upon

a crimson velvet cushion) and by Black Rod. The Duke of Beaufort, kneeling near the Sovereign, and Garter, on his knee, presenting the garter, Her Majesty, assisted by their Royal Highnesses the Prince Albert of Saxe Coburg and Gotha and the Duke of Cambridge, the two Senior Knights Companions present, buckled it on his Grace's left leg, the Prelate pronouncing the usual admonition.

Garter next presented, in like manner, the ribband with the George, and Her Majesty, assisted as before, placed the same over his Grace's left shoulder, the Prelate pronouncing the admonition. The Duke of Beaufort, having again kissed the Sovereign's hand, and received the congratulations of each of the Knights Companions, withdrew.

The Chapter then proceeded to a second election, and the suffrages having been collected by the Prelate and presented to the Sovereign, the Most Noble Richard-Plantagenet Duke of Buckingham and Chandos (already a Knight) was, by the Sovereign's command, declared duly elected; whereupon his Grace was introduced and invested with the garter and the ribband and George, in the same manner as the Duke of Beaufort had been, and the like ceremonies having been observed, he withdrew.

The Chapter then proceeded to a third election, and the suffrages being collected as before, the Most Honourable James-Brownlow-William Marquess of Salisbury was, by the Sovereign's command, declared duly elected; and his Lordship being introduced and invested with the garter and the ribband and George, with the same ceremonies, withdrew.

The Chapter then proceeded to a fourth election, and the suffrages being collected as before, the Most Noble Henry Duke of Cleveland was, by the Sovereign's command, declared duly elected; and his Grace being introduced and invested with the garter and the ribband and George, with the same ceremonies, withdrew.

The Chapter being ended, Garter again called over the Knights Companions, who, with the Officers of the Order, retired from the presence of the Sovereign with the usual reverences.

The Queen, as Sovereign of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, has been graciously pleased, by letters patent under Her royal sign manual and the great seal of the Order, bearing date, respectively, this day, to dispense with all the statutes and regulations usually observed in regard to installation, and to give and grant unto Henry Duke of Beaufort, Richard-Plantagenet Duke of Buckingham and Chandos; James-Brownlow-William Marquess of Salisbury; and Henry Duke of Cleveland, Knights of the said Most Noble Order, and duly invested with the ensigns thereof, full power and authority to exercise, respectively, all rights and privileges belonging to a Knight Companion of the said Most Noble Order of the Garter, in as full and ample a manner as if they had been formally installed, any decree, rule, or usage to the contrary notwithstanding.

**T**HE following is a copy of an Order of Her Majesty in Council, for assigning a chapelry district to St. Mary's Chapel, in the parish of Lambeth, in the county of Surrey, under the 16th section of the 59th George 3, cap. 134:

At the Court at Windsor, the 15th day of January 1842, present, the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**WHEREAS** by an Act, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "that in every case in which the Commissioners appointed for carrying into execution the purposes of the said Act, shall be of opinion that it will be expedient to divide any parish into two or more distinct and separate parishes, for all ecclesiastical purposes whatever, it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners, with the consent of the Bishop of the diocese in which such parish is locally situated, signified under his hand and seal, to apply to the patron or patrons of the church of such parish for his consent to make such division, and for such patron or patrons to signify his or their consent thereto, under his hand and seal; and the said Commissioners shall, upon the consent of the said patron or patrons so signified, represent the whole matter to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which it is proposed, with such consent as aforesaid, to divide such parish, together with the relative and respective proportions of glebe land, tithes, moduses, or other endowments, which will by such division arise and accrue, and remain and be within each of such re-

spective divisions, and also the relative proportions of the estimated amount of the value or produce of fees, oblations, offerings, or other ecclesiastical dues or profits which may arise and accrue within each of such respective divisions; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division; provided always, that no such division of any parish into distinct parishes shall completely take effect until after the death, resignation, or other avoidance of the existing incumbent of the parish to be divided;" and it is, by the 21st section of the said Act, further enacted, "that in any case in which the said Commissioners shall be of opinion that it is not expedient to divide any populous parish or extra parochial place into such complete, separate, and distinct parishes as aforesaid, but that it is expedient to divide the same into such ecclesiastical districts as they, with the consent of the Bishop, signified under his hand and seal, may deem necessary, for the purpose of affording accommodation for the attending divine service, according to the rites of the United Church of England and Ireland, to persons residing therein, in the churches and parochial chapels already built, or in additional churches or chapels to be built therein, and as may appear to such Commissioners to be convenient for the enabling the spiritual person or persons who may serve such churches or chapels to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the districts attached to such respective churches and chapels, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendence of such district, and the preservation and improvement of the religious and moral habits of the persons residing therein, the said Commissioners shall represent such opinion to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which such districts are proposed to be described; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division;" and whereas by an Act, passed in the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" it is, amongst other things, enacted, "that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners, in the same manner and with the like consents as are required in case of division into ecclesiastical districts under the said hereinbefore recited Act, or the said Act now in recital, to assign a particular district to any chapel of ease or parochial chapel already existing, or to any chapel built, or which might thereafter be built, or acquired under the powers of the said former Act, or the said Act now in recital; and such district shall be under the immediate care of the Curate appointed to serve such chapel, but subject, nevertheless, to the superintendence and controul of the incumbent of the parish church; and all such Curates shall be nominated by the incumbent of the parish to the Bishop for his licence, except where the right of nomination shall already be legally vested in any other person or per-

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the 58th year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "that in every case in which the Commissioners appointed for carrying into execution the purposes of the said Act shall be of opinion that it will be expedient to divide any parish into two or more distinct and separate parishes, for all ecclesiastical purposes whatever, it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners, with the consent of the Bishop of the diocese in which such parish is locally situated, signified under his hand and seal, to apply to the patron or patrons of the church of such parish for his consent to make such division, and for such patron or patrons to signify his or their consent thereto, under his hand and seal; and the said Commissioners shall, upon the consent of the said patron or patrons so signified, represent the whole matter to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which it is proposed, with such consent as aforesaid, to divide such parish, together with the relative and respective proportions of glebe land, tithes, moduses, or other endowments, which will by such division arise and accrue, and remain and be within each of such respective divisions, and also the relative proportions of the estimated amount of the value or produce of fees, oblations, offerings, or other ecclesiastical dues or profits, which may arise and accrue within each of such respective divisions; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division; provided always, that no such division of any parish into distinct parishes shall completely take effect until after the death, resignation, or other avoidance of the existing incumbent of the parish to be divided;" and it is by the 21st section of the said Act further enacted, "that in any case in which the said Commissioners shall be of opinion that it is not expedient to divide any populous parish, or extra parochial place, into such complete, separate, and distinct parishes as aforesaid, but that it is expedient to divide the same into such ecclesiastical districts as they, with the consent of the Bishop, signified under his hand and seal, may deem necessary, for the purpose of affording accommodation for the attending divine service, according to the rites of the United Church of England and Ireland, to persons residing therein, in the churches and parochial chapels already built, or in additional churches or chapels to be built therein, and as may

appear to such Commissioners to be convenient for the enabling the spiritual person or persons who may serve such churches or chapels, to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the districts attached to such respective churches and chapels, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendence of such district, and the preservation and improvement of the religious and moral habits of the persons residing therein, the said Commissioners shall represent such opinion to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which such districts are proposed to be described; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division:" and whereas by an Act, passed in the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners, in the same manner and with the like consents as are required in case of division into ecclesiastical districts under the said hereinbefore recited Act, or the said Act now in recital, to assign a particular district to any chapel of ease or parochial chapel already existing, or to any chapel built, or which might thereafter be built, or acquired under the powers of the said former Act, or the said Act now in recital; and such district shall be under the immediate care of the Curate appointed to serve such chapel, but subject, nevertheless, to the superintendence and controul of the incumbent of the parish church; and all such Curates shall be nominated by the incumbent of the parish to the Bishop for his licence, except where the right of nomination shall already be legally vested in any other person or persons, and in every such case by the person or persons possessing such right of nomination, subject to all the laws in force relating to Stipendiary Curates, except as to the assigning of salaries to such Curates; provided always, that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners, with the consent of the Bishop of the diocese, to determine whether any and what part or proportion of the fees or dues for marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials shall be assigned to any such Curate; and whether banns of marriage shall be published, and marriages or baptisms, churchings or burials, shall be solemnized or performed in any such chapel or not; and in any case in which marriages shall be allowed in any such chapel, the Commissioners shall cause the boundaries of the district assigned to such chapel to be enrolled in the High Court of Chaucery, and in the office of the Registry of the diocese, any thing in the said recited Act to the contrary notwithstanding; and no such chapelry shall become a benefice by reason of any augmentation of the maintenance of the Curate, by any grant or bounty under the provision of any Act or Acts of Parliament, or law or laws for augmenting small livings, any thing in such Act or Acts of Parliament, or law or laws, to the contrary notwithstanding;" and whereas by another Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His
