

**WHEREAS** by an Order of the High Court of Chancery, made in a cause Peto v. Grissell, and other causes, it was ordered that it should be referred to Sir George Rose, one of the Masters of the said Court, to enquire and state to the Court who was the heir at law of Henry Peto, deceased, the testator in the pleadings of the said causes named, living at the time of his death, and who is now his heir at law; and if the said Master should find that the heir at law living at the time of the death of the said testator was dead, it was ordered that he should enquire who was or were the real and personal representatives or representative of such deceased heir; and it was ordered, that the said Master should enquire and state who were the next of kin of the said testator at the time of his death, and whether any and which of such next of kin was or were since dead, and, if dead, it was ordered that he should enquire and state who was or were the legal personal representative or representatives of such as was or were dead; therefore, all persons claiming to be such heir at law or next of kin, or to be such representative or representatives as aforesaid, are forthwith to come in and make out their respective claims before the said Master, at his chambers, in Southampton-buildings, Chancery-lane, London, or in default thereof they will be excluded the benefit of the said Order. The said Henry Peto, who resided at Highbury-terrace, Islington, and York-road, Lambeth, was born at Effingham, in the county of Surrey, and died on the 15th day of September 1830.
