PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS an Act, passed by the Governor General of India in Council, on the eleventh day of October one thousand eight hundred and forty-one, intituled "An Act for prohibiting the importation of rum and rum shrub into the Presidency of Fort Saint George, in Madras," has this day been laid before Her Majesty in Council, and Her Majesty, with the advice of the Privy Council, hath been pleased to declare, and doth hereby declare, that the same is satisfactory proof, that rum and rum shrub, the produce of any foreign country, or of any British possession into which foreign sugar or rum can be legally imported, has been prohibited to be imported into the territories subject to the Government of the Presidency of Fort Saint George, in Madras:

And whereas by the said Act, such regulations have been made and provided for the prevention of frauds by the admixture of spirits made from rice, grain, or other substances, not being the produce of the sugar cane, or of the date or palm tree, with the rum or rum shrub to be exported under the Act of Parliament hereinafter men-

tioned, as in the opinion of the Governor General in Council are calculated for that purpose :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, and in pursuance of the power and authority in this behalf vested in Her by an Act of Parliament, made and passed in the session of Parliament held in the fourth and fifth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to reduce the duty on rum and rum shrub, the produce of, and imported from, certain British possessions in the East Indies into the United Kingdom," doth hereby order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that, from and after the date of this Order, rum and rum shrub, the produce of any portion of the territories subject to the Government of the Presidency of Fort Saint George, in Madras, in respect of which portion the prohibition aforesaid shall continue in force, shall, on importation into the United Kingdom, be admitted to entry at the duties by the said Act of Parliament imposed and set forth in the schedule hereunto annexed, in lieu of the duties to which such rum and rum shrub is now liable on the importation thereof into the United Kingdom; subject, nevertheless, to the provisions in the said Act of Parliament contained with regard to the certificates and declaration thereby required:

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, and the Right Honourable Lord FitzGerald, President of

the Board of Commissioners for the Affairs of India, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

SCHEDULE.

For every gallon of rum, of any strength not exceeding the strength of proof by Sikes's hydrometer, and so in proportion for any greater or less strength than the strength of proof, and for every greater or less quantity than a gallon, being the produce of the territories subject to the Government of the Presidency of Fort Saint George, in Madras, not being sweetened or mixed with any article so that the degree of strength thereof cannot be exactly ascertained by such hydrometer, nine shillings and four pence.

For every gallon of rum shrub, however sweetened, the produce of, and imported from, such territories, and so in proportion for any greater or less quantity than a gallon, nine shillings and four pence.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the seventh year of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for rendering more easy the taking the poll at county elections," it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time, on petition from the justices of any county, riding, parts, or division in England or Wales, in quarter sessions assembled, representing that the number of polling places for such county, riding, parts, or division is insufficient, and praying that the place or places mentioned in the said petition may be a polling place or polling places for the county, riding, parts, or division of the county within which such place or places is or are situate, to declare that

any place or places mentioned in the said petition shall be a polling place or polling places for that county, riding, parts, or division; and that the justices of the peace for such county, riding, parts, or division, in quarter sessions or some special sessions assembled, as mentioned in the Act, passed in the third year of the reign of His said late Majesty, intituled "An Act to settle and determine the divisions of counties, and the limits of cities and boroughs in England and Wales, in so far as respects the election of Members to serve in Parliament," shall, conformably to the said last-mentioned Act, divide such county, riding, parts, or division into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place:

And whereas the justices of the peace for the county of Chester, at a general quarter session of the peace holden at Nether Knutsford, in and for the said county, on Monday the twenty-seventh day of June in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-two, have presented their petition to Her Majesty, representing, that the number of polling places for the northern division of the said county is insufficient, and, therefore, praying that Grappenhall and Altrincham, severally situated within such division, may henceforth be additional polling places for the said northern division of the said county of Chester:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken the said petition into consideration, doth, pursuant to the said Act of the seventh year of His late Majesty's reign, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, declare, order, and direct, that the said places named in the said petition, namely, Grappenhall and Altrincham, shall be polling places for the northern division of the said county of Chester; and further, that the justices of the peace for the said county of Chester, assembled at the general quarter session or some special sessions, as mentioned in the said Act of the third year of His late Majesty's reign, shall, conformably to the said last-mentioned Act, divide the said northern division of the said county of Chester into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place.

THE following is a copy of an Order of Her Majesty in Council, assigning chapelry districts to fourteen churches and chapels in the parish of Blackburn, in the county of Lancaster, under the 16th section of the 59th Geo. 3., cap. 134 :

At the Court at Buckingham-Palace, the 11th of August 1842, present, the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "that in every case in which the Commissioners appointed for carrying into execution the purposes of the said Act shall be of opinion that it will be expedient to divide any parish into two or more distinct and separate parishes, for all ecclesiastical purposes whatever, it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners, with the consent of the bishop of the diocese in which such parish is locally situated, signified under his hand and seal, to apply to the patron or patrons of the church of such parish for his consent to make such division, and for such patron or patrons to signify his or their consent thereto under his hand and seal; and the said Commissioners shall, upon the consent of the said patron or patrons so signified, represent the whole matter to His Majesty in Council, and shall

state in such representation the bounds by which it is proposed, with such consent as aforesaid, to divide such parish, together with the relative and respective proportions of glebe land, tithes, moduses, or other endowments which will by such division arise and accrue, and remain and be, within each of such respective divisions, and also the relative proportions of the estimated amount of the value or produce of fees, oblations, offerings, or other ecclesiastical dues or profits which may arise and accrue within each of such respective divisions; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division; provided always, that no such division of any parish into distinct parishes shall completely take effect until after the death, resignation, or other avoidance of the existing incumbent of the parish to be divided;" and it is by the 21st section of the said Act further enacted, "that in any case in which the said Commissioners shall be of opinion that it is not expedient to divide any populous parish, or extra parochial place, into such complete, separate, and distinct parishes as aforesaid, but that it is expedient to divide the same into such ecclesiastical districts as they, with the consent of the bishop, signified under his hand and seal, may deem necessary for the purpose of affording accommodation for the attending divine service, according to the rites of the United Church of England and Ireland, to persons residing therein, in the churches and parochial chapels already built, or in additional churches or chapels to be built therein, and as may appear to such Commissioners to be convenient for the enabling the spiritual person or persons who may serve such churches or chapels to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the districts attached to such respective churches and chapels, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendence of such district, and the preservation and improvement of the religious and moral habits of the persons residing therein, the said Commissioners shall represent such opinion to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which such districts are proposed to be described; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division:"

And whereas by an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners, in the same manner and with the like consents as are required in case of division into ecclesiastical districts under the said hereinbefore recited Act, or the said Act now in recital, to assign a particular district to any chapel of ease or parochial chapel already existing, or to any chapel built, or which might thereafter be built or acquired under the powers of the said

former Act, or the said Act now in recital; and such district shall be under the immediate care of the curate appointed to serve such chapel, but subject, nevertheless, to the superintendence and controul of the incumbent of the parish church; and all such curates shall be nominated by the incumbent of the parish to the bishop for his licence, except where the right of nomination shall already be legally vested in any other person or persons, and in every such case by the person or persons possessing such right of nomination, subject to all the laws in force relating to stipendary curates, except as to the assigning of salaries to such curates; provided always, that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners, with the consent of the bishop of the diocese, to determine whether any and what part or proportion of the fees or dues for marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials shall be assigned to any such curate; and whether banns of marriage shall be published, and marriages or baptisms, churchings or burials, shall be solemnized or performed in any such chapel or not; and in any case in which marriages shall be allowed in any such chapel, the Commissioners shall cause the boundaries of the district assigned to such chapel to be enrolled in the High Court of Chancery, and in the office of the Registry of the diocese, any thing in the said recited Act to the contrary notwithstanding; and no such chapelry shall become a benefice by reason of any augmentation of the maintenance of the curate, by any grant or bounty under the provision of any Act or Acts of Parliament, or law or laws for augmenting small livings, any thing in such Act or Acts of Parliament, or law or laws, to the contrary notwithstanding:”

And whereas by another Act, passed in the seventh and eighth years of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled “An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;” and by another Act, made and passed in the first and second years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled “An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the seventh and eighth years of the reign of His late Majesty, intituled ‘An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;’” and also by another Act, made and passed in the second and third years of His said late Majesty, intituled “An Act to render more effectual an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled ‘An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;’” further provisions are made for carrying such divisions into effect:

And whereas the said Commissioners have made a representation to Her Majesty in Council, bearing date the thirteenth day of June one thousand eight hundred and forty-two, in the words following, viz.

“Your Majesty’s Commissioners for building new churches, appointed by virtue of an Act, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled “An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;” continued by an Act, passed in the seventh and eighth years of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled “An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;” and further continued by an Act, passed in the first year of your Majesty’s reign, intituled “An Act to prolong, for ten years, Her Majesty’s Commission for building new churches;” beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, when the last census was taken, the parish of Blackburn, in the county of Lancaster and diocese of Chester, contained a population of seventy-two thousand seven hundred and forty-nine persons; that besides the parish church, which affords accommodation to two thousand two hundred persons, there are the churches of the ancient parochial chapelries of Walton-le-Dale, Great Harwood, and Samesbury, and fourteen other consecrated chapels in the said parish, of which the chapel of St. Leonard, at Balderstone, will accommodate four hundred persons; St. James’s Church, Over Darwen, will accommodate five hundred persons; the chapel of St. Stephen, in the township of Tockholes, will accommodate eight hundred and fifty-six persons, including four hundred and ten free seats appropriated to the use of the poor; Langho Chapel, in the township of Billington, will accommodate four hundred persons; the chapel of St. John, in the town of Blackburn, will accommodate one thousand seven hundred persons, including five hundred free seats appropriated to the use of the poor; St. Peter’s Chapel, in the township of Salesbury, will accommodate six hundred persons, including three hundred free seats appropriated to the use of the poor; St. Paul’s Chapel, in the town of Blackburn, will accommodate eight hundred persons, including two hundred and twenty-eight free seats appropriated to the use of the poor; St. Peter’s Chapel, in the town of Blackburn, will accommodate two thousand persons, including one thousand two hundred free seats appropriated to the use of the poor; St. Mary’s Chapel, in the township of Mellor, will accommodate one thousand persons, including seven hundred free seats appropriated to the use of the poor; the Chapel of the Holy Trinity, in the township of Over Darwen, will accommodate one thousand six hundred and eight persons, including nine hundred and ninety-three free seats appropriated to the use of the poor; St. James’s Chapel, in the township of Lower Darwen, will accommodate one thousand one hundred and twenty-one persons, including eight hundred and ninety free seats appropriated to the use of the poor; Immanuel Church, at Feniscowles, in the township of Livesey, will accommodate four hundred and seventy-three persons, including two hundred and thirty-nine free seats appropriated to the use of the poor; St. Saviour’s Chapel, at

Bamber Bridge, in the township of Walton-le-Dale, will accommodate six hundred and fifty persons, including three hundred and fifty free seats appropriated to the use of the poor; and St. Mark's Chapel, in the township of Witton, will accommodate six hundred and sixty-nine persons, including three hundred and seventy free seats appropriated to the use of the poor:

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent to your Majesty, that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances attending this parish, it appears to them to be expedient, that particular districts should be assigned to the said several above-mentioned fourteen chapels, under the provisions of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and that such districts should be respectively named, "The Chapelry District of St. Leonard, Balderstone," "The Chapelry District of St. James, Over Darwen," "The Chapelry District of St. Stephen, Tockholes," "The Chapelry District of Langho, Billington," "The Chapelry District of St. John, Blackburn," "The Chapelry District of St. Peter, Salesbury," "The Chapelry District of St. Paul, Blackburn," "The Chapelry District of St. Peter, Blackburn," "The Chapelry District of St. Mary, Mellor," "The Chapelry District of the Holy Trinity, Over Darwen," "The Chapelry District of St. James, Lower Darwen," "The Chapelry District of Immanuel, Feniscowles," "The Chapelry District of St. Saviour, Bamber Bridge," "The Chapelry District of St. Mark's, Witton, with boundaries as follow:

"Saint Leonard, Balderstone.

"The chapelry district of St. Leonard, Balderstone, is to consist of and include the township of Balderstone, as the same is more particularly delineated in the map hereunto annexed, marked A, and thereon coloured vermillion.

"St. James, Over Darwen.

"The chapelry district of St. James, Over Darwen, is to consist of part of the township of Over Darwen, together with the whole of the townships of Eccleshill, Yate Bank, and Piccup Bank; the boundary thereof to commence at the north western extremity of the township of Eccleshill; and then proceeds in an easterly direction along the boundary which divides that township and the township of Yate Bank from the township of Lower Darwen, as far as the parish of Whalley; it then proceeds in a south easterly direction along the boundary which divides the said parish of Whalley and the parish of Bolton-le-Moor from the parish of Blackburn, as far as the Old Bury-road, at Grime Hills-bridge; when it proceeds northerly along the centre of that road as far as the township of Eccleshill; it then proceeds in a south

westerly direction down the centre of Toll-lane, to the end of March-house Occupation-road; when it proceeds in a north westerly direction along the centre of that road to the rivulet called Morrisbrook; it then follows the course of the said brook to the river Darwen; then in a north westerly direction along said river to the point where the boundary commenced, as the same is more particularly delineated in the map hereunto annexed, marked A, and thereon coloured lake.

"Saint Stephen, Tockholes.

"The chapelry district of St. Stephen, Tockholes, is to consist of the whole of the township of Tockholes and part of the townships of Livesey and Lower Darwen; the boundary thereof to commence on the Leeds and Liverpool Canal, at the division of the parishes of Leyland and Blackburn; and then proceeds in a north easterly direction along the centre of said canal to Broad-halgh-bridge, on the old high road from Preston to Darwen; then south easterly along the centre of said high road to the boundary which divides the townships of Livesey and Lower Darwen, at a place called Peark; it then proceeds in a north easterly direction along said boundary as far as the river Darwen; when proceeding in a south easterly direction along said river to the township of Eccleshill; then proceeding in a southerly and south westerly direction along the boundary which divides the townships of Eccleshill and Over Darwen from the townships of Lower Darwen and Tockholes, as far as the parish of Bolton-le-Moors; it then proceeds in a westerly and northerly direction along the boundary which divides the parishes of Bolton-le-Moors and Leyland from the parish of Blackburn, to the point where the boundary commenced, as the same is more particularly delineated in the map hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured yellow.

"Langho, Billington.

"The chapelry district of Langho, Billington, is to consist of and comprise the whole of the township of Billington, as the same is more particularly delineated on the map hereunto annexed, marked A, and thereon coloured burnt sienna.

"Saint John, Blackburn.

"The chapelry district of Saint John, Blackburn, is to consist of part of the township of Blackburn; the boundary thereof to commence at Seven Acrebrook, on the high road at the extremity of the township of Blackburn; and then proceeds in an easterly direction along the boundary which divides the said township from the township of Ramsgreave; then southerly along the boundary which divides the townships of Blackburn and Little Harwood, as far as the Blackburn and Whalley turnpike road near Carr's-cottages; it then proceeds in a southerly direction along the centre of said road to Derekin's-bridge, which crosses the river Blackwater; then westerly, pursuing its course down said river as far as Brookhouse-lane; when it proceeds in a south easterly

direction up the centre of said lane to the Blackburn and Whalley turnpike road; then in a south westerly direction along the centre of said road and Penny-street, as far as Old Chapel-street; and in a north westerly direction along the said street to the river Blackwater at Union-bridge; when it proceeds in a southerly direction down the said river to the end of Fisher-street; it then proceeds in a westerly direction along the centre of said street and Cort-street; then across the intended new market-place to and along the centre of a new street (not named) which enters North-gate, opposite Blakeley-moor-road; and then in a southerly direction down the centre of North-gate to Astley-gate; and in a westerly direction along the centre of Astley-gate to the end of Fish-lane; when it proceeds in a north westerly direction along the centre of said lane to Blakeley-moor; then in a northerly direction, crossing said moor in a direct imaginary line, to the end of Queen-street; then in an easterly direction up the centre of said street to North-gate; when it proceeds in a northerly direction up the centre of North-gate to and along the centre of the high road by Shear-brow and Four-lane-ends, till it terminates at Seven Acre-brook, where the boundary commenced, as the same is more particularly delineated in the map hereunto annexed, marked B, and thereon coloured blue.

“ Saint Peter, Salesbury.

“ The chapelry district of Saint Peter, Salesbury, is to consist of and comprise the whole of the townships of Salesbury, Wilpshire, Osbaldestone, Clayton-le-Dale, and Dinkley, as the same is more particularly delineated in the map hereunto annexed, marked A, and thereon coloured light blue.

“ Saint Paul, Blackburn.

“ The chapelry district of Saint Paul, Blackburn, is to consist of part of the township of Blackburn; the boundary thereof to commence at Seven Acre-brook, on the high road at the extremity of the township of Blackburn; and then proceeds in a southerly direction along the centre of said road, by Four-lane-ends and Shear-brow, to and along the centre of North-gate to the end of Queen-street; when it proceeds in a westerly direction down the centre of said street to Blakeley-moor; when it proceeds in a southerly direction across said moor, in a direct imaginary line, to the end of and along the centre of Fish-lane, to a point where the continuation of Victoria-street will come to; then in a westerly direction along said continuation and the centre of Victoria-street, crossing Montague-street, to and along the centre of Adelaide-street and George-street West, as far as the river Blackwater; when it proceeds in a northerly and westerly direction down the course of said river to the end of Throstle-street; then northerly, in a direct imaginary line (produced through the centre of each end of said street), to the Blackburn and Preston turnpike road, excluding Fox-house; it then proceeds in a north westerly direction along the centre of said road as far as the

township of Mellor; when it proceeds in a north easterly direction along the boundary which divides the said township from the township of Blackburn to Seven Acre-brook, where the boundary commenced, as the same is more particularly delineated in the map hereunto annexed, marked B, and thereon coloured light brown.

“ Saint Peter, Blackburn.

“ The chapelry district of Saint Peter, Blackburn, is to consist of part of the township of Blackburn; the boundary thereof to commence from a point where the townships of Livesey, Witton, and Blackburn meet; and then proceeds in a northerly direction along the boundary which divides the two last-named townships, to the Preston and Blackburn turnpike road; then in an easterly direction along the centre of said turnpike road as far as the end of Throstle-street; then proceeding northerly down the centre of said street to the river Blackwater; and then in an easterly and southerly direction up the course of said river to the end of George-street West; when it proceeds in an easterly direction along the centre of said street and Adelaide-street, and crossing Montague-street, it proceeds along the centre of Victoria-street, and the continuation of said street to Fish-lane; it then proceeds in a south easterly direction along the centre of said lane to Astley-gate; and then proceeding southerly along the centre of Astley-gate to and along the centre of Back-lane, as far as Mill-lane, and easterly along the centre of said lane to Darwen-street; then proceeding in a southerly direction along the centre of said street, as far as the river Blackwater; it then proceeds in a westerly direction down the course of said river as far as the easterly corner of Wrangling; then westerly to the south west corner of Wrangling; it then proceeds, in a direct imaginary line, to the point on the river Darwen where the boundary commenced, as the same is more particularly delineated in the map hereunto annexed, marked B, and thereon coloured green.

“ Saint Mary, Mellor.

“ The chapelry district of Saint Mary, Mellor, is to consist of and comprise the whole of the townships of Mellor and Ramsgreave, as the same is more particularly delineated in the map hereunto annexed, marked A, and thereon coloured light green.

“ The Holy Trinity, Over Darwen.

“ The chapelry district of the Holy Trinity, Over Darwen, is to consist of the remaining part of the township of Over Darwen (as is not assigned to Saint James's Chapel); the boundary thereof to commence at the division of the parishes of Bolton-le-Moors and Blackburn, at Grime-hills-bridge, on the old Bury road; and then proceeds in a northerly direction along the centre of that road as far as the township of Eccleshill; it then proceeds in a south westerly direction down the centre of Poll-lane to the end of March-house, Occupation-road; when it proceeds in a north westerly direction along the centre of that road to

the rivulet called Morris-brook; it then follows the course of said brook to the river Darwen; then in a north westerly direction along said river as far as the township of Lower Darwen, at Dob-hole-bridge; when it proceeds in a westerly and southerly direction along the boundary which divides the townships of Lower Darwen and Tockholes from the township of Over Darwen, as far as the parish of Bolton-le-Moors; when it proceeds in a southerly and easterly direction along the boundary between that parish and the parish of Blackburn to Grime-hills-bridge, where the boundary commenced, as the same is more particularly delineated in the map hereunto annexed, marked A, and thereon coloured purple.

“ Saint James, Lower Darwen.
