

said parishes of Middleton and Bury, which lie contiguous to each other, at Birch, and are delineated in the accompanying plan, contain an estimated population of two thousand eight hundred and seventy persons :

“ Your Majesty’s said Commissioners beg leave further to represent to your Majesty, that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances above mentioned, it appears to them to be expedient, that to unite and consolidate the said contiguous parts of the said parishes of Middleton and Bury into a separate and distinct district, to be assigned to the said chapel for all ecclesiastical purposes, and to constitute such district a consolidated chapelry, under the sixth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled “ An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes,” for the purpose of affording accommodation for attending divine service to the persons residing in the said district, and for enabling the spiritual person serving such chapel to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the said district attached to such chapel, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendence of such district, and the preservation and improvement of the moral habits of the persons residing therein ; and that such district should be named “ The Consolidated Chapelry District of St. Mary, Birch ;” and that the boundaries thereof should be as follow :

“ The boundary to commence at the point marked A on the map, where the township of Middleton joins the township of Heap, in the parish of Bury, and of Little Heaton, in the parish of Prestwich ; it then proceeds along the boundary which divides the said two last-mentioned townships, which also divides the township of Heap from the township of Unsworth, in the parish of Prestwich, in a westerly direction, until the said townships of Heap and Unsworth join the township of Pilsworth, in the parish of Middleton, when it proceeds, in a northerly and north easterly direction, along the boundary line that divides the township of Heap and Hopwood from the said township of Pilsworth, until the townships of Hopwood and Pilsworth again meet the township of Heap, in that district of it called Heywood ; when it proceeds, in an easterly direction, along the boundary of the parishes of Bury, Rochdale, and Middleton, as far as the township of Thornham, in the latter parish ; it then proceeds, south, along the boundary between the townships of Thornham and Hopwood to where those townships join the township of Middleton ; when it proceeds, in a westerly direction, along the boundary of the townships of Hopwood and Middleton, as far as the north western boundary of the glebe land, at the back of Heber’s and Heber’s house ; and then follows, in a south and south westerly direction, the western and north western boundary of the said glebe lands, as far as Middleton-wood ; from whence it proceeds, in a westerly direction, to the Occupation Field road from Middleton to

Bowlee ; entering which, at the Higher Barn, it proceeds along its centre, as far as Park-side Farm ; including which farm and the farm called Crolledges, it proceeds, in a south westerly direction, to the point where the Manchester and Heywood road enters the township of Great Heaton ; whence it proceeds, in a north westerly direction, along the boundary of the townships of Middleton and Great and Little Heaton, to the point marked A, where the boundary commenced, as is shewn on the map, and therein tinted blue and yellow :

“ That the consent of the Lord Bishop of Chester has been obtained thereto, as required by the above-mentioned section of the said Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third ; and, in testimony of such his approbation, the said Lord Bishop of Chester has signed and sealed this present instrument :

“ Your Majesty’s said Commissioners beg leave, therefore, to lay before your Majesty the above-stated circumstances, and humbly to pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereof as to your Majesty’s royal wisdom shall seem meet.”

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the map thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed consolidation and assignment be accordingly made and effected, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts.

All such Air Tubes, Handcuffs, Bazzels, Rivets for Bazzels, Padlocks, Stakes fitted to Oak Blocks, and Smith’s Hand Hammers, as shall, from time to time, be demanded, and for repairing Air Tubes, Handcuffs, and Bazzels, under a contract for twelve months certain, and further until the expiration of three months’ warning.
