By the King's most Excellent Majesty,

And the Lords of His Majesties most Honourable
Privy-Council,

His Majesty minding to secure all his Loving Subjects, in Travelling, and going about their Lawful Occasions. Is this Day in Council pleased to Order, and it is hereby Ordered; That all His Majesties Officers of Justice, and others his Loving Subjects, do use their utmost diligence, and endeavor, for the Apprehending all Robbers, and Highway men, to the end they may be proceeded against according to Law; And for the Encouragement of such as shall Apprehend any such Offender, or Offenders. It is further Ordered by His Majesty, That such Person, or Persons, who shall at any Time from the Day of the Date hereof, till the 20th of March, which shall be in the Year of our Lord God 1685, and after that Day till His Majesty shall please to recal this Order, either by Proclamation, or His Order in Council, apprehend any Robber, or Highway-man, and cause him to be brought into Custody, shall within Fifteen Days after his Conviction, have a reward of Ten Pounds for every such Offender, so Apprehended, and Convicted, and all and every Sheriffs, and Sheriff of the respective Counties, and Sheriffs-wicks, where such Conviction shall be had, are and is hereby required upon the Certificate of the Judge, or Two, or more Justices of the Peace, before whom such Person, or Persons, shall be Convicted, of such Apprehension, and Conviction, to pay unto the Person, or Persons, who shall Apprehend such Offender, or Offenders, the Reward aforesaid, within the Time aforesaid, for each and every Offender, so Apprehended and Convicted as aforesaid; Out of His Majesties Monies, received by such Sheriff, or Sheriffs in that County where such Conviction shall be, which shall be allowed unto him, or them upon his or their Accounts in the Exchequer; and the Right Honourable the Lord High Treasurer of England, is hereby Authorized, and Empowered to give such Warrants to the Officers, and others concerned in the Exchequer, to give allowance thereof accordingly. And it is also further Ordered, that all Lieutenants, Deputy Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Sheriffs, Bayliffs, and other Officers, and Persons whatsoever, do take notice thereof, and give due Obedience accordingly. And all hearing and assisting in all things, tending to the Execution thereof, as they tender His Majesties Displeasure, and upon pain of being proceeded against as Contemners of His Majesties Royal Authority.

Dear Sovereign,

WE your Majesties most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects (as we do heartily Grieve the Death of His late Majesty of blessed Memory) do we do unfeignedly Congratulate your Majesties happy Establishment in the Throne of your Royal Ancestors. And present unto your Majesty our most humble and hearty Thanks for your Gracious Declaration; Assuring your Majesty that for the Preservation of your Sacred Person, and your Royal Prerogatives, we shall readily and heartily expose (both by Sea and Land) our Lives and what we else is dear unto us.

And continually Pray for your long and Prosperous Reign.

There have been likewise presented to his Majesty very Loyal Addresses from the Lord Lieutenant, High Sheriff, Deputy Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, and Grand Jury of the County of *Suffex*, at the Assizes held at *Eastgrinsted* the 16 of *March*, 1684. From the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, Gentlemen, Burgesses, and other Inhabitants of the Town and County of the Town of *Nottingham*. From the Grand Jury, the Deputy Lieutenants, and Justices of the Peace, with other Gentlemen met at the Assizes held at *Mommsouth* the 12th of *March* 1684. From the High Sheriff and Grand Jury for the County of *Gloucester*, together with the Bishop, Clergy, and Gentry of the said County at the Assizes held the 7th of *March*, 1684. From the Gentlemen and other the Inhabitants of *Chirencester* in the County of *Gloucester*. From the Mayor, Bayliffs and Burgesses, and other the Inhabitants of the Corporation of *Pembroke*. From the Mayor, Aldermen, and Capital Burgesses, with other Inhabitants of the Burrough of *Axbridge* in the County of *Somerset*. From the Mayor, Recorder, Justices, Common Council, and Inhabitants of the Burrough and Parish of *Southmolton* in the County of *Devon*, presented to his Majesty by his Grace the Duke of *Albemarle*; all which his Majesty received very Graciously.

The Addresses from the Counties of *Gloucester* and *Mommsouth*, and from the Towns of *Pembroke* and *Chirencester*, as likewise that from the County of *Carmarthen* Published in our last, were Presented to his Majesty by his Grace the Duke of *Beaufort*.

And humble and very Loyal Address from the Lord Lieutenant, the High Sheriff, the Deputy Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, and the Grand Jury for the County of *Lincoln*. And another from the Mayor, Recorder, Deputy Recorder, Aldermen, Common Council, Burgesses, and Inhabitants of the Burrough of *Grantham* in the County of *Lincoln*, have been Presented to his Majesty, the first by Sir *John Brotherton* Baronet, Sir *William Buck* Baronet; Sir

Thomas Bernadison Baronet, Sir *Edward Hughey* Baronet, and Sir *Henry Heron* Knight of the Bath; and the latter by *John Thorold* and *Robert Fisher* Esqs; being both introduced by the Right Honorable the Lord Great Chamberlain of *England*, which his Majesty received very Graciously.

Vienna, March 4. The Letters from *Hungary* tell us, That Colonel *Hessler* having received advice that 2000 *Turks* and 400 *Janitaries* were marching with 20 Wagons laden with Ammunition and *Browlings* to *Newwauis*, he thereupon marched towards them, and meeting the *Enemy* near *Vaccia* charged them with that success that he put them to flight and took the said Wagons, which he caused to be burnt; and then marched to *Vaccia* and possessed himself of that place, putting the whole *Garison* to the sword, and setting fire to the *Magazines* they had provided there. After which Colonel *Hessler* understanding that 300 *Janitaries* commanded by a *Bassa*, were returned with 300 Wagons drawn each with six Oxen into a small Fort, he marched thither and forced the said Fort, most of the *Turks* being killed and the rest with the *Bassa* taken Prisoners, whom he sent with the Provisions he found there to *Lewearz*; In these actions 60 of the *Christians* were killed and 30 wounded. We have likewise had account that the *Marquis Doria* and the *Baron de Soyres*, having passed the River *Tisza* with a Detachment of the Troops of *Bavaria* and 100 *Habs* of the Regiment of *Caraffa*, met near *Rolpa* 500 *Hungarian* Horse whom they entirely defeated, killing 400 upon the place, and taking 28 Prisoners with eight Standards and a very considerable Booty. But at the same time they write from *Upper-Hungary* that the *Rebels* have taken the *Castle* of *Jolt* and put the *Garison* that was there to the sword. *Signior Morosini*, Ambassador from the Republick of *Venice* to the King of *Poland*, parted from hence on the second Instant in his return home.

Vienna, March 11. The *Turkish* Prisoners taken at *Vaccia* report that the *Garison* of *Buda* is extremely weakened as well by desertion as Sickness, and that *Seysan Bassa* who Commanded there, being taken ill had been carried to *Erla*, where he Died few Days after. The *Turks* are preparing another great Convoy at *Novigrad* for the relief of *Newwauis*; But care is taken to reinforce Colonel *Hessler* that he may be able to oppose them. They Write from *Croatia* that the *Christians* have defeated 4000 *Turks*, belonging to *Casilla*, who were abroad ravaging the Country; And that the *Garilons* of *Virowitza*, and *Salamar*, had made incursions into the *Turkish* Territories, and were returned with a great deal of booty. An *Envoy* is arrived here from the Prince of *Transylvania*. The Elector of *Bavaria* is expected here at *Easter*.

Brussels, March 20. The Prince de *Salme* is very suddenly expected here from *Germany*; He has a Commission to raise two Regiments for the Emperors Service. They Write from *Leige* that the Bishop of *Strasbourg*, having settled the Affairs of that City, intended to part from thence in few days for *France*. We are told from the *New Conquests* that the *French* will Encamp their Troops in four several Bodies this Summer.

Brussels, March 27. The Abbot of *St. Michael* and Count *Erps* (the Hostages of this Province for the payment of their Contributions) having on the 20th Instant received a Summons from the French Intendant at *Mabeuge* to repair forthwith thither, they accordingly parted from hence the next Morning; We have not heard from them since, nor can we imagine the reason of their being sent for, unless it be that the *French* have a mind to have the last payment of the Contributions advanced, which will not be due till the end of the next Month.

Hague, March 27. The States of *Holland* are not yet come to any determination concerning the State of the War for this present Year. *Amsterdam* still insists to have the Troops reduced to 30000 Men, but the other Towns are of different Opinions in this matter, except seven, who, with the Nobles, approve

approve of the State of the War, as it was drawn up by the Council of State. The Heer Van Duyvenvoorden and the Heer Dyckvelt Extraordinary Ambassadors from this State will part from hence to-morrow or next Day for England. The Letters from Vienna of the 15th Instant give an account that Colonel Heusler understanding that 8000 Turks, Tartars, and Hungarians, were on their March from Novigrad to put a Convoy of 1000 Wagons into Newbusek, he resolved to oppose them though he had only with him 2000 Men; and that accordingly marching towards the Enemy, he had attacked their Van-guard, and had defeated them, killing between 3 and 400 upon the place, and taking a great many Prisoners, upon which the main Body of the Turks who were with the Wagons retired in great haste and disorder towards Novigrad, Colonel Heusler not thinking fit to pursue them with the small body he had with him.

Paris, March 28. The Princes of Conti and de la Roche Sur Ton parted from hence on Saturday last for Poland, intending to pass the Campagne in the Army of that Crown. A Squadron of Men of War is fitting out at Thouton, designed, as is said, against the Tripolins.

Deal, March 19. The Ships in the Downs outward Bound sailed this Morning, the Wind at E. N. E.
