

Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;' further provisions are made for carrying such divisions into effect:

And whereas the said Commissioners have made a representation to Her Majesty in Council, bearing date the thirty-first day of March one thousand eight hundred and forty-three, in the words following, viz.

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches, appointed by virtue of an Act, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" continued by an Act, passed in the seventh and eighth years of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and further continued by an Act, passed in the first year of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to prolong, for ten years, Her Majesty's Commission for building new churches;" beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, when the last census was taken, the parish of Dawley, in the county of Salop and diocese of Lichfield, contained a population of eight thousand six hundred and forty-one persons:

"That, besides the parish church, which affords accommodation to three hundred and twenty-eight persons, there is one consecrated chapel at Malins Lee, which affords accommodation to seven hundred and ninety-five persons, including five hundred and forty-two free seats appropriated to the use of the poor:

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent to your Majesty, that, having taken all the circumstances attending this parish into consideration, it appears to them to be expedient, that a particular district should be assigned to the said chapel at Malins Lee, under the provisions of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and that such district should be named, "The Chapelry District of Malins Lee," and consist of the township of Malins Lee and part of the township of Dawley Magna, with boundaries as follow:

"The boundary commences at the road leading from Ketley and Lawley-bank to Dawley-bank, and proceeds in a north easterly, easterly, and southerly direction along the boundary line which separates the parish of Dawley Magna from the several parishes of Wellington, Shifnal, and Stinchley to the point where the last-mentioned parish meets the boundary line dividing the townships of Malins Lee and Dawley Magna; it then proceeds in a

westerly direction along the boundary line which separates the said last-mentioned townships to the centre of the road leading from the Hinkshay Farm to Malins Lee; from this point it then proceeds in a north westerly direction in a straight line across Langley-field Farm to the centre of the road leading from Dawley-green to Dawley-bank, at its junction with the turnpike road from Wellington to Bridgnorth; and then proceeds forty yards up the centre of the said turnpike road in a north westerly direction, when it takes a northerly and north westerly direction at the distance of forty yards from the westerly and southerly sides of the said road leading from Dawley-green to Dawley-bank, until it reaches the boundary line separating the parishes of Wellington and Dawley; and from thence along the said boundary line in an easterly direction until it meets the point where the boundary commenced, as the same is more particularly delineated on the map hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured green:

"That marriages, churchings, baptisms, and burials should be solemnized and performed in the said chapel; and that the fees arising therefrom should be received by and belong to the Minister thereof:

"That the consent of the Lord Bishop of Lichfield has been obtained thereto, as required by the above-mentioned section of the said Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third; in testimony whereof the said Lord Bishop has signed and sealed this present instrument:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners, therefore, beg leave to lay before your Majesty the before-mentioned circumstances, and humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom may seem meet."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the map therunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment be accordingly made, and the recommendations of the said Commissioners, in respect of the solemnization of marriages, churchings, baptisms, and burials, and the fees arising therefrom, be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts.
