close to Fockbury Mill-pond; from which Millpond the boundary proceeds up the course of the brook to a certain point in a meadow called Martin's Meadow, belonging to John Knight, Esq. where there is a public footpath which commences near to the Crown Inn, Catshill; and passes over the said brook on to the land of the said John Knight, and terminates in the Bromsgrove and Birmingham turnpike road, about fifty yards from the junction of the old and new roads; the boundary then proceeds from the above-named point along the said footpath to its termination as above stated; then along the middle of the Birmingham road to the end of the Old Birmingham road; along the middle of the Old Birmingham road to the end of Linehouse-lane; along the middle of Linehouse-lane to the end of Brookhouse-lane; along the middle of Brookhouse-lane to the end of Green otherwise Stony Hill-lane; along the middle of Green otherwise Stony Hill-lane into Twatling-street; across Twatling-street into the Shrubbery-lane; up the middle of the Shrubberylane to the end of the Warren-lane; down the middle of the Warren-lane to the point where the parishes of Bromsgrove and Coston Hacket meet; it then proceeds in a northerly direction along the boundary line which separates the parish of Bromsgrove from the parishes of Coston Hacket, King's Norton, and Frankley, to the point where the latter parish joins the parish of Hale's Owen; it then proceeds in a southerly and south westerly direction along the boundary line which separates the said parish of Bromsgrove from the parishes of Hale's Owen and Belbroughton, as far as Warbage-lane, where the boundary commenced, as shewn by the plan, and thereon coloured pink:

- " That baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized and performed in the said chapel; and that the fees arising therefrom should be received by and belong to the Minister of the said chapel:
- " That the consent of the Lord Bishop of Worcester has been obtained thereto, as required by the above-mentioned section of the said Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third; in testimony whereof, the said Lord Bishop has signed and sealed this present instrument:
- "Your Majesty's Commissioners, therefore, beg leave to lay before your Majesty the beforementioned circumstances, and humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that

the recommendations of the said Commissioners, the solemnization of bapin respect of tisms, churchings, and burials, and the fees arising therefrom, be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts.
