

thence southward, along the middle of Shepherd-street, to Syke-hill, and proceeds along the middle of Syke-hill and Avenham-lane (including all the houses on the east and south sides thereof), to opposite the end of Frenchwood-street, where the boundary commenced, as shewn by the map, and thereon coloured green :

Saint George's District.

"The boundary commences in the middle of Fishergate, opposite the middle of Cheapside, and extending along the middle of Cheapside, north westward, down the middle of Friargate, to opposite the middle of Bridge-street; westward, down the middle of Bridge-street, to the middle of the canal; from thence southward, along the middle of the canal, to opposite the dry dock and the canal branch; from thence, in a south westerly direction, to the middle of the railway at the back of the houses on the south side of Dock-street; and from thence southward, along the middle of the railway, to the middle of Fishergate; and from thence eastward, along the middle of Fishergate, to opposite the middle of Cheapside, where the boundary commenced, as shewn by the map, and thereon coloured brown :

Holy Trinity District.

"The boundary commences in the middle of Lord-street, and proceeds in a northerly direction along the middle of Lancaster-street, to the turn in the Ormskirk-road; from whence it continues in the same northwardly direction across High-street, and along the middle of Lancaster-road, to the middle of Upper Walker-street; from thence, in a westerly direction, along the middle of Upper Walker-street, and Walker-street, to the middle of Friargate; and from thence, in a south easterly direction, along the middle of Friargate, to opposite the middle of Anchor Weind; and from thence, in a northerly direction, along the middle of Anchor Weind, to the middle of Lord-street; and from thence, in an easterly direction, along the middle of Lord-street, to opposite the middle of Lancaster-street, where the boundary commences, as shewn by the map, and thereon coloured yellow :

"That baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized and performed in all the above-mentioned chapels; and that the fees arising therefrom should be received by and belong to the respective Ministers of the said chapels :

"That the consent of the Lord Bishop of Chester has been obtained thereto, as required by the above-mentioned section of the said Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third; in testimony whereof, the said Lord Bishop has signed and sealed this present instrument :

"Your Majesty's Commissioners, therefore, beg leave to lay before your Majesty the before-mentioned circumstances, and humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the map thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment be accordingly made, and the recommendations of the said Commissioners, in respect of the solemnization of churchings, baptisms, and burials, and the fees arising therefrom, be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts.
