The Doge was accompanied with a great many Noble Genouches, and attended by 12 Pages and 60 Footmen in very rich Liveries, being himself in a Robe of Crimson Velvet, with a square Cap of the same colour, and the Senators in black Velvet Gowns. They alighted at the apartment of Ambassadors, and having rested there some time, were conducted cross the Court (the Guards not being in Arms as is usual at the Audience of Ambassadors) On the great Stairs the 100 Swiflers were ranged on each side, and in the Guard-Chamber the Guards du Corps, the Duke de Duras their Captain received the Doge at the Door and conducted him into the Gallery, where the King was seated on his Throne, attended by the Dauphin, the Duke of Orleans, and most of the Princes of the Blood. The Doge and Senators made low Reverences to the King, who then stood up and took off his Hatt and afterwards put it on again. The Doge likewise put on his Cap, and made his Speech (which was in submissive Terms) covered, the King standing and all the Princes being likewise covered but the four Senators bare; The King answered the Doge very obligingly; And then the Senators made severally their Compliments to his Majesty. After which the Doge and Senators were reconducted to the Apartment of Ambassadors, where they were entertained at Dinner and served by the Kings Officers. In the afternoon they had Audience of the Dauphin, Dauphiness, the Duke of Burgundy, the Duke d'Anjou, of the Duke and Dutchess of Orleans, and the rest of the Royal Family, and in the Evening were brought back to Paris by the Introduc-tor of Ambassadors in the same manner they went. Manchester, April 23. This being the happy day of their Majesties Royal Coronation, was observed with all imaginable expressions of Joy and Duty; In the morning the Lord of the Mannor, who in the stewards room carried the White Staff, went with the Officers of the Town to Church to Prayers, where they had also a Loyal Sermon preached by the Warden of the Colledge, from whence they came accompanied with all the Burgeses, and a numerous company of Halbardeers, and all the Neighbouring Gentry of Quality to the Conduit which ran with Wine, where they all drank the Kings Health and the Royal Families with great acclamations and a Volly of Shot, Drums, Trumpets and Musick playing; after which the Gentry were entertained at Dinner at the charge of the Town, and the Evening concluded with Bonfires, Fireworks, ringing of Bells and all other demonstrations of Joy.

Norwich, April 23. This day the Mayor with all the Magistrates of this City in their Scarlet Gowns and Formalities, accompanied with great numbers of the Inhabitants went from the New-Hall to the Cathedral Church (where after Divine service they heard a Sermon suitable to the occasion) and expressed all imaginable Joy, the great Guns being several times fired, their Majesties Healths drank

upon their Knees, concluding with Bonfires, and ringing of Bells, with all testimonies of Joy and true Loyalty.

Whitehall, May 11. This day a very Loyal Address was presented to His Majesty by the Lord Bishop of Litchfield and Coventry, Subscribed by his Lordship, the Dean, Canons, Priebendaries, Arch-Deacons and Clergy of the said Diocess, which His Majesty received very graciously.
