Dunluce in the North of Ireland, May 18.

His day about Eleven of the Clock in the Forenoon arrived a small Boat at Ballentoy which came from IIa in the Kingsom of Scotland, having 8 men on Board, the Waiter according to his Orders. in the prefence of feveral Gentlemen, difarmed them, and enquired whence they came, they answered they came to this Kingdom for safety, Argile and Sir Fohn Cockram having Landed in the faid Ila, having five Ships laden with men and Ammunition, the men as they heard being about five hundred ; one of the Paffengers named Frizal, faw Argile and Cockram with another old Gentleman whole name was not known to him, and fays that he knew Argyle very well, and faw him Dine at a place called Killer in Ila, and that the faid Argyle enquired what News, and if the Army was still there, the faid Frizal fanfwered, that the Army (meaning the Kings Army) were gone to Kintire . a little while b.fore he Landed, and that they confilted of about 500 men under the Command of one Ballyachyan; And farther fays that the faid Argyle fent for the Bayliff of Ila and asked him if he would Rife with him ; the Bayliff answered he was Sworn to be true to the King; Argyle reped that he might rife with him and keep his Oath too; for it was not yet well known who is King; but the Bayliff denying to comply with Argyle, withdrew himfelf and fled the Country and feveral other Gentlemen , the faid Frizal and the Waiter of Ila, heard Argyle Swear that he would Burn the Bayliffs House that night, and every one in the Country that would not tile with him he would Hang at their own doors; So fays all the reft of the men that fled for their Lives, and that *Argyle* commanded a Crossary to be disparcht through the whole Country, which is a fign in a fiery tlick, commanding and warning every man to rife in Arms with him. The faid men told that feveral other fmall Boats were making ready to make their escape, and before the writing hercof one L'oat was seen coming to Ballentoy; the Waiter that cyme from Ila is a diferent Person; Ila is within 4 hours Sailing to Dunluce

Genoua, May 6. We have an account from Legiorne, that four Galleys are fitting out there, which the Great Duke intends to fend to the Lewant with the Pope's Galleys to joyn the Venetian Fleet. They write from Milan, that the Count de Melgar their Governor has put the Troops of th t Country into a very good pofture, and that it's believed (one of them will be fent to the athiftance of the Emperor.

Venice, May 4. The Troops of Lunenbuag arc most of them Embarked, and will Sail in two or three days to joyn the Fleet. We have advice that Jooo new railed men are arrived at Bergamo, and that feveral Companies of new railed Dragoons are daily expected there. The last Letters from Dalmatia gave an account that the Providitore Gemeral Valier was retired to Sebenico, where he ex-

pected several Troops to joyn him, after which he would enter upon some new Action. We have advice that the Government of Tripolip have fitted ' out 6 meh of War to joyn the Turksh Fleet." Signior Delfino is gone with 10 men of War towards the Levant to hinder the Tu ks from transporting their Troops from Afta; and the whole Fleet commanded by Captain General Morofins will Sail from Gorfa about the middle of this month.

Dantzicke, May 20. The Letters from Warfam of the 11th Inflant give an account that the Dyet was still affembled; That they had taken into confideration feveral matters relating to the War against the Turks, and had made fo good a Progress therein, that it was hoped they would in few days b.i.g. them to a conclusion. They write from Leopol of of the 3d of this month, that there was fo great a scarcity of Provisions at Caminiec, that the I difa had, put the Jews and all those that were not provided with Victuals for their own fubfiftance out of the place; That the Tartars which were in Gatilon there, being firengthned with a Party of Turks, had made an Incursion as far as Radzenoaro, and bal Sacked that place, and feveral other Vlifages, and were returned to Caminee with a great Bobry and di-vers Prifoners; That this Succels had encouraged them to make an oth r incursion on Easter Pve towards, Barre and Miele bis, but that the Coffacks that are quartered on that had having notice of it, got to-gether, fell upon them and put them to flight, and releafed a great many Chriftian Slaves.

Vienna, May 17. This Week a tryal was made of feveral Great Guns, Mortars and Bombs of a new Invention, which fucceeded all very well, to the great Credit of the Inventor. The preparations tor the opening the Campagne are making with all poffible diligence; The Imperial Troops quartered in the Hereditary Countries are on their march, and the Auxiliary Troops of Lunghburgh will in two or three days begin theirs, to the General Rendezvous. which is appointed to be between Gran and Newbeusel. In the mean time Colonel Heufler continues encamped with the Body under his Command near Barkan to observe the Enemy, who it's faid a e on their march to attempt the relief of Newbeusel; The Garifon whereof is now reduced to that necessity that they are forced to eat Horfe-Fleih; and have fent out of the Town 130 Christian Prifoners, not having wherewithal to feed them. The Troops, not having wherewithal to feed them. The Troops commanded by General *schultz* in Upper Hungary are drawing together; He has, we are told, orders to attack the Caffle of Hungwar, and afterward to Befiege Esperies and Cassary; Thole in Croatia which are to be under the Orders of General Staremberg are likewife taking the Field. The laft Letter's from and give in the prost that the Duet will after all Poland give us great hopes that the Dyer will after all have a very good conclution,

Hamburgh, May 10. The differences between the Duke of Zell and this City are not yet compofed, but the negotiation is in fuch a State, that there is no reafon to doubt the good fuccels of it. We have an account from Berlin that the Baron de Freytag ²Ag the Emp to \le Ministeriat that Court does follicite a Succor of 7 or soco men against the Turks, and that he has great hopes of obtaining it. They write from Denmark that the Courts de Royo Mareschul de Camp General of the King of Denmarks Forces was returned thicker from France.

Hamburgh, May 29. The Letters from Copenbagen of the 25th Inflant tell us, that the King of Denmark would in few days begin his Journey fo Helftein, and that his Majelly intends to go from They write from Siockholme thence for *Futland* that the King of Sueden will affift the Empsay with 6000 men against the Jurks. The Letters from Warfaw of the roth inftant fay the Dyer had been again prolonged for feveral days; That they had refolved to projecute the War against the Lurks with all possible vigor; and that they were confidering of the belt ways of railing a fond for that purpole; These Letters add that the Tartars had made an Incursion into the Country of Baar, and had plundered and burnt a great many Villages,

Ratisbonne, May 24. The Bilhop of Paffam the Emperors Principal Commissioner at the Dyet is expected here the next week; and the Count de Papenbeim Mareichal of the Empire is come hither on purpole to affist at his publick Reception. The Letters from Hungary tell us that the Troops begin to march to their general Rendezvous: That Colonel Heuslier does very narrowly observe the Enemy to hinder their defign of relieving Newbeusel, which all our advices affure us is in great diffres. We have no very good account of the Enemies preparations for this Campagne; but are told in general, that they will have an Army of 70000 men in Hungary this Summer, which will be commanded by the late Baffa of Buda who is in great credit with the Grand Signior for the flout defence he made the laft year of that place.',

Franckfort, M4y 27. This afternoon arrived here an Express with the News of the Death of the Elector Palatin, who dyed at *Pydelbergb* yelterday about three in the morning. The Letters from Vienna tell us that the Imperial Troops are marching to the general Rendezvous; and that they will certainly begin the Campagne with the Siege of Newbeylel, which place it's faid is, reduced to that condition, that it cannot make any considerable defence. That the Duke of Lorrain was expected back from Infprucke the 25th of this Month, and that he would flay but a few days at Vienna after his return, intending to haften to the Army. The marriage between the Elector of Bavaria and the Archdutchefs will be celebrated the 12th of the next month.

Bruffels, May 25. The Marquis de Grana is now with the whole Court at Marimont, where they will flay till towards the end of the next month. The Letters from Leige tell us, that the Elector of Cologne's Troops which were quartered in that Country are on their march through the Province of Limburgh towards Hungary. The Letters from Vienna give an account that the Imperial Troops are marching to the General Rendezvous, which is appointed to be held the first of the next month not far from Nembeulel.

Hague Fune 1. The States of Holland are fill Aifembled, but it's believed will adjourn to morrow. The Heer Van Dieft Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Brandenburgh is arrived here, and has received the Vilits of all the Foreign Miniflers. The Letters from Franckfort of the 28th paft, give an account that an Express paffed through that City the 26th, who was going to Denmark with the news of the Death of the Elector Palatine. We have advice that the Troops of the Bilhoprick of Munfterbeing about about 5000 men, part of those the

Elector of Cologne lends to the Emperors affiliance, are come to Hanau in their march for Hungary.

Paris. May 30. The Deputies of the Clergy met yefterday at St. Germains, but they will not enter upon bufinefs yet in fome days. The Contract of arriage between the Duke de Bourbon the Prince of Conde's Grandfon and Madamoifelle de Numer o Signd; It's faid the King gives her 2 Millions of Livres, and a yearly Penfion of 50 thouland Crowns. By the laft Lett ers from the Princes of Conti and de la Roche fur Ton, we underfland they intend to pais the Campagne in the Army which the Elector of Bavaria will Command in Hungary.
