Dunluce in the North of Ireland, May 18.

**T**His day about Eleven of the Clock in the Forenoon arrived a small Boat at *Ballentoy* which came from *Ila* in the Kingdom of *Scotland*, having 8 men on Board, the Waiter according to his Orders in the presence of several Gentlemen, disarmed them, and enquired whence they came, they answered they came to this Kingdom for safety, *Argyle* and *Sir John Cockram* having Landed in the said *Ila*, having five Ships laden with men and Ammunition, the men as they heard being about five hundred; one of the Passengers named *Frizal*, saw *Argyle* and *Cockram* with another old Gentleman whose name was not known to him, and says that he knew *Argyle* very well, and saw him dine at a place called *Killer* in *Ila*, and that the said *Argyle* enquired what News, and if the Army was still there, the said *Frizal* answered, that the Army (meaning the Kings Army) were gone to *Kintire*. a little while before he Landed, and that they consisted of about 300 men under the Command of one *Ballyachyan*; And farther says that the said *Argyle* sent for the Bayliff of *Ila* and asked him if he would rise with him; the Bayliff answered he was Sworn to be true to the King; *Argyle* replied that he might rise with him and keep his Oath too; for it was not yet well known who is King; but the Bayliff denying to comply with *Argyle*, withdrew himself and fled the Country and several other Gentlemen, the said *Frizal* and the Waiter of *Ila*, heard *Argyle* swear that he would Burn the Bayliffs House that night, and every one in the Country that would not rise with him he would Hang at their own doors; So says all the rest of the men that fled for their Lives, and that *Argyle* commanded a Crossary to be dispatched through the whole Country, which is a sign in a fiery stick, commanding and warning every man to rise in Arms with him. The said men told that several other small Boats were making ready to make their escape, and before the writing hereof one Boat was seen coming to *Ballentoy*; the Waiter that came from *Ila* is a discreet Person; *Ila* is within 4 hours Sailing to *Dunluce*.

*Genova*, May 6. We have an account from *Leghorn*, that four Gallies are sitting out there, which the Great Duke intends to send to the *Levant* with the Popes Gallies to joyn the *Venetian* Fleet. They write from *Milan*, that the Count *de Melgar* their Governor has put the Troops of that Country into a very good posture, and that it is believed some of them will be sent to the assistance of the Emperor.

*Venice*, May 4. The Troops of *Lunenbuag* are most of them Embarked, and will Sail in two or three days to joyn the Fleet. We have advice that 1000 new raised men are arrived at *Bergamo*, and that several Companies of new raised Dragoons are daily expected there. The last Letters from *Dalmatia* gave an account that the Providitore General *Valier* was retired to *Sebenico*, where he ex-

pected several Troops to joyn him, after which he would enter upon some new Action. We have advice that the Government of *Tripoli* have tried out 6 men of War to joyn the Turkish Fleet. Signior *Delfino* is gone with 10 men of War towards the *Levant* to hinder the Turks from transporting their Troops from *Asia*; and the whole Fleet commanded by Captain General *Morosini* will Sail from *Corfu* about the middle of this month.

*Dantzick*, May 20. The Letters from *Warsaw* of the 11th Instant give an account that the Dyet was still assembled; That they had taken into consideration several matters relating to the War against the Turks, and had made so good a Progress therein, that it was hoped they would in few days bring them to a conclusion. They write from *Leopol* of the 3d of this month, that there was so great a scarcity of Provisions at *Caminee*, that the King had put the Jews and all those that were not provided with Victuals for their own subsistence out of the place; That the Tartars which were in Garrison there, being strengthened with a Party of Turks, had made an incursion as far as *Radzzenow*, and had sacked that place, and several other Villages, and were returned to *Caminee* with a great booty and divers Prisoners; That this Success had encouraged them to make another incursion on *Easter Eve* towards *Barre* and *Mielz bis*, but that the Cossacks that are quartered on that side having notice of it, got together, fell upon them and put them to flight, and released a great many Christian Slaves.

*Vienna*, May 17. This Week a trial was made of several Great Guns, Mortars and Bombs of a new Invention, which succeeded all very well, to the great Credit of the Inventor. The preparations for the opening the Campaign are making with all possible diligence; The Imperial Troops quartered in the Hereditary Countries are on their march, and the Auxiliary Troops of *Lunenburg* will in two or three days begin theirs, to the General Rendezvous which is appointed to be between *Gran* and *Newbeusel*. In the mean time Colonel *Heustler* continues encamped with the Body under his Command near *Barkan* to observe the Enemy, who it is said are on their march to attempt the relief of *Newbeusel*; The Garrison whereof is now reduced to that necessity that they are forced to eat Horse-Flesh; and have sent out of the Town 130 Christian Prisoners, not having wherewithal to feed them. The Troops commanded by General *Schultz* in Upper *Hungary* are drawing together; He has, we are told, orders to attack the Castle of *Hungwar*, and afterward to Besiege *Esperies* and *Cassaw*; Those in *Croxtia* which are to be under the Orders of General *Staremberg* are likewise taking the Field. The last Letters from *Poland* give us great hopes that the Dyet will after all have a very good conclusion.

*Hamburg*, May 10. The differences between the Duke of *Zell* and this City are not yet composed, but the negotiation is in such a State, that there is no reason to doubt the good success of it. We have an account from *Berlin* that the Baron *de Freytag*

Ag the Emp to s Minister at that Court does sol-  
licite a Succor of 7 or 8000 men against the Turks,  
and that he has great hopes of obtaining it. They  
write from Denmark that the Count de Roys Mar-  
schal de Camp General of the King of Denmark's  
Forces was returned thither from France.

Hamburg, May 29. The Letters from Eopen-  
hagen of the 25th Instant tell us, that the King of  
Denmark would in few days begin his Journey to  
Holstein, and that his Majesty intends to go from  
thence for Friesland. They write from Stockholm  
that the King of Sweden will assist the Emperor with  
6000 men against the Turks. The Letters from  
Warsaw of the 10th Instant say the Dyet had been  
again prolonged for several days; That they had  
resolved to prosecute the War against the Turks  
with all possible vigor; and that they were consider-  
ing of the best ways of raising a fund for that pur-  
pose; These Letters add that the Tartars had made  
an Incurtion into the Country of Baw, and had  
plundered and burnt a great many Villages,

Ratisbonne, May 24. The Bishop of Passaw the  
Emperors Principal Commissioner at the Dyet is  
expected here the next week; and the Count de  
Papenheim Marschal of the Empire is come hither  
on purpose to assist at his publick Reception. The  
Letters from Hungary tell us that the Troops begin  
to march to their general Rendezvous: That Colonel  
Aeusler does very narrowly observe the Enemy to  
hinder their design of relieving Newbeusel, which  
our advices assure us is in great distress. We have  
no very good account of the Enemies preparations for  
this Campaign; but are told in general, that they  
will have an Army of 70000 men in Hungary this  
Summer, which will be commanded by the late  
Bassa of Buda who is in great credit with the Grand  
Signior for the stout defence he made the last year  
of that place.

Frankfort, May 27. This afternoon arrived here  
an Expreis with the News of the Death of the Elector  
Palatin, who dyed at Hydelberg yesterday about  
three in the morning. The Letters from Vienna tell  
us, that the Imperial Troops are marching to the gen-  
eral Rendezvous; and that they will certainly be-  
gin the Campaign with the Siege of Newbeusel, which  
place it's said is reduced to that condition, that it  
cannot make any considerable defence. That the  
Duke of Lorrain was expected back from Inspruck  
the 25th of this Month, and that he would stay but  
a few days at Vienna after his return, intending to ha-  
sten to the Army. The marriage between the  
Electors of Bavaria and the Archduchess will be ce-  
lebrated the 12th of the next month.

Brussels, May 25. The Marquis de Grana is now  
with the whole Court at Marimont, where they  
will stay till towards the end of the next month.  
The Letters from Zeige tell us, that the Elector of  
Cologne's Troops which were quartered in that  
Country are on their march through the Province of  
Limburgh towards Hungary. The Letters from  
Vienna give an account that the Imperial Troops are  
marching to the General Rendezvous, which is ap-  
pointed to be held the first of the next month not far  
from Newbeusel.

Hague June 1. The States of Holland are still  
Assembled, but it's believed will adjourn to morrow.  
The Heer Van Dieff Envoy Extraordinary from the  
Electors of Brandenburg is arrived here, and has re-  
ceived the Visits of all the Foreign Ministers. The  
Letters from Frankfort of the 28th past, give an  
account that an Expreis passed through that City the  
26th, who was going to Denmark with the news of  
the Death of the Elector Palatine. We have ad-  
vice that the Troops of the Bishoprick of Munster  
being about about 5000 men, part of those the

Electors of Cologne sends to the Emperors assistance,  
are come to Hanau in their march for Hungary.

Paris, May 30. The Deputies of the Clergy met  
yesterday at St. Germain's, but they will not enter  
upon business yet in some days. The Contract of  
marriage between the Duke de Bourbon the Prince  
of Conde's Grandson and Mademoiselle de Nemours  
Signed; It's said the King gives her 2 Millions of  
Livres, and a yearly Pension of 50 thousand Crowns.  
By the last Letters from the Princes of Conti and de  
la Roche sur Ton, we understand they intend to pass the  
Campaign in the Army which the Elector of Bava-  
ria will Command in Hungary.

Newbury in Berkshire, May 23. This day was  
brought hither the new Charter His Majesty hath  
been Graciously pleased to grant to this Corporation,
