Edinburgh, June 1. Ince our last we have an account that the late Earl of Argyle did on the 26th of the 1sit Month march from Campletown in Kintire, with two troops of Horse, (such as could be had in that Country) and 700 Foot to Tarbert, and met 300 of the Ilamen, and 200 more were expected, where they were all to Muster the 28th. His three Ships came from Campletowne on Tuesday, and the next day went into Tarbert, the greatest carrying 30 Guns, the other 12, and the third fix; He has anoth r small Vessel with him, which he took upon the Coast laden with Corn: The 29th he loofed from the Tarbers accompanied with Auchinbreck (who we have already told you had joined him) and came into the Town of Roja in the lile of Boot, where he took a rights Provision for himself and his Men. The 30th he failed round the Island with his three ships, and 20 small Boats, and came again to the Town of Rosa, and fired leven Guns at his landing, having with him, as we are informed, in all about 2500 m:n.Hc endeavours to perswade and encourage the people to Rife with him, by affuring them that there are already great Rifings in England, as you will fee by a Letter all written and figned by himself, directed, For the Laird of Lupe, which is herewith fent, and is as follows:

Campletown, May 22. 1685.

Loving Friend,

T bath pleased God to bring me safe to this place, where several of both Nations do appear with me for Defence of the Protestant Religion, our Lives and Liberties, against Popery and Arbitrary Government, whereof the particulars are in two Declarations emitted by those Noblemen, Gentlemen, and others, and by me for my sets. Your Father and I lived in great Frientship; and I am glad to serve you his Son in De-fence of the Protestam Religion; And I will be ready to do it in your particular when there is occasion. I beseech you let not any out of fear or other had Principles preswade you to neglect your Duty to God and your Country, at thu time; or to believe that D. York is not a Papis, or that being one he can be a Rightcoma King. Then know that all England is in Arms in three several places, and the Duke of Monmouth appears at the same time upoz the same grounds we do, and few places in Scotland, but soon will join; and the South and West wants but till they hear I am Landed, for so we resolved before I left Holland. Now I beseech you make no delay to separate from those abuse you, and are carrying on a Popish design; and come with all the Men of your Command to assist the Cause of Religion, where you shall be most welcome to,

Bojton in New-England, April 21. Yesterday our Gracious Soveraign King FAMES the Second gistrates and Inhabitants; and that his blectoral Highwas Proclaimed here by our Magistrates, with ness was expected at Heydelbergh in 8 or 10 days, and

the unanimous consent and satisfaction of all people; there was a very handlome appearance of about 1000 Foot Soldiers, and 100 Horle-men, with the principal Gentlemen and Merchants of the Country on Hotse-Back, who marching through the Town to the Town-House, there read the Procidmation they had received from England with all due Solemnity, accompanied with the Acclamations of the People, and many Volleys of great and fmull Shot from the Castle and Forts, and Ships in the Harbour, and particularly from Noddles island, where above 50 Pieces of Ordnance were discharged.

Vienna, May 23. The Imperial Court continues at Newstadt; and in the mean time great preparations are making for the Celbration of the Elector of Bavaria's Marriage with the Archdutchess. 2000 men of Mentz, Trier, and the City of Cologne, are sent towards Newbeufel; and the Troop, of La-nenburg are likewise marching thicher with several other Troops. The Duke of Lorrain is exp cted here the 27th Inffant, and will part from hence the first of the next Month for Hungary. It is confirmed from Croatia that the Turks have a delign upon Virovitza, the Gazison where of has been lately paid by the Pope. We have received this day Letters from Hungary which say that the Garison in the Cassle of

Ungwar had begun to capitulate.

Vienna. May 27, The Count de Caprara i, gone for Hungary to command the Imperial Troops is high The 'urk; are at present encamped n ar Lewents. have carried the Provisions and Ammunition they had at Vaccia, which were defigned for the reach of Newbeusel, to Buda to supply that Garison. An Hungarian Gentleman who has been some time a Prifoner at Buda, and was lately exchanged for a Turkitn Officer, being arrived in the Imperial Camp, has affured Colonel Heufter that all manner of Provisions were very scarce at Buda, so that the Garison which confifted of 10000 men suffered extreamly. press is arrived here from General Schultz with an account of the furrender of the Castle of Urgwar; and that the Imperialists found there so peces of Brass Cannon, besides several of Iron, and a great quantity of Ammunition; This Castle was taken the last year by Teckeley, but with a great deal of trouble, and the loss of many of his men. And by the ordinary Letters from Upper Hungary, we have advice that some Imperial Troopscommanded by Captain Prennelsen of the Regiment of Herbeville having met a strong party of Rebels not far from Esperies, they had entirely routed them, killing 200 upon the place and taking all their Baggage; and that of the Chriflians 20 were killed and fome few wounded. 25th Instant arrived in the Neighborhood of this Ci y the Regiment of Cuirassiers of Furst emberg in its march for Hungary. The Imperial Ministers, and the Envoy from the Landgrave of Heffe Caffel are not yet agreed concerning the Troops which that Prince offers to affift the Emperor with.

Cologne, June 1. The Letters from Heydelbergh give an account that one of the Princes of Neubergh hath been at Heydelbergh, Manheim and other places of the Palatinate, and bath in the name of the new Elector his Father, received the homage of the Mais at he intends to have his Residence at Mankeim. They write from Neurembergh that the States of Franconia were assembled there, and that they had given orders for the march of the Troops which they are to fend to the Emperors Affillance. And from Ulm we are told that the Stares of Suabia had likewise ordered that their Troops thould forthwith Degin

their march for Hungary.

Hamburgh, June 1. The Letters from Wurfin of the 18th path inform us, that the Dyet had resolved that the Army of the Crown of Poland should be compoled this Campagne of 40000 men, and that of Lithuania of 20000, and that they were confidering how to raise a Fond for the supporting of the War. The Letters from Copenhagen tell us that the King of Denmark intended to part from thence the 29th of the last month for Norway, and that 10 Men of War were appointed to attend his Majesty in that Voyage. The differences between this City and the Duke of Zell are not yet accommodated.

Hague, June 7. Mr. Skelton Envoy Extraordinary from the King of England, having in His Majestics name demanded that the three Scotch Regiments in the Service of this State might be fent for Scotland to ferve against the Rebels, the States immediately confented to it, and accordingly the Prince of Orange has given orders for their Embarkation. The Sizur Fuchs Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Brandenburg hath had his publick Audience of the States General, and has defired that Commissioners may be appointed to treat with him; It's faid he comes to sollicite the payment of the Arrears of Subfidies that are due to his Electoral Highness from this State. Prince Waldeck is gone to Culembourg, and it's believed he will from thence go for Germany. The States of Holland are still assembled.

The Marquis de Grand has been Bruffels June 8. very ill fince his taking the Waters at Marimont, and this Evening arrived an Express from thence; with an account that they almost despair of his Re-The 6th Instantarrived here the Spanish covery. Ordinary with Letters from Madrid of the 24th of the last Month; They tell us that his Catholick Maj sty had given the Marquis de Grans leave to retire; and that it was believed the Duke d' Uzeda would fucceed him i) this Government; That the King had likewife refolved to change the Governor of Milan; That Don Emanuel de Lyra did execute the place of Secretary of the Universal Dispatch; and that the general opinion was that Don Alonzo Carnero (who went lately from thence for Spain) would be made Secretary for Italy. The Letters from Germany give an account that General Schultz had taken the Caille of Vagwar, and that he was marching towards Esperies; That Count Teckeley had fent a Deputy to the Emportor to treat about his accommodation: And that the Imperial Troops were marching towards Newheusel formally to attack that place.

Marseilles, Fune 4. Yesterday parted from hence 15 French Galleys under the command of the Duke de Mortemar their General; They took their course to the Eastward, and it's believed are gone for Genona. We have no news of the French men of War fince their departure from Thoudon on the 25th of the last month, but the general opinion is that they are gone

directly for Tripoli.

Paris, Fune 13. The King has named the Sieur d' Aubeville to go in quality of his Envoy Extraordinary to the Republick of Genoua. The Moscovite Ambassadors parted from hence this Week; They will be conducted at the Kings charge to Dunkirke, where they are to embark in order to their return home. We are told that the Government of Tripoli have sentall their Ships to the Levant to avoid the French men of War, which they understood were
