

# The London Gazette.

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From Sunday June 8. to Thursday June 11. 1685.

Edinburgh, June 6.

**T**His day we have an account, That upon Tuesday last a party from the Marquis of Athol came to Glendarowall, where Charles Campbell lay with 120 Foot and 12 Horse, and that (narrowly elcaping) he fled with his Men and Horse to his Boats, leaving two Prisoners, and one killed in his flight. We have also an account, That on Wednesday last the late Earl of Argyle sent Sir John Cochran and Polwart with 100 Men and two Ships to Greenock, where their landing was endeavoured to have been opposed by a Militia Troop of Horse under the Command of the Lord Cochran, from whom the young Laird of Housfloun, Corsburne and another Gentleman Rode down to the Boats and fired their Pistols at them Landing; but the Cannon playing from the Ships, as well as the small Shot from the Boats, the Gentlemen and Troop were obliged to retire. This Party of the Rebels after Landing in the Town took what Meal and Victuals they could find, and returned to Boot, where all the Rebels now are; and His Majesties Ships the *Falcon* and *Mairmail* with a Yacht are lying at Anchor near that Isle; and just now we have an account of Captain Hamiltons arrival in another of the Kings Ships, who with the other Captains are preparing a Fire-Ship, which in few days will be ready, and soon after we hope to have a good account of the Rebels.

Warsaw, May 18. The Dyet still continues, not having yet determined the matter of the Recruits, nor settled the Contributions for the Expences of the Campaign. In the mean time we have advice that the Turks and Tartars have made an incursion into the Ukraine, and have plundered and burnt several Villages: And that there is a secret Negotiation on foot between the Turks and Moscovites; To discover the intentions of the latter, the King is sending an Envoy to Moscow, who has orders to hasten his journey thither. The Ambassador which the Elector of Brandenburg has sent hither to take care of his Interests during the Dyet, has had two Audiences of the King. The Hospodar Duca, Prince of Moldavia, who was taken Prisoner the last Summer by Cossacks, and offered 100 thousand Crowns for his Ransom is lately dead at Leopold.

Cadix, May 18. The New-Spain Fleet which ought to have arrived here in March last, cannot, according to the advice we have received by a small Vessel from the Indies, be now expected till the latter end of August or the beginning of September; The fifth instant happened here a very violent Storm in which two small Vessels and a Dutch Ship, were cast away, but the Men of the last were all saved.

Genova, June 5. We have no News of the French Fleet since they failed from Thoulon, but every body believes that they are gone for Tripoli. The three Gallies that are to fetch the Doge and Senators from *Marseilles* are now Carcening, and will depart in two or three days. This week arrived here the Coronation Captain Fairweather, from the Coast of Spain.

Venice, May 26. Three days ago Sailed from hence two men of War, a Gallicae and two Gallies: and the Great Duke of Tuscany has sent his Gallies and 2 men of War with 600 Soldiers more than last year, to joyn the Fleet of this State which we hear is Sailed from Corfu; and it's said that Signior Molino

is gone with 21 men of War, 4 Gallies, and two Gallicae towards Rhodi to intercept a great Convoy which was preparing at Alexandria to be sent to Constantinople. We have advice that a party of Morlacks have been lately defeated by the Turks near Castel Novo, above 100 of them being killed upon the place, with one of their chief Commanders, whose loss is very much lamented. The two Princes of Neuburg are come hither from Florence in their return for Germany.

Venice, May 26. We have an account that General Deghenfeldt is arrived at Corfu with the Troops he carried from hence; And that Captain General Morosini hath taken the Cimeriotes under the protection of the Republick and hath put Garisons into some of their chiefest places. This week arrived at the Lido several new raised Companies of Italian Foot, and some others are expected which will be sent to Dalmatia. The Senate have upon the request of Signior Sandi, resolved to receive him into the number of the Nobility, he paying a 100 thousand Ducats.

Vienna, May 28. The Cities of Esperies and Caschau have sent Deputies to Newstadt, where the Imperial Court now is, as we are told, to beg the Emperors Pardon, and to declare their willingness to receive an Imperial Garison, and to renew their Oath of Fidelity to his Imperial Majesty: And Count Teckelej has desired leave to send Deputies hither to Treat of his Reconciliation, but at the same time some Letters of his have been intercepted, wherein he encourages his adherents to continue in their Rebellion, and gives them assurances of a speedy succor from the Turks. All our Letters from Hungary confirm the account we have of the extremity the Garison in Newbenfel is reduced too; And of the Imperial Troops being on their March from their several quarters formally to attack that place.

Vienna, May 31. The Imperial Court returned hither the 29th. instant from Newstadt. The Elector of Bavaria is expected here the next week; And in the mean time great Preparations are making for the Celebration of his Marriage. The Duke of Lorraine is come back from Inspruck; and will in three or four days be going for Hungary. The Troops March from all parts to the General Rendezvous; And we are told that General Caprara will on the 5th. or 6th. of the next Month formally attack Newbenfel with an Army of 25000 men. A great many Boats pass down the River, laden with Provisions and Ammunition for the Troops in Hungary. The news of General Schultz having taken the Castle of Ungwar is not confirmed; but on the contrary the freest Letters from Upper Hungary say, that the besieged make a very stout defence. The Emperor has named the Count de Lobcowitz to go in quality of his Envoy Extraordinary to the Most Christian King. We have advice from the Turkish Territories, that General Rendezvous of the Turkish Army is appointed instead of Belgrade to be near Buda. They write from Hungary that 50 Janissaries of Newbenfel having deserted and got out of the Town, had declared to the Imperialists they were in so great necessity in the Town that the whole Garison would desert if they thought they should not be ill treated by the Christians.

*Ratisbona, June 4.* The Bishop of Passaw, the Emperor's Principal Commissioner at the Dyet, made his publick Entry into this City on the 29th. of the last month, and has since been Complimented by the several Colleges of the Dyet, and has received the Visits of all the Persons of Quality that are here. The first instant passed through this City a Regiment of Horse of the Circle of *Swabia*, in their March to *Hungary*, consisting in 1000 Men well Armed and Mounted; And its said they will in a few days be followed by 2000 Foot of the same Circle. The College of Electors and that of the Princes have Named the Deputies that are to assist on their part at the Conferences to be held for the Regulating the limits between the Empire and the Crown of *France*.

*Weydelberg, June 4.* Prince Anthony of Neubergh, Great Master of the *Teutonic* Order, arrived here the 30th. past, with full power from his Father the Duke of *Neubergh*, at present Elector *Palatin*, to receive in his Name an Oath of Fidelity from the Magistrates, Officers, and Inhabitants of this place, which was accordingly performed the next day; and some of his Electoral Highness's Council were sent by the Prince to all the Baliwicks of the Palatinate to receive in like manner an Oath of Fidelity from them. The Governor of *Philipsbourg* has by the Emperors order put new Garrisons into this place, *Mannheim* and *Frankendal* for his Electoral Highness; and the Troops that were there before are removed to *Philipsbourg*.

*Cologne, June 9.* The Troops of *Liege*, who are going for *Hungary*, have already passed by *Coblenz*, and were to rest two days at a place, about two Miles beyond that City, called *Braylback*. The Troops of *Munster* and *Hildesheim* came the 6th. instant to *Bergelsdatt* near *Arensberg*, likewise in their March towards *Hungary*; The Landgrave of *Hesse Cassel* and the States of *Franconia* having at last granted them passage through their Territories. The Magistrates of this City sent the last week an Officer with a party of Soldiers to *Godorf* a Village near *Bonn*, to seize Colonel *Kyrbering*, who formerly Commanded the Troops of this City, and retired from hence upon his being accus'd of several Misdemeanors; They found him there, but suffered him to escape, upon which the Magistrates have imprisoned the Officer that Commanded the Party, and have ordered Process to be made against him. On the other hand the Elector of *Cologne* is highly offended at this attempt made in a place within his Jurisdiction, and has sent an Express to *Vienna* to give the Emperor an account of it.

*Gains, June 16.* We have this Evening received the News of the Death of the Marquis de *Graux*. It's said that the Marquis *del Pico de Velasco* Governor of the Castle of *Antwerp*, is appointed by the Dormant Commission, lying in the said Castle, to be Governor General of these Countries *Pro interim*.

*Hague, June 11.* The States of *Holland* and *West-frizeland* adjourned the 9th. instant till the 15th. of the next Month, without taking any resolution concerning the State of the War; The City of *Amsterdam* still persisting in their opinion about reducing the Forces.

*Paris, June 16.* The Marquis de *Feuquieres*, Ambassador from this Crown at *Madrid* has, we are told, presented a Memorial to the King of *Spain* demanding satisfaction upon the complaints made by the French Merchants in that Kingdom, of which we are not yet well informed of the particulars. There has happened a fresh dispute between the Inhabitants of *Fonterabia* and those of *Andaye* about their Fishing, upon which some small Frigats are gone thither. It is said for certain that the Queen of *Spain*, and the Dutchess of *Savoy* are both with Child.

*Plimouth, June 5.* This Morning arrived in the *Sound* the Lord *Lansdown* His Majesties Envoy Extraordinary to the King of *Spain*, in the *Dartmouth* Frigate, and is now under sail again to pursue his Voyage.

*Whitehal, June 5.* This day a very Loyal Address from the Nobility, Gentry and Grand Jury of the County of *Meath* in *Ireland*, was presented to His Majesty by *Edward Tyrrel* Esq; High-Sheriff of the said County, which his Majesty received very Graciously.

*Whitehal, June 9.* The Count de *Martinitz* Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor, to Condole the death of the late King of *Ever* Blessed Memory, and to Congratulate His Majesties Succession to the Crown, had this Evening Audience of His Majesty, being Conducted by Sir *Charles Cottrel* Master of the Ceremonies.
