Whitehal, June 13.

THis Morning His Majesty received an account by an Express from the Mayor of Lyme. That on Thursday last there appeared three Ships off of that place, and that about seven in the Evening the Duke of Monmouth Landed with about 150 Men, and entering the said Town, possessed himself of the same, sending some of his Traiterous Complices into the Neighbouring Counties to incite the People to an open Rebellion against His Majesty. Whereupon His Majesty caused His Privy Council to assemble; And ordered the following Proclamation to be published.

JAMES R.
WHereas We have received Certain Information, That James Duke of Monmouth, Ford late Lord Gray Outlawed for High Treason, with divers other Traytors and Outlaws, are lately Landed in an Hostile manner at Lyme, in Our County of Dorset, And have Possessed themselves of Our said Town of Lyme. And have sent and dispersed some of their Trayterous Complices into the Neighbouring Countries to Incite them to Joyn in open Rebellion against Us.

We do hereby, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, Declare and Publish the said James Duke of Monmouth, and all his Complices, Adherents, Abettors, and Advisers, Traitors and Rebels; And do Command and Require all Our Lieutenants, Deputy-Lieutenants, Sheriffs, Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Bayliffs, and all other Our Officers, Civil and Military, to use their utmost endeavours to Seize and Apprehend the said James Duke of Monmouth, Ford late Lord Gray, and all their said Confederates and Adherents; And all and every other Person and Persons that shall be Aiding or Abetting the aforesaid Traitors and Rebels; And the said Persons, and every of them to Secure until Our further Pleasure be known, as they will answer the contrary at their utmost Peril.

Given at Our Court at Whitehal this Thirteenth day of June 1685. And in the First year of Our Reign.

GOD SAVE THE KING.

And His Majesty having been pleased to Communicate the said Intelligence to both His Houses of Parliament, They immediately resolved to make the following Addresses to His Majesty, with which they severally attended His Majesty in the Banqueting House at Whitehal.

The Address of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal in Parliament Assembled.

His Majesty having been Graciously pleased to impart to this House that he hath this Morning received Intelligence that the Duke of Monmouth and divers other his Adherents in Hostile manner, have Landed at Lyme in Dorsetshire, and taken possession of the said Town, This House doth therefore Resolve to wait on His Majesty to give him their humble thanks for his favour in imparting the said Intelligence to this House, and humbly offer to assist and stand by His Majesty with their Lives and Fortunes against the said Duke of Monmouth, and all Rebels and Traytors, and all other His Enemies whatsoever.

The Address of the House of Commons.

Most Gracious Sovereign,
WE your Majesties most Loyal Subjects, the Commons of England in Parliament assembled, Do with all Duty return our most humble and hearty Thanks for your Majesties Gracious Message, Communicated to us by the Earl of Middleton, one of your Majesties Principal Secretaries of State, of the Invading this your Kingdom by that Ingrateful Rebel James Duke of Monmouth, and do with all Duty and Loyalty and utter Detestation of such Rebels and Traytors, assure your Majesty, That we are, and always shall be ready to stand by and assist your Majesty with our Lives and Fortunes, against the said James Duke of Monmouth, his Adherents and Correspondents, and all Rebels and Traytors, and all others whatsoever, that shall assist them or any of them.

And since the preservation of your Majesties Person is of the highest concern to the Peace and Happiness of this Kingdom, We your most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, Do most humbly beseech your Majesty to take more than Ordinary care of your Royal Person, which we beseech God long to preserve.

Edinburg, June 9. Since our last we have received Intelligence that the late Earl of Argile, upon the Arrival of his Majesties Ships, hath quitted the Isle of Boot, and is gone over to Cowal, one of the divisions of Argileshire, having first destroyed the Sheriff of Boot's Estate, burnt his House, and taken away his Furniture. He has brought his Ships and Boats into Loch sine towards Inveraray, where the Marquis of Athol and the Earl of Braed Albin were then lying with a considerable Body of Men; And we daily expect to hear of Action between them and the Rebels, unless these shall avoid fighting by waiving over from one side of the Loch to the other, where nevertheless they are now blockt up by his Majesties Ships lying in the mouth of the Loch. The three Scotch Regiments, that were in the service of the States General of the United Provinces are daily expected here from Holland.

Vienna, June 3. We have an account by an Officer arrived this day from Hungary that the Luxemburg Troops are on their March to joyn the Imperial Forces, which block up Newbeusel under the Command of Colonel Heusler and Count Rassi; And that a Party of the Garison of Gran hath taken a Turk in the disguise of an Hungarian Peasano who was going with Letters from the Pasha of Newbeusel to the Visier of Buda, to let him know the extremity they were reduced to; That the Garison deserted daily, and that those that remained would be forced in few dayes to capitulate. We have likewise advice that the Turks who were drawn together between Pest and Vaccia were retired, and that they had sent the provisions designed for the relief of Newbeusel to Buda fearing they should be attacked by the Imperialists if they staid there. The 28th past a Regiment of Cuirassiers which the Elector of Cologne has given the Emperor arrived in the Neighborhood of this City; And the same day arrived here an Express to give the Emperor an account that the 6000 Men which his Electoral Highness sends to his assistance

affluence were on their March, and that his Electoral Highness hath made very good provision for their subsistence this Campaigne. The Duke of Lorraine since his return from *Inprucke* hath had several Conferences with the Prince of *Baden* President of the Council of War, and its said his Highness will part from hence to morrow for *Hungary*. The Garisons of *Copreniz* and *Crife*, to the number of abut 800 Men, having made an incursion into the Turkish Territories as far as the *Bridge of Effick*, and plundered and burnt several Villages, the Turks of the Neighboring Garisons taking the alarm joynd together and fell upon the Christians in their retreat, of whom they killed 30 upon the place, and would have made a greater Slaughter of them had not the Cavalry of the Garison of *Virovitza* come in, who put the Turks to flight, in which many of them were killed and taken Prisoners.

Vienna, June 6. The Troops of *Bavaria* are on their march towards *Hungary* Comanded by the Count de *Serini* their General, who is however to be under the orders of the Duke of *Lorraine*. The Prince of *Baden Dowlack* is come hither to pay his Duty to the Emperor; He is to Command the Troops of the Circle of *Suabia*, whereof a Regiment of Horse is already arrived in the Neighborhood of this City. We are assured that the resolution is taken to attack *Newbeusel*, and that the Imperial Army will be before the place the 8th or 9th of this Month; Prince *Louis of Baden* is to Command one Attack, and the Count of *Sperfenberg* another; The Garison is in a very ill condition, many of them dying daily through hunger. We are told that Count *Leslie* will be recalled from *Croatia* to serve as *Marschal de Camp* General under the Duke of *Lorraine*; And that the Count de *Staremborg* will in his place Command the Emperors Forces in *Croatia*. We have advice from the Turkish Territories that the *Turks* have not yet above 25000 Men at *Belgrade* where is appointed their General *Rendezvous*; And 10000 in or near *Buda*; And its said that they will not be able to bring many Troops more into *Hungary* this Campaigne. The Princes de *Conti*, and de la *Roche-Sur-Ton*, are arrived here in their way to *Hungary*, where they intend to pass the Campaigne.

Frankfort, June 14. The Elector of *Cologne's* Troops which are going for *Hungary* have paid the River *Mayn* at *Coffheim*. The Duke of *Holstein Gottorp* has been several days in this City. The Letters from *Vienna* give an account that the Imperial Troops are marching from all parts to the General *Rendezvous*, which will be held not far from *Newbeusel*; That the Duke of *Lorraine* was gone for *Hungary*; and that he would in few days be at the head of an Army of 40000 Men.

Cologne, June 12. The Elector of *Cologne* has sent to our Magistrates to demand satisfaction for the attempt made at *Godorf*, a Village near *Bonne*, by a Party of Soldiers sent from hence to seize Colonel *Kynbering*; and has declared in case it be not given him that he will cause Reprisals to be made upon the Inhabitants of this City. The Letters from *Vim* give an account that the Troops of the Circle of *Suabia* are on their march towards *Hungary*, being about 40000 men. The *Bavarian* Forces are likewise on their march. And we are assured that the Emperor will have above an hundred and ten thousand men in his Armies in *Hungary* and *Croatia* this Summer. They write from *Heydelbergh* that they expected their new Elector there in few days.

Hague, June 19. The three Scotch Regiments Embarked last Saturday, at *Rotterdam* for *Scotland*, the Prince of *Orange* having the day before taken a review of them near that City. The States of *Holland* and *West-Friseland* are adjourned till the 15th. of the next month. We have an account of the death of the *Marquis de Grana* Governor General of

the *Spanish Netherlands*, who dyed at *Marimont* on Saturday last.

Paris, June 10. The new Ele or *Palatin* hath sent an Envoy hither to make his Compliments to his Most Christian Majesty, and to the Duke and Dutchess of *Orleans*. Monsieur de *Saignelay* is going to *Brest* and *Rochefort*, and from thence to *Marseilles* and *Toulon* to visit the Magazines there. We have an account of the arrival of the Princes de *Conti* and de la *Roche-Sur-Ton* at *Vienna*, and that they were going from thence for *Hungary*. The Emperor is finding a person of Quality to reside on his part, at this Court.

London, June 10. The third of this instant *June* arriv'd the *Golden Fleece* a rich *East-India* Ship from the *Bay of Bengal*, and the 4th came in the *Mexico-Merchant* from *Surat*; the publick news by heris, that upon the arrival of Sir *Tho. Grantham* in the *Charles the Second*, another of the Companies Ships, the 1. of *November* last, the Fort and Island of *Bombay* was surrendred to the said Sir *Tho. Grantham* for the Companies use, the Inhabitants seeming very sorry that they had been perswaded by the Interlopers and others to revolt from the Companies Obedience.
