HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better "provision for the spiritual care of populous "parishes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twelfth day of November in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-four, in the words following, that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the spiritual "care of populous parishes," have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme, for constituting

a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the parish of Kildwick, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon.

"Whereas it is by the said Act enacted, that if at any time it shall be made to appear to us, that it would promote the interests of religion, that any part or parts of any parish or parishes, chapelry or chapelries, district or districts, of great extent, and containing a large population, and wherein, or in parts whereof, the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof, or any extra-parochial place or places, or any part or parts thereof, should be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, it shall be lawful, by the authority in the same Act provided (that is to say, by a scheme prepared by us, and an Order issued by your Majesty in Council, ratifying such -scheme), with the consent of the bishop of the diocese, under his hand and seal, to set out by metes and bounds, and constitute a separate district accordingly, such district not then containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship, and to fix and declare the name of such district; and it is by the same Act provided, that the draft of any scheme for constituting any such district shall be delivered or transmitted to the incumbent and to the patron or patrons of the church or chapel of any parish, chapelry, or district, out of which it is recommended that any such district, or any part thereof, should be taken, in order that such incumbent, patron or patrons, may have an opportunity of offering or making to us, or to such bishop, any observations or objections upon or to the constituting of such district; and that such scheme shall not be laid before your Majesty in Council until after the expiration of one calendar month next after such copy shall have been so delivered or transmitted, unless such incumbent and patron or patrons shall, in the meantime, consent to the same; and it is by the same Act also provided, that in every such scheme for constituting any such district we shall recommend to your Majesty in Council, that the minister of such district, when duly licensed according to the same Act, shall be permanently endowed, under the provisions of the same Act, to an amount of not less than the annual value of one hundred pounds; and also, if such endowment be of less than the annual value of

one hundred and fifty pounds, that the same shall be increased to such last-mentioned amount at the least, so soon as such district shall have become a new parish as thereinafter provided:

"And whereas the said parish of Kildwick is of great extent, and contains a large population, and the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence therein is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof; and it has been made to appear to us, that it would promote the interests of religion, that the particular part of such parish hereinafter mentioned and described, such part not at present containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship, should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter set forth:

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles Thomas Bishop of Ripon, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme, that all that part of the said parish of Kildwick, described in the schedule hereunto annexed,—all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth in the map or plan hereunto also annexed,—shall be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes accordingly; and that the same shall be named, "The District of Cowling."

"And we further recommend and propose, that there shall be paid by us, in each and every year, to the minister for the time being of the district so recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed according to the said Act, the sum of one hundred pounds; and upon any building within such district, being duly licensed by the bishop of the diocese for the performance of divine service, according to the same Act, there shall be paid by us, in like manner, to such minister, the further sum of thirty pounds, making in the whole the sum of one hundred and thirty pounds; and that so soon as any church or chapel within such district shall have been duly approved by us, and consecrated as the church or chapel of such district, for the use and service of the minister and inhabitants thereof, and such district shall have thereupon become, according to the provisions of the same Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, there shall be paid by us, in each and every year, to the perpetual curate for the time being of

such new parish, the sum of one hundred and fifty pounds; and that the said sum of one hundred pounds, one hundred and thirty pounds, or one hundred and fifty pounds, as the case may be, shall be paid, by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year; and that the first such payment, or a proportionate part thereof, shall be made on the first day of May or of November next after the day of the date of the licence of such minister or of such building, or of the consecration of such church or chapel as aforesaid, as the case may be; and that in case a vacancy in the ministry or perpetual curacy of such district or new parish shall happen on any other day than the first day of May or the first day of November, the amount payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the minister or the perpetual curate making the vacancy, or his personal representative or representatives, and the minister or the perpetual curate succeeding to such district or new parish.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament.

" SCHEDULE.

- " The District of Cowling, being
- "All that part of of the parish of Kildwick, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon, comprised within the township of Cowling, excepting such part of the said township as is comprised within the district of Lothersdale, in the same county and diocese."

And whereas the draft of the said scheme has been transmitted to the incumbent and to the patrons of the church of the parish out of which it is intended that the district therein recommended to be constituted shall be taken, pursuant to the provisions of the said Act, and such incumbent and patrons have consented to the said scheme:

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Ripon.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for-England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in thesession of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the spiritual "care of populous parishes," have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme, for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the district of Saint George, in the parish of Leeds, in thecounty of York, and in the diocese of Ripon.

"Whereas it is by the said Act enacted, that if at any time it shall be made to appear to us, that it would promote the interests of religion, that any part or parts of any parish or parishes, chapelry or chapelries, district or districts, of great extent, and containing a large population, and wherein, or in parts whereof, the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof, or any extra-parochial place or places, or any part or parts thereof, should be constituted a separate district

for spiritual purposes, it shall be lawful, by the authority in the same Act provided (that is to say, by a scheme prepared by us, and an Order issued by your Majesty in Council, ratifying such scheme), with the consent of the bishop of the diocese, under his hand and seal, to set out by metes and bounds, and constitute a separate district accordingly, such district not then containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship, and to fix and declare the name of such district; and it is by the same Act provided, that the draft of any scheme for constituting any such district shall be delivered or transmitted to the incumbent and to the patron or patrons of the church or chapel of any parish, chapelry, or district, out of which it is recommended that any such district, or any part thereof, should be taken, in order that such incumbent, patron or patrons, may have an opportunity of offering or making to us, or to such bishop, any observations or objections upon or to the constituting of such district; and that such scheme shall not be laid before your Majesty in Council until after the expiration of one calendar month next after such copy shall have been so delivered or transmitted, unless such incumbent and patron or patrons shall, in the meantime, consent to the same; and it is by the same Act also provided, that in every such scheme for constituting any such district we shall recommend to your Majesty in Council that the minister of such district, when duly licensed according to the same Act, shall be permanently endowed, under the provisions of the same Act, to an amount of not less than the annual value of one hundred pounds; and also, if such endowment be of less than the annual value of one hundred and fifty pounds, that the same shall be increased to such last-mentioned amount at the least, so soon as such district shall have become a new parish as therein-after provided;

"And whereas the said district of Saint George, in the said parish of Leeds, is of great extent, and contains a large population, and the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence therein is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof; and it has been made to appear to us, that it would promote the interests of religion, that the particular part of the said district hereinafter mentioned and described, such part not at present containing

within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship, should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter set forth:

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles Thomas Bishop of Ripon, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme, that all that part of the said district of Saint George, described in the schedule hereunto annexed,—all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth in the map or plan hereunto also annexed,—shall be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes accordingly; and that the same shall be named, "The District of Saint Andrew, Leeds."

"And we further recommend and propose, that there shall be paid by us, in each and every year to the minister for the time being of the district so recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed according to the said Act, the sum of one hundred pounds; and upon any building within such district, being duly licensed by the bishop of the diocese for the performance of divine service, according to the same Act, there shall be paid by us, in like manner, to such minister, the further sum of thirty pounds, making in the whole the sum of one hundred and thirty pounds; and that so soon as any church or chapel within such district shall have been duly approved by us, and consecrated as the church or chapel of such district, for the use and service of the minister and inhabitants thereof, and such district shall have thereupon become, according to the provisions of the same Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, there shall be paid by us, in each and every year, to the perpetual curate for the time being of such new parish, the sum of one hundred and fifty pounds; and that the said sum of one hundred pounds, one hundred and thirty pounds, or one hundred and fifty pounds, as the case may be, shall be paid, by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year; and that the first such payment, or a proportionate part thereof, shall be made on the first day of May or of November next after the day of the date of the licence of such minister or of such building, or of the consecration of such church or chapel as aforesaid, as the case may be; and that in case a vacancy in the ministry or perpetual curacy of such district or new parish shall happen on any other day than the first day of May or the first day of November, the amount payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the minister or the perpetual curate making the vacancy, or his personal representative or representatives, and the minister or the perpetual curate succeeding to such district or new parish.

" And whereas it is by the said Act further enacted, that it shall be lawful, by the authority aforesaid, at any time to assign the right of patronage of any such district or new parish as aforesaid, and the nomination of the minister or perpetual curate thereof respectively, either in perpetuity, or for one or more nomination or nominations, to any ecclesiastical corporation, aggregate or sole, or to either of the Universities of Oxford, Cambridge, or Durham, or to any college therein respectively, or to any person or persons, or the nominee or nominees of such person or persons or body respectively, upon condition of such corporation, university, college, person or persons contributing to the permanent endowment of such minister or perpetual curate, or towards providing a church or chapel for the use of the inhabitants of such district or new parish, in such proportion, and in such manner, as shall be approved by the like authority:

" And whereas certain persons have contributed certain sums of money towards providing a church or chapel within the limits of the district of Saint Andrew, so herein recommended to be constituted, and a church or chapel is now in course of erection therein by the aid of such monies; and it has been agreed by such persons that such church or chapel, when completed according to certain plans and a specification which have been submitted to us, shall be offered for approval by us and for consecration, as the church or chapel of the said district, for the use and service of the minister and inhabitants thereof; and we have satisfied ourselves that the said church or chapel, when so completed, will be fit to be so approved and consecrated:

"And whereas the principal contributors towards the said church or chapel have, by an instrument in writing under their hands, nominated to us the incumbent of the said district of Saint George, as the patron of the said district of Saint Andrew, for the first turn, and the

Reverend John Holroyd, Clerk, and John Gott, William Hey, Thomas Townend Dibb, and William Fenwick Stow, Esqrs. all of Leeds aforesaid, as the patrons thereof, for the second turn:

"We, therefore, further recommend and propose, that the right of patronage of the said district of Saint Andrew, and the nomination of the minister thereof, shall, for the first such nomination, be assigned to and vested in the incumbent, for the time being, of the said district of Saint George; and that such right of patronage and nomination shall, for the second such nomination, be assigned to the said John Holroyd, John Gott, William Hey, Thomas Townend Dibb, and William Fenwick Stow, or the survivors or survivor of them.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament.

" SCHEDULE.

" The District of SAINT ANDREW, LEEDS, being

"All that part of the district of Saint George, in the parish of Leeds, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon, comprised within and bounded by an imaginary line commencing at a point in the middle of the river Aire, opposite to the south eastern corner of the estate of Messrs. Robert and Frederick Glover, known as Airedalemills (marked a on the map or plan herewith); and thence extending northward, along the eastern side of the same estate, to a point in the middle of West-street, where two lines projected westward along the respective centres of West-street aforesaid and Wellington-street would intersect each other (marked b as aforesaid); and thence eastward, along the middle of West-street aforesaid, to a point opposite to the middle of Chathamstreet (marked c as aforesaid); and thence northward, along the middle of Chatham-street aforesaid, to the middle of Park-lane; and thence westward, along the middle of such lane, to a point opposite to the eastern end of Hanoverplace (marked d as aforesaid); and thence northward, along the eastern side of the property known as Hanover-place aforesaid, to the north

eastern corner thereof (marked e as aforesaid); and thence westward, along the back of the same property, and across the western approach to Hanover-square, to the nearer north eastern corner of the estate, late of Edward Wainhouse, deceased, called Belle Vue (marked f as aforesaid); and thence westward and northward, along the boundary of the said last-mentioned estate, to a point one hundred and thirty yards distant from the other north eastern corner of the same estate (marked g as aforesaid); and thence westward, in a straight line across the said estate, late of the said Edward Wainhouse, and the estate held in trust for Saint John's church, in the said parish of Leeds, to the western extremity of the township of Leeds, at the northern end of a certain occupation lane leading out of the Burley-road (marked h as aforesaid); and thence southward, along the boundary between the townships of Leeds and Headingley-cum-Burley, as far as the middle of the river Aire (marked i as aforesaid); and thence eastward, along the middle of the said river, to the point at which the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the draft of the said scheme has been transmitted to the incumbents and to the patrons of the churches of the parish and district out of which it is intended that the district therein recommended to be constituted shall be taken, pursuant to the provisions of the said Act; and the patrons of the parish of Leeds, and the patrons and incumbent of the district of Saint George, Leeds, have consented to the said scheme; and one calendar month has expired since the draft thereof was so transmitted to the incumbent of the said parish of Leeds:

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Ripon.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the sixth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend "and render more effectual an Act, passed in the "last session of Parliament, for building, and "promoting the building, of additional churches "in populous parishes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the eighth day of November one thousand eight hundred and forty-four, in the words following, that is to say:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches, appointed by virtue of an Act, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His-Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An. " Act for building, and promoting the building, of "additional churches in populous parishes;" continued by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the seventh and eighth years of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, " and promoting the building, of additional churches "in populous parishes;" and further continued by an Act, passed in the first year of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to prolong, for ten years, " Her Majesty's Commission for building new "churches," beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances attending the parishes of Llandrinio, Llansaintffraid, Meifod, and Guilsfield, in the county of Montgomery and diocese of Saint Asaph, it appears to them to be expedient to uniteand consolidate the contiguous parts of the said parishes of Llandrinio, Llansaintffraid, Meifod, and Guilsfield, into a separate and distinct district to be assigned to the chapel of the Holy Trinity, at Penrhôs, in the parish of Llandrinio, for all. ecclesiastical purposes, and to constitute such district a consolidated chapelry, under the provisions of the sixth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled " An Act to

" amend and render more effectual an Act, passed " in the last session of Parliament, for building, " and promoting the building, of additional " churches in populous parishes," for the purpose of affording accommodation for attending divine service to persons residing in the district, and for enabling the spiritual person serving such chapel to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the said district attached to such chapel, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendence of such district, and the preservation and improvement of the moral habits of the persons residing therein; and that such district should be named, "The Consolidated Chapelry of Penrhôs," and should consist of the westernmost part of the parish of Llandrinio; the southernmost part of the parish of Llansaintffraid; the easternmost part of the parish of Meifod; and the northernmost part of the parish of Guilsfield, and be bounded as follows, that is to say:

: " The boundary commences at that point in the road leading from Oswestry to Pool-quay, where the parishes of Llandysilio and Llandrinio meet, that is, where a bridge crosses Rhysnantdrain, and proceeds, in a southerly direction, along the middle of the road leading from Oswestry to Pool-quay, as far as that point where the parish of Llandrinio meets the parish of Guilsfield; it then turns to the west, along the boundary line of those two parishes till it meets the turnpike road leading from Arddlin to Guilsfield; along the middle of which road it proceeds, in a south westerly direction, as far as the Deep Cutting; when it crosses the canal bridge, and proceeds, in a westerly direction, along the middle of the road leading to the Burnt House and Slipin; it then turns, south westerly, along that road till it meets the road which leads from Guilsfield to the street; up which road it proceeds, northerly, till it meets the parish of Meifod, near Cefn Rownairth, blacksmith's shop; it then proceeds along the boundary line of the township of Trefanney, first in a westerly, and then in a northerly, direction till it meets the river Virniew; down which it proceeds, as far as the mouth of of the brook called Nant-y-Sarne, along which it proceeds easterly as far as Trewylan-hall fish pool; thence northerly along the garden and orchard fences of Trewylan-hall; and from thence along the north fence of Trewylan-wood; then easterly along the fences which lie immediately to

the north of Trewylan-cottage, Cein Coed farm-house, and Deuddwr farm-house, near which it meets the parish of Llandysilio, and along the boundary line which separates that parish; first; from that of Llansaintffraid; and secondly, from that of Llandrinio; it proceeds in a south easterly direction till it arrives at that point on the road leading from Oswestry to Pool-quay, where the boundary commenced, as shewn on the plan hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured blue, pink, green, and yellow:

"That the consent of the Lord Bishop of Saint Asaph has been obtained thereto, as required by the said Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Thirdy in testimony whereof, the said Lord Bishop has signed and sealed this present instrument:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed consolidation and assignment be accordingly made and carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Act.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS by an Act, passed in the seventh and eighth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the law respecting "the office of county coroner," it is enacted, that when and as often as it shall seem expedient to the justices of any county, that such county should be divided into two or more districts for the purposes of that Act, or that any alteration should be made of any division theretofore made under that Act, it should be lawful for the said justices, in general or quarter sessions assembled, to resolve

that a petition should be presented to Her Majesty, praying that such division or alteration be made, and thereupon to adjourn the further consideration of such petition until notice thereof should be given to the coroner or coroners of such county as thereinafter provided:

And it is thereby further enacted, that the clerk of the peace should give notice of any such resolution to every coroner for such county, and of the time when the petition would be taken by the said justices into consideration, and the justices should confer with every such coroner who should attend the meeting of the justices for that purpose, touching such petition, having due regard to the size and nature of each proposed district, the number of the inhabitants, the nature of their employments, and such other circumstances as should appear to the justices fit to be considered in carrying into execution the provisions of that Act, and such petition, with a description of the several proposed districts, and of the boundaries thereof, with the reasons upon which the petition is founded, should be certified to Her Majesty, under the hands and seals of two or more of the justices present when such petition should be agreed to and the clerk of the peace for such county should forthwith give or send a true copy of such petition, certified under his hand, to every coroner for such county:

And it is further enacted, that it should be lawful for Her Majesty, if she should think fit, with the advice of Her Privy Council, after taking into consideration every such petition, and also any petition which might be presented to her by any coroner of the same county concerning such proposed division or alteration, or whenever it should seem fit to Her Majesty, to direct the issue of a writ de coronatore eligendo, for the purpose of authorising the election of an additional coroner above the number of those who had been customarily elected to such county, to order that such county should be divided into such and so many districts for the purposes of that Act as to Her Majesty, with the advice aforesaid, should seem expedient, and to give a name to each of such districts, and to determine at what place within each district the court for the election of coroner for such district should be holden as thereinafter provided, and every such order should be published in the London Gazette: and whereas the

HE following is a copy of an Order of Her Majesty in Council, assigning districts, under the 16th section of the 59th Geo. 3, cap. 134, to the chapels at Brymbo and Minera, in the parish of Wrexham, in the county of Denbigh:

At the Court at Buckingham-Palace, the 23d of May 1844, present, the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "that in every case in which the Commissioners appointed for carrying into execution the purposes of the said Act shall be of opinion that it will be expedient to divide any parish into two or more distinct and separate parishes, for all ecclesiastical purposes whatever, it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners, with the consent of the bishop of the diocese in which such parish is locally situated, signified under his hand and seal, to apply to the patron or patrons of the church of such parish for his consent to make such division, and for such patron or patrons to signify his or their consent thereto under his hand and seal; and the said Commissioners shall, upon the consent of the said patron or patrons so signified, represent the whole matter to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which it is proposed, with such consent as aforesaid, to divide such parish, together with the relative and respective proportions of glebe land, tithes, moduses, or other endowments which will by such division arise and accrue, and remain and be, within each of such respective divisions, and also the relative proportions of the estimated amount of the value or produce of fees, oblations, offerings, or other ecclesiastical dues or profits which may arise and accrue within each of such respective divisions; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division; provided always, that no such division of any parish into distinct parishes shall completely take effect until after the death, resignation, or other avoidance of the existing incumbent of the parish to be divided;" and it is by the twenty-first section of the said Act further enacted, "that in any case in which the said Commissioners shall be of opinion that it is not expedient to divide any populous parish, or extra parochial place, into such complete, separate, and distinct parishes as aforesaid, but that it is expedient to divide the same into such ecclesiastical districts as they, with the consent of the bishop, signified under his hand and seal, may deem necessary for the purpose of affording accommodation for the attending divine service, according to the rites of the United Church of England and Ireland, to persons residing therein, in the churches or parochial chapels already built, or in additional churches or chapels to be built therein, and as may appear to such Commissioners to be convenient for the enabling the spiritual person or persons who may serve such churches or chapels to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the districts attached to such respective churches and chapels, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendence of such district, and the preservation and improvement of the religious and moral habits of the persons residing therein, the said Commissioners shall represent such opinion to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such repre-WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His late Majesty King | proposed to be described; and if, thereupon, His sentation the bounds by which such districts are

And whereas by an Act, passed in the fiftyninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners, in the same manner and with the like consents as are required in case of division into ecclesiastical districts under the said hereinbefore recited Act, or the said Act now in recital, to assign a particular district to any chapel of ease or parochial chapel already existing, or to any chapel built, or which might hereafter be built or acquired under the powers of the said former Act, or the said Act now in recital; and such district shall be under the immediate care of the curate appointed to serve such chapel, but subject, nevertheless, to the superintendence and controul of the incumbent of the parish church; and all such curates shall be nominated by the incumbent of the parish to the bishop for his licence, except where the right of nomination shall already be legally vested in any other person or persons, and in every such case by the person or persons pos-sessing such right of nomination, subject to all the laws in force relating to stipendiary curates, except as to the assigning of salaries to such curates; provided always, that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners, with the consent of the bishop of the diocese, to determine whether any and what part or proportion of the fees or dues for marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials shall be assigned to any such curate, and whether banns of marriage shall be published, and marriages or baptisms, churchings or burials, shall be solemnized or performed in any such chapel or not; and in any case in which marriages shall be allowed in any such chapel, the Commissioners shall cause the boundaries of the district assigned to such chapel to be enrolled in the High Court of Chancery, and in the office of the Registry of the diocese, any thing in the said recited Act to the contrary notwithstanding; and no such chapelry shall become a benefice by reason of any augmentation of the maintenance of the curate, by any grant or bounty under the provision of any Act or Acts of Parliament, or law or laws, for augmenting small livings, any thing in such Act or Acts of Parliament, or law or laws, to the contrary notwithstanding:

And whereas by another Act, passed in the seventh and eighth years of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and by another Act, made and passed in the first and second years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the seventh and eighth years of the reign of His late Majesty, intituled 'An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of and is bounded on the north west by the parish of

additional churches in populous parishes;" and also by another Act, made and passed in the second and third years of His said late Majesty, intituled "An Act to render more effectual an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" further provisions are made for carrying such divisions into effect:

And whereas the said Commissioners have made a representation to Her Majesty in Council, bearing date the twenty-sixth day of April one thousand eight hundred and forty-four, in the

words following, viz.

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches, appointed by virtue of an Act, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" continued by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the seventh and eighth years of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and further continued by an Act, passed in the first year of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to prolong, for ten years, Her Majesty's Commission for building new churches;" beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances attending the parish of Wrexham, in the county of Denbigh, and diocese of Saint Asaph, it appears to them to be expedient, that particular districts should be assigned to the consecrated chapels at Brymbo and Minera, in the said parish, under the provisions of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fiftyninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," and that such districts should be named respectively, "The Chapelry District of Brymbo," and "The Chapelry District of Minera," with boundaries as follow:

" The chapelry district of Brymbo is to consist of the township of Brymbo, and part of the township of Broughton, and is bounded on the north east by the parish of Gresford; on the north west by the parish of Hope; on the south west by the township of Minera; on the south by the townships of Bersham and Broughton; and on the south east by the remaining part of the said township of Broughton, from which it is separated by small mountain torrents and an old township road; along which the boundary proceeds in an easterly and northerly direction till it meets the parish of Gresford, as more particularly delineated on the map hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured red:

"The chapelry district of Minera is to consist of the townships of Minera and Esclusham above,

Llandegla; on the west and south by the parish of Ruabon; and on the east by the townships of Esclusham below and Bersham; and on the north east by the township of Brymbo, as is more particularly delineated on the map hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured green:

" "That baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized and performed in the said chapel at Brymbo; and that marriages, churchings, baptisms, and burials should be solemnized and performed in the said chapel at Minera; and that the fees arising therefrom should be received by and belong to the

respective Ministers of the said chapels:

"That the consent of the Lord Bishop of Saint Asaph has been obtained thereto, as required by the above-mentioned section of the said Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third; in testimony whereof, the said Lord Bishop has signed and scaled this present instrument:
