Chapter of the Most Noble Order of the Garter.

A CHAPTER of this Most Noble Order having been summoned for this day, the Knights Companions hereafter named, in their mantles and collars, assembled in the Waterloo Gallery, viz.

His Royal Highness the Duke of Cambridge; the Duke of Rutland; the Duke of Wellington; the Marquess of Anglesey; the Marquess of Exeter; the Duke of Richmond; the Duke of Buccleuch; the Duke of Beaufort; the Duke of Buckingham and Chandos; the Marquess of Salisbury; and the Duke of Cleveland; attended by the following Officers, viz. the Lord Bishop of Winchester, Prelate; the Lord Bishop of Oxford, Chancellor; the Honourable and Reverend the Dean of Windsor, Register; Sir Charles George Young, Knight, Garter Principal King of Arms; and Sir Augustus William James Clifford, Bart. Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod.

At three o'clock, the Knights Companions were called over by Garter, when (Her Majesty and the Prince Albert having passed into the Throne Room) they, together with the Officers of the Order, proceeded through the Grand Reception Room into the presence of the Sovereign.

The Sovereign being seated in Her chair of state, and His Royal Highness the Prince Albert at the table, on the right hand of Her Majesty, the other Knights Companions took their respective places at the table, the Prelate standing on the right hand and the Chancellor on the left hand of the Sovereign, the Register, Garter, and Black Rod, at the bottom of the table.

The Chancellor then, by command of Her Majesty, read a new statute, dispensing with the existing statutes, in as far as might be required for the especial purpose therein mentioned, and decreeing, ordaining, and enjoining, that His Royal Highness **ERNEST THE SECOND**, Reigning Duke of Saxe Coburg and Gotha (brother in law of Her Most Excellent Majesty the Queen), be declared a Knight of this Most Noble Order, any statute, decree, rule, or usage to the contrary notwithstanding.

His Royal Highness the Prince Albert and His Royal Highness the Duke of Cambridge, the two senior Knights Companions present, thereupon retired from the Chapter Room, when, by the Sovereign's command, the Reigning Duke of Saxe Coburg and Gotha was conducted from the Grand Reception Room between their Royal Highnesses, preceded by Garter (bearing the ensigns of the Order upon a crimson velvet cushion) and by Black Rod.

On entering the Chapter Room, His Royal Highness was received by the Sovereign and the Knights Companions standing.

The Sovereign then announced to His Royal Highness, that he had been declared elected a Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter.

Garter, kneeling, then presented the garter to the Sovereign, and Her Majesty, assisted by His Royal Highness the Prince Albert and His Royal Highness the Duke of Cambridge, buckled it on the left leg of His Royal Highness the Duke of Saxe Coburg and Gotha, the Chancellor pronouncing the admonition.

Garter next presented, in like manner, the ribband with the George, and the Sovereign, assisted as before, put the same over the left shoulder of His Royal Highness, the Chancellor pronouncing the admonition.

The Sovereign then gave the Accolade to the Reigning Duke, who afterwards, passing round the table, received the congratulations of each of the Knights Companions present, and then took his seat in a chair of state, on the right hand of the Sovereign.

The Chancellor then signified to the Chapter, Her Majesty's royal will and pleasure, that the four vacant stalls in the Royal Chapel of Saint George, at Windsor, be filled; and, as by the statutes none but a Knight can be elected, the Right Honourable Thomas Philip Earl De Grey was introduced by Garter and Black Rod, and knighted by Her Majesty with the sword of state, and his Lordship, having kissed the Sovereign's hand, retired; after which

The Most Honourable James Marquess of Abercorn and the Right Honourable Edward Earl of Powis were severally and successively introduced and knighted, with the same ceremonies.

The Knights Companions then proceeded to the election, and the suffrages, having been collected by the Chancellor, were by him presented to the Sovereign, who commanded him to declare, and he accordingly declared, that the Right Honourable Thomas Philip Earl De Grey had been duly elected a Knight Companion of the Most Noble Order of the Garter.

Then, by the Sovereign's command, his Lordship was received, at the door of the Chapter Room, by the Marquess of Salisbury and the Duke of Cleveland, the two junior Knights Companions, and conducted between them to Her Majesty, preceded by Garter (bearing the ensigns upon a crimson velvet cushion) and by Black Rod; Earl De Grey, kneeling near the Sovereign, and Garter, on his knee, presenting the garter, Her Majesty, assisted by His Royal Highness Prince Albert and His Royal Highness the Duke of Cambridge, the two senior Knights Companions present, buckled it on his Lordship's left leg, the Chancellor pronouncing the admonition.

Garter next presented, in like manner, the ribband and George, and Her Majesty, assisted as before, put the same over his Lordship's left shoulder, the Chancellor pronouncing the admonition. The Earl De Grey then again kissed the Sovereign's hand, and, having received the congratulations of each of the Knights Companions, retired.

The Chapter then proceeded to a *second* election, and the suffrages, having been collected by the Chancellor, were presented to the Sovereign, when the Most Honourable James Marquess of Abercorn was, by the Sovereign's command, declared duly elected, and introduced; and, having been invested with the garter, and the ribband and George, with the like ceremonies, retired.

The Chapter then proceeded to a *third* election, and the suffrages having been collected and presented as before, the Right Honourable Charles Chetwynd Earl Talbot, late Knight of the Most Illustrious Order of St. Patrick (the ensigns of which he had, previously to the Chapter, surrendered to the Sovereign), was, by the Sovereign's command, declared duly elected, and introduced; and, having been invested with the garter, and the ribband and George, with the same ceremonies, retired.

The Chapter then proceeded to a *fourth* election, and the suffrages having been collected and presented as before, the Right Honourable Edward Earl of Powis was, by the Sovereign's command, declared duly elected, and introduced; and, having been invested with the garter, and the ribband and George, with the same ceremonies, retired.

The Chapter being ended, Garter, by Her Majesty's command, again called over the Knights Companions, who, with the Officers of the Order, retired from the presence of the Sovereign, with the usual reverences.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the seventh year of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for rendering more easy the taking the poll at county elections," it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time, on petition from the justices of any county, riding, parts, or division, in England or Wales, in quarter sessions assembled; representing, that the number of polling places for such county, riding, parts, or division, is insufficient, and praying, that the place or places mentioned in the said petition may be a polling place or polling places for the county, riding, parts, or division of the county within which such place or places is or are situate, to declare, that any place or places mentioned in the said petition shall be a polling place or polling places for that county, riding, parts, or division, and that the justices of the peace for such county, riding, parts, or division, in quarter sessions or some special sessions assembled; as mentioned in the Act, passed in the third year of the reign of His said late Majesty, intituled "An Act to settle and determine the divisions of counties, and the limits of cities and boroughs, in England and Wales, in so far as respects the election of Members to serve in Parliament," shall, conformably to the said last-mentioned Act, divide such county, riding, parts, or division, into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place:

And whereas the justices of the peace for the county of Northumberland, at a general quarter sessions of the peace, holden at Alnwick, in and for the said county, on the sixteenth day of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-four, have presented their petition to Her Majesty, representing, that the number of polling places for the northern division of the said county is insufficient, and therefore praying, that the town of Belford, situate within the said northern division, may be a polling place for that division:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken the said petition into consideration, doth, pursuant to the said Act of the seventh year of His late Majesty's reign, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, declare, order, and direct, that the said place named in the said petition, namely, the town of Belford, shall be a polling place for the northern division of the said county of Northumberland; and, further, that the justices of the peace for the said county of Northumberland, assembled at the general quarter sessions or some special sessions, as mentioned in the said Act of the third year of His late Majesty's reign, shall, conformably to the said last-mentioned Act, divide the said northern division of the said county of Northumberland into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the second and third years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An

"Act, for regulating the police courts in the metropolis," it was, amongst other things enacted, that it should be lawful for Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council, to alter the number of the police courts, and to order such changes to be made of the places in which they should be holden within the Metropolitan Police District as should be found expedient, and every such court should thenceforth be holden in the place in or to which it should be so ordered to be established or removed;

And whereas also by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for better defining the powers of justices within the Metropolitan Police District," it was, amongst other things, enacted, "that it should be lawful for Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, to constitute within the Metropolitan Police District so many police court divisions as to her Majesty should seem fit, and to define the extent thereof, and, from time to time, to alter the number and extent of such police court divisions, and to assign a division to each of the police courts already established, and to establish a police court for such of the other divisions."

BOW-STREET POLICE COURT.

Her Majesty, therefore, is pleased, with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order and direct, and it is hereby ordered and directed, that the space included within the following boundary, the same being within the Metropolitan Police District (that is to say), from the boundary of the city of London, at the Temple-stairs, on the river Thames, in a line running along the said boundary as far as Holborn-hill; thence westward along Holborn, including both sides thereof to King-street; thence northward along the centre thereof, and of Southampton-row and Woburn-place to the New-road; thence westward along the centre thereof to Tottenham-court-road; thence southward along the centre thereof, and of High-street, Great and Little Saint Andrew-streets, and Saint Martin's-lane to Trafalgar-square; thence westward, including the said square, to Pall-mall, and along the centre thereof, and of Cleveland-row to the boundary of the Green-park; thence along the boundary thereof, and of Saint James's-park (including Buckingham Palace and grounds) to

Storey's-gate; thence along the centre of Great George-street and Bridge-street to the river Thames, on the north side of Westminster-bridge; and thence along the said river to the Temple-stairs aforesaid, shall, from and after the twenty-eighth day of December instant, constitute a police court division, and be assigned to the police court called Bow-street Police Court.

QUEEN-SQUARE POLICE COURT.

And Her Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the space included within the following boundary, the same being within the Metropolitan Police District (that is to say), from the river Thames, on the south side of Westminster-bridge, in a line running westward along the boundary of the district assigned to Bow-street Police Court, as far as Hyde-park-corner; thence along the centre of the Knightsbridge-road, and of Queen's-buildings, Brompton-row, Michael's-place, and the Fulham-road, to Stamford-bridge; thence southward along the Kensington Canal to the river Thames; and thence along the said river to the south side of Westminster-bridge as aforesaid; shall, from and after the twenty-eighth day of December instant, constitute a police court division, and be assigned to the police court now established in Queen-square, Westminster, and known by the name of Queen-square Police Court, until the erection of a Court-house on the north side of Vincent-square, in the parish of Saint John the Evangelist, Westminster, in the county of Middlesex, and within the said Metropolitan Police District, and that, immediately upon the completion of such court-house, the said police court shall thenceforth be holden therein at Vincent-square aforesaid, for the said last-mentioned division, by the name of the Westminster Police Court.

MARY-LE-BONE POLICE COURT.

And Her Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the space included within the following boundary, the same being within the Metropolitan Police District (that is to say), from the Victoria-gate, Hyde-park, in a line running eastward along the boundary of the district assigned to Marlborough-street Police Court as far as Tottenham-court-road; thence along the centre of the New-road to the corner of Upper Seymour-

street; thence northward along the boundary of the district of the Clerkenwell Police Court to Maiden-lane, near the North Cemetery; thence south westward to Shoot-up-hill; thence to and including Kilburn; thence to Westbourne-green (including the same); thence along the Green-lane and Pickering-place to Queen's-road; and thence along the same to Victoria-gate aforesaid, shall, from and after the twenty-eighth day of December instant, constitute a police court division, and be assigned to the police court called Mary-le-bone Police Court.

MARLBOROUGH-STREET POLICE COURT.

And Her Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the space included within the following boundary, the same being within the Metropolitan Police District (that is to say), from the Victoria-gate, Hyde-park, in a line running eastward along the boundary of the park to Oxford-street; thence along the said street (including both sides thereof) to Regent-street; thence northward along the centre thereof, and of Langham-place, Portland-place, and Park-crescent East, to the New-road; thence along the centre thereof to Tottenham-court-road; thence along the boundary of the district assigned to Bow-street Police Court, as far as Hyde-park-corner; thence along the centre of the Knightsbridge-road to the Park-gate opposite the Camden Arms public-house; thence along the boundary of Kensington-gardens, including Kensington-palace and gardens, to Victoria-gate aforesaid, shall, from and after the twenty-eighth day of December instant, constitute a police court division, and be assigned to the police court called Marlborough-street Police Court.

CLERKENWELL POLICE COURT.

And Her Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the space included within the following boundary, the same being within the Metropolitan Police District (that is to say), from the boundary of the city of London in Type-street, in a line running northward along the boundary of the district of the Worship-street Police Court to Stamford-hill; thence westward along Hanger-lane to Hornsey-lane, and along the same to Maiden-lane; thence along the same to the Camden-road; thence along the centre thereof

to the Red Cap public-house; thence along the centre of High-street, in Camden-town, and of Upper Seymour-street, to the New-road; thence along the boundary of the district assigned to Bow-street Police Court to the boundary of the city of London on Holborn-hill; and thence along the said city boundary to Bunhill-row aforesaid, shall, from and after the twenty-eighth day of December instant, constitute a police court division, and be assigned to the police court called the Clerkenwell Police Court.

WORSHIP-STREET POLICE COURT.

And Her Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the space included within the following boundary, the same being within the Metropolitan Police District (that is to say), from the boundary of the city of London in Whitechapel High-street, in a line running eastward along the boundary of the district of the Thames Police Court to the river Lea; thence northward along the Northern and Eastern Railway to High-bridge; thence westward to Stamford-hill tollgate (including the same); thence southward to and along the centre of Kingsland-road to the Regent's Canal; thence westward along the same to Ashley-crescent; thence along the centre thereof, Vaughan-terrace, and Shepherdess-walk (including Saint Luke's workhouse); thence along the centre of Bath-street, of Bunhill-row, and of Type-street, to the boundary of the city of London; and thence along the same to Whitechapel High-street aforesaid; shall, from and after the twenty-eighth day of December instant, constitute a police court division, and be assigned to the police court called the Worship-street Police Court.

THAMES POLICE COURT, STEPNEY.

And Her Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the space included within the following boundary, the same being within the Metropolitan Police District (that is to say), from the river Thames, at Tower-stairs, in a line running along the boundary of the city of London to Whitechapel High-street; thence eastward along the centre thereof and of Whitechapel-road and Mile-end-road to Globe-lane; thence along the centre thereof to the southern side of the

Eastern Counties Railway; thence eastward to the Hackney-cut; thence southward along the same to Bow-bridge; thence along the river Lea to the river Thames; and thence along the said river Thames to Tower-stairs aforesaid; shall, from and after the twenty-eighth day of December instant, constitute a police court division, and be assigned to the police court called the Thames Police Court, Stepney.

SOUTHWARK POLICE COURT.

And Her Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the police court, now established in Union-street, Southwark, and known by the name of Union-hall Police Court, shall, from and after the twenty-eighth day of December instant, be removed therefrom to a certain building lately erected in Blackman-street, Southwark, in the parish of Saint George the Martyr, in the county of Surrey, and within the Metropolitan Police District, and shall be henceforth there holden by the name of the Southwark Police Court; and that the space included within the following boundary, the same being within the Metropolitan Police District (that is to say), from the river Thames, on the south east side of Waterloo-bridge, in a line running southward along the boundary of the district assigned to the Lambeth Police Court, till it meets the boundary of the Greenwich Police Court District; thence northward along the said last-mentioned boundary to the river Thames; and thence along the said river to the south east side of Waterloo-bridge as aforesaid, shall constitute a police court division, and be assigned to the police court to be called the Southwark Police Court, as hereinbefore mentioned.

LAMBETH POLICE COURT.

And Her Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the police court now established in the parish of Saint Mary, Whitechapel, and known by the name of Lambeth-street Police Court, shall, from and after the twenty-eighth day of December instant, be removed therefrom to a certain building lately erected in Kennington-lane, in the parish of Saint Mary, Lambeth, in the county of Surrey, and within the Metropolitan Police District, and shall be thenceforth there

holden, by the name of the Lambeth Police Court; and that the space included within the following boundary, the same being within the said Metropolitan Police District (that is to say), from the river Thames, on the south west side of Waterloo-bridge, in a line running along the centre of the Waterloo-road, the London-road, the New Kent-road, and the Kent-road, to the boundary of the district assigned to the Greenwich Police Court; thence westward along the said boundary in a straight line to the boundary of the Wandsworth Police Court District; thence along the said boundary to the river Thames; and thence along the said river Thames to the south west side of Waterloo-bridge aforesaid, shall constitute a police court division, and be assigned to the police court to be called the Lambeth Police Court, as hereinbefore mentioned.

And the Right Honourable Sir James Graham, Bart. one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly. C. C. Greville.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the third day of December one thousand eight hundred and forty-four, in the words following, that is to say:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches, appointed by virtue of an Act, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," continued by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the seventh and eighth years of

the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and further continued by an Act, passed in the first year of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to prolong, for ten years, Her Majesty's Commission for building new churches," beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances attending the parish of Painswick, in the county of Gloucester and diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, it appears to them to be expedient, that a particular district should be assigned to the church of the Holy Trinity, at the Slad, in the said parish, under the provisions of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and that such district should be named, "The Chapelry District of Slad," and be bounded as follows (that is to say):

"On the north by the parishes of Pitchcomb and Stroud; on the west and south by the parishes of Stroud and Bisley; on the south east by the tything of Shepscombe; and on the north east by the tything of Spoonbed and Edge, in the parish of Painswick, as is more particularly delineated on the map hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured pink:

"That baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized and performed in the said church; and that the fees arising therefrom should be received by and belong to the Minister thereof:

"That the consent of the Lord Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol has been obtained thereto, as required by the above-mentioned section of the said Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third; in testimony whereof, the said Lord Bishop has signed and sealed this present instrument:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal con-

sideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the map thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment be accordingly made, and the recommendations of the said Commissioners, in respect of the solemnization baptisms, churchings, and burials, and the fees arising therefrom, be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Act.
