the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building "and promoting the building, of additional churches "in populous parishes;" and further centinued by an Act, passed in the first year of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to prolong, for ten years, " Her Majesty's Commission for building new "churches," beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances attending the parish of Painswick, in the county of Gloucester and diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, it appears to them to be expedient, that a particular district should be assigned to the church of the Holy Trinity, at the Slad, in the said parish, under the provisions of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, infituled " An Act "to amend and render more effectual an Act, "passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of ad-"ditional churches in populous parishes;" and that such district should be named, "The Chapelry District of Slad," and be bounded as follows (that is to say):

"On the north by the parishes of Pitchcomb and Strond; on the west and south by the parishes of Strond and Bisley; on the south east by the tything of Shepscombe; and on the north east by the tything of Spoonbed and Edge, in the parish of Painswick, as is more particularly delineated on the map hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured pink:

"That baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized and performed in the said church; and that the fees arising therefrom should be received by and belong to the Minister thereof:

"That the consent of the Lord Bishop of Gioucester and Bristol has been obtained thereto, as required by the above-mentioned section of the said Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third; in testimony whereof, the said Lord Bishop has signed and sealed this present instrument:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal con-

sideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the map thereunto anaexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment be accordingly made, and the recommendations of the said Commissioners, in respect of the solemnization baptisms, churchings, and burials, and the fees arising therefrom, be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Act.
