

## THAMES POLICE COURT, STEPNEY.

And Her Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the space included within the following boundary, the same being within the Metropolitan Police District (that is to say), from the river Thames, at Tower-stairs, in a line running along the boundary of the city of London to Whitechapel High-street; thence eastward along the centre thereof and of Whitechapel-road and Mile-end-road to Globe-lane; thence along the centre thereof to the southern side of the Eastern Counties Railway; thence eastward to the Hackney-cut; thence southward along the same to Bow-bridge; thence along the river Lea to the river Thames; and thence along the said river Thames to Tower-stairs aforesaid; shall, from and after the twenty-eighth day of December instant, constitute a police court division, and be assigned to the police court called the Thames Police Court, Stepney.

## SOUTHWARK POLICE COURT.

And Her Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the police court, now established in Union-street, Southwark, and known by the name of Union-hall Police Court, shall, from and after the twenty-eighth day of December instant, be removed therefrom to a certain building lately erected in Blackman-street, Southwark, in the parish of Saint George the Martyr, in the county of Surrey, and within the Metropolitan Police District, and shall be henceforth there holden by the name of the Southwark Police Court; and that the space included within the following boundary, the same being within the Metropolitan Police District (that is to say), from the river Thames, on the south east side of Waterloo-bridge, in a line running southward along the boundary of the district assigned to the Lambeth Police Court, till it meets the boundary of the Greenwich Police Court District; thence northward along the said last-mentioned boundary to the river Thames; and thence along the said river to the south east side of Waterloo-bridge as aforesaid, shall constitute a police court division, and be assigned to the police court to be called the Southwark Police Court, as hereinbefore mentioned.

## LAMBETH POLICE COURT.

And Her Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the police court now established in the parish of Saint Mary, Whitechapel, and known by the name of Lambeth-street Police Court, shall, from and after the twenty-eighth day of December instant, be removed therefrom to a certain building lately erected in Kennington-lane, in the parish of Saint Mary, Lambeth, in the county of Surrey, and within the Metropolitan Police District, and shall be thenceforth there holden, by the name of the Lambeth Police Court, and that the space included within the following boundary, the same being within the said Metro-

politan Police District (that is to say), from the river Thames, on the south west side of Waterloo-bridge, in a line running along the centre of the Waterloo-road, the London-road, the New Kent-road, and the Kent-road, to the boundary of the district assigned to the Greenwich Police Court; thence westward along the said boundary in a straight line to the boundary of the Wandsworth Police Court District; thence along the said boundary to the river Thames; and thence along the said river Thames to the south west side of Waterloo-bridge aforesaid, shall constitute a police court division, and be assigned to the police court to be called the Lambeth Police Court, as hereinbefore mentioned.
