## By the KING,

A Proclamation against Spreading of a Traiterous Declaration Published by James Duke of Monmouth.

JAMES R.

Hereas James Duke of Monmouth in order to Excite and Stir up Our Subjects to joyn with bim in a Rebellion against Us, bath lately by his Rebellious Emisfaries, Published and Dispersed a most Vile and Traiterous Paper, against Us and our Government, Entituled, The Decla-ration of James Duke of Monmouth, and the Noblemen, Gentlemen and others now in Arms, for Defence and Vindication of the Protestant Religion, and of the Laws, Rights and Priviledges of England from the Invasion made upon them, and for Delivering the Kingdom, from the Usurpation and Tyranny of Us, by the Name of Fames Duke of York: which Paper Our Lords Spiritual and Temporal, Affembled in Parliament, bave Justy Condemned to be Burnt by the Hands of the Common Hangman, as Containing the Highest of Treasons, which the utmost Malice of Our most Implicable Enemies could faisly contrive at gainst Us: We out of Our Princely Grace and Tenderness to Our Subjects, less any of them through Ignorance of the Darger, they will inevitably incur thereby, may be missed to Receive and Entertain the said Traiterous Paper, or to Publish the same to others their Fellow-Subjects, bave thought fit with the Advice of Our Privy Council, bereby to give Notice thereof, to all Our Loving Subjects, und do bereby strictly Charge and Command all Our Lieutenants, Deputy-Lieutenants, Sheriffs, Justices of the Peace, Majors, Bayliffs, Headboroughs, High-Consta-bles, Petty-Constables, and all other Our Officers Mili-tary and Civil, and all and every Our Loving Subjests within this Our Realmof England, Dominion of Walcs, and Town of Nerwick upon Tweed, that they Apprehend and Cause to be Apprehended, all and every Person and Persons, who shall rublish, Disperse or Entertain without Discovery thereof to the next Justice of the Peace, the said Traiterous Paper, to the End they may be Proceeded against as Traytors to Us, Our Crown and Digniby, as they will Answer the Contrary at their Peril.

Given at Our Court at Whitehall the Fifteenth day of fane 1685. And in the First year of Our Reign. GOD SAVE THE KING.

Hereas an Humble Address bath been made unto Us by Our Commons Afgembled in Parliament, That We by Our Proclamation would please to promise a Reward of Five Thousand Pounds to such Person or Persons who shall Bring in the Person of James Duke of Monmouth Alive or Dead; And whereas the said James Duke of Monmouth Hands Attainted of High Treasun by Alt of Paliament; We do hereby by the Advice of Our Privy Council, Pub'is and Declare Our Royal Promise and Our Will and Pleasure, That whosoever shall Bring in the Body of the said James Duke of Monmouth either Dead or Alive, shall Receive and Have the Reward of Five Thousand Pounds, to be forthwith Paid by Our High Treasurer of England, for such bis or their Service.

Given at Our Court at Whitehal the Sixteenth day of June, 1685. In the First Year of Our Reign.

GOD SAVE THE KING.

Whitehal, Fune 17. We have an account that the Rebels are Marched out of Lyme. There has been some small Action at a place called Bridport about six Miles from Lyme. On Sunday last about three a Clock in the Morning the Late Duke of Monmouth Marched out of Lyme with about 60 Horse and 120 Foot, and went with them two Miles, but then lest them to be Commanded by the late Lord Gray (as one of the Rebels has Consessed since he was taken) whose Horse was shot under him and he forced to pull off his Boots that he might the b trer make his cleape. The Rebels came into Bridport string their Guns and Pistols very thick, and some of them attacked an Inn where they found about 10 Hores and killed Mr. Wadham Strangways, and Mr. Edward Coaker, and wounded Mr. Harvy who lives near Sperborne, during which time the rest of the Gentlemen who were Volontiers, and the Soldiers got to their Arms, charged the Rebels, killed about seven of them and look 23 of them Prisoners, and made the rest run, leaving about 40 of their Musquets behind them; but they carried off one of their Officers that was killed.

The King has fent feveral Officers with some Troops to the West, where all things are in a good posture, the Gentry and Militia being very forward to shew their Duty and Loyalty to His Majesty: And we do not hear of any one Gentleman or Person of Note gone in to the Rebels.

Edinburg, June 11. We have a Letter of Yesterdays date from Glasow, giving an account that the late Earl of Argile was Marching with a Design (as he gave our) to fight the Marquis of Atbol, who is much longing to meet him; and that the Traytor had brought his Ships under the shelter of the Castle of Ellangreg; but that Captain Hamilton was waiting for an opportunity to burn them; which he was consident he might do, whenever the wind should be fair for his Sailing towards the Castle, And it is also certified from the Coast of Argile, that Captain Hamilton was seen Sailing with a fair wind to the Castle; So that we do not doubt but we shall in a very short time have a good account both of the Ships and the Rebels.

Vienna, fune 7. General Schultz, according to our iran Upper Hungary, was still before the Cattle of Orgman, the believed making a very refoluce defence, expecting relief from Count Teckeley, who for that purpole is drawing his Troops together. I've elector of Bavaria is expected here in few days; The Recruits and the new Troops which his El ctoral Highnels hath railed to reinforce his Proops in Bungary are on their March, under the Command of the Count de Serini. The Duke of Lorrain is still here, but will part to morrow or next day for Hungary, intending to be at the General Rend zvous of the Imperial Forces b tween Lementz and Newbeusel on the 11 or 12 of this Month; The Lunenhurg Troops are now on their, March th ther; and we are affored by feveral Perfons who have feen them, that they are 10000 fighting Men, very well Cloath d and Armed. The Princes de Conti, de la Roche-Sur-Yon, and de Turenne have been received and trea ed here with great Civility and Respect; They will in few days go on fir Hungary, having with them about 50 or 60 Gentlemen and Officers who intend to accompany them in a Body during the Campigne. They write from Gran that they are inform dby feveral perfors come from Budz. That the Turks do Work with great diligence to repair the F. rtifications of that place ru ned during the Siege, Traing they shall be again attackt by the Christians this Summer; What has been sail of the Grand Signiors intention to be present in Person at the Rendezvo s of his Army at Belgrade, is not confirmed, but on the contrary, the last advices from the Turkith Territories tell us he would not flir from Adrianople. The Duke of Newburgh, at prefent Elector Palatin, his sent an Express hither to acquaint the Emperor that he has taken Poffession of the Palatinate; That the M. gistrates, Officers and all the Inhabitants have Sworn Fidelity to him, and that he hath put Garifo s into the most considerable We have advice that the Marquis Doria Lieutenant Colonel of the Regiment of Caraffa hath defeated a Party of Hungarians near Schavenitz and hash taken one of the Chiefofthe Rebels Prisoner.

Frank forr, June 13. The Troops which the Elector of Cologue lends to the Emperors affiltance, passed the 11 and 12 instant by this place, being above 8000 Men Horse and Foot; They observe very good order in their March, paying v. ry exactly for their Provisions. The Letters from Heydelberg tell us that the Prince Palatin of Veldentz had sent an E-voy thither to declare some precention he has to pure of the Estate of the Elector Palatin deceased.

Hamburg June 12. The Letters from Warfaw of the 31st. past tell us that the Dyer was at last separated having t ken the necessary resolutions upon the misst important matters that had b en proposed to them. That the King of Poland intended to part in few days from Warfaw for Fawarow; And that he had fent orders to the Troops to March with all the diligence possible to the General Rendezvous which is appointed to be held near Leopo'. That in the mem time the Turks had mide a great incursion. advancing within 12 Miles of Leopol, but that the Sieur Liziniki having got a Budy of Horse together, fell upon them, and put them to flight recovering most of the Booty and Prisoners they had taken. Th: Letters add that the King of Poland had received advice that the Möscovites were bringing a great many Troops towards the Frontiers of Lithudnia; which if true will at least divert the Forces of that Dutchy, that would otherwise be employed in the War against the Turks: We have an account from Copenhagen that the King of Denmark is gone for Norway; From whence he is expected back about the mindle of the next month.

Cologne fune 16. The missurderstanding between the Elector of Cologne and the Magistrates of this City encreases daily; The attempt made the last

week by a Party sent from hence, to seize Colonel Kyrbering within his Electoral Highnesses Percitories has given him great offence; The Greatest part of the Magistrates du diavow the Affion, and lay they have had no part in it, but yet they refule to deliver to his Electoral Highness the Officers who Commanded the faid Party, and the persons by whole O.der it was done, which he demands; And have obliged the Sicur Fabri, who has Refided here feviral years as his Electoral Highnestes Deputy, to leave this City for having spoken too boldly to the Magistrates upon this marter. The Letters from Strafbowg of the 12th, instant tell us, that the Cavalry quartered in Alface were Marching to the General Rendezvous, according to the Orders that have been ent to the several Garisons; and that after they have Aendezvouzed they will be divided and encamped in feveral Bodies. They write from Heydelberg of the 14 instant that an Envoy was arrived there from France being fent by the Duke of Orleans to him the Moveables of the Elector Palatin deceased; in right of his Wife Sifter to the faid Elector.
And that they were furnishing the Castle of Manheim, which their new Elector intends shall be the place of his Ordinary Rendence.

Bruffels, June 22. The 19th instant Dyed at Marim nt the Marquis de Grana Governor General of tic Spanish Natherlands; His Body being opened, they found two Stones, one whereof had hindered the Puffage of his Water, which was the cause of his Death; The Corps was carried to English where it was Interred yesterday. Paris. June 25. The Clergy now affembled at St. Germains have granted his Most Christian Majesty three Millions of Livers which he had demanded of them. We have an account from Marfeilles that 15 French Gallies Sailed from thence the 4th. instant, under the Command of the Duke of Mortemar taking their Couse to the Eastward. The Letters from Madrid confirm the news of the Queen of Spain's being with Child.
