

# The London Gazette.

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Whitehall, July 4.

**I**N our last you had an account that the Rebels were at *Shepton Mallet*; From thence they went to *Wells*, where they robbed and defaced the Cathedral Church Drinking their Villanous Healths at the Altar, plundered the Town, ravished the Women and committed all manner of Outrages. From *Wells* they marched to *Glassenbury*; and came on Thursday to *Bridgwater*.

The Earl of *Feversham* marched on Thursday last with His Majesties Forces from *Frome* to *Shepton Mallet*, and on Friday to *Somerton* to observe the Rebels, who seem as if they would defend themselves in *Bridgwater*. His Lordship has forbid all persons to give them any succor or assistance upon pain of being treated as Rebels.

Yesterday His Majesty went to see the three Scotch Regiments which were drawn up on *Black-Heath*; and was extremely pleased with them, and gave them great Commendations; And this morning they passed through *London* in their march to the *West*.

*Edinburgh, July 1.* Yesterday being the day appointed for the execution of the late Earl of *Argyle*, he was accordingly carried to the Cross near unto which he was beheaded upon a Scaffold erected for that purpose; His Head is ordered to be affixed upon the *Tolbooth*, and his Body is laid in *St. Magdalens Chapel* in the *Cowgate*. This Execution was in pursuance of his former Conviction and Sentence, there having been no need of forming a Process against him for his late Rebellion. He made no Speech upon the Scaffold, but delivered a Canting Paper to the Dean of *Edinburgh* (who together with Mr. *Charters* were with him there) to be given to my Lord Chancellor, declaring that he had neither directly nor indirectly left any other Speech or Paper upon this occasion. Some hours after his Execution, we had the certain news of the taking of Sir *John Cochran* and his Son *John* (who was reported to have been killed the day that *Rumbold* and *Ayliffe* were taken) with a third person, whose name is not known, but it is said he is a Stranger; They were taken at a place called *Cocheran* at the House of an Uncle of Sir *Johns*, where they had hid themselves; And are expected here this night or to morrow morning. We omitted in our last to tell you that . . . . *Stuart* the younger of *Culneist*, (who was in the late Rebellion) is also taken. As well the Highlanders as several Parties of His Majesties standing Forces are in diligent search of the rest of the Rebels who lurk up and down the Country in holes. *Ayliff* is still at *Glasgow* in a way of recovery, and it is expected he will be shortly brought hither.

*Warsaw, May 25.* This week the Senate met, as is usual after the breaking up of the Dyets, where it was among other things proposed to send a Solemn Embassy to the Czars of *Moscovy*; but after some debate it was resolved to stay till the Envoy, that is sent thither is come back, and has given an account

of the disposition that Court is in to main the Peace with this Crown. The King has appointed the General Rendezvous of the Army to be on the 25th of the next month near *Leopol*; The Forces of *Poland* will be 30000 men; and those of *Lithuania* 10000 besides the Cossacks and the Auxiliary Troops of *Brandenburgh* and *Courland*. We have advic that the Tartars have conducted a great Convoy of Provisions and Ammunition to *Caminnic*; And that on the other side the Cossacks have drawn a great Party of that Garrison into an Ambush, and cut them all in pieces. The Imperial Envoy had some days ago Audience of the King, to whom he gave an account of the state of the Emperors Troops, and how they will be employed this Campaign; They amount we are told to seventy thousand men besides the National Troops of *Hungary* and *Croatia*, and those that may be drawn out of several Garisons. The Pops Nuntio hath assured the King that the Pope will send him a considerable supply of money for the Service of this Campaign. The Chevalier *de Lubomirski*, who commanded the last Summer a Regiment of Horse in the Emperors Service is lately dead here. The King and Queen are gone to *Vikarous*, from whence the King will go the beginning of the next month to *Leopol*.

*Naples, June 24.* The Duke of *Turris*'s Squadron of Gallies is arrived in this Port, and will in few days be ready to Sail again with those of this Kingdom, *Sicily* and *Sardinia*, in all to the number of 19, towards the *Levant*.

*Venice, June 23.* We are told from *Dalmatia*, that the Batta of *Bossina* who was to have marched with the Troops under his Command to *Hungary*, hath now received orders from the Grand Signior to remain on the Frontiers, to secure that Country against the Incurfions of the Morlaques. By a Vessel arrived from *Corfu* we have advic, that the Auxiliary Gallies were gone from thence towards *Prevesa* to joyn the Fleet commanded by Captain General *Morofini*. That Signior *Molino* was with his Squadron at *Thine*; And Signior *Delfino* with that under his Command at *Cerigo*, having both Orders to joyn the Fleet. It is confirmed that the Turkish Fleet is at Sea, consisting in 60 Gallies and 20 Men of War; and that the Batta who commands them has Orders to fight the Fleet of this State.

*Vienna, June 20.* The Imperial Army commanded by the Duke of *Lorraine* is encamped near *Gran*; We are told it consists at present of 30000 men, and that it will be very suddenly reinforced with 15000 more of several Princes of the Empire, which are now on their march. The Duke of *Lorraine* having since his arrival at the Army, held a Council of War; it was resolved in the first place to attack *Novigrad*, to cut off by that means the communication between *Buda* and *Newbeusel*; And afterwards to Besiege *Newbeusel*. Colonel *Heusler* has been with 1000 Horse as far as *Pest*. He met a Party of 500 Turkish Horse, who upon sight of him retired in great haste and disorder. The Turks have repaired the Fortifications of *Buda*, which were ruined during the late Siege; and the Vicer who

now commands there hath caused the Suburbs to be pull'd down, and intends to raise some new works which will verry much add to the strength of the place; there are at present 10000 men in Garison; Ten thousand more are encamped between *Bula* and *Alba Regalis*, and 30000 have it's said pass'd the Bridge of *Esseck*, and are marching to jyn them. General *Schultz* hath sent an Officer hither to inform the Emperor of the reasons that obliged him to raise the Siege of *Ungwar*, the chief of which was, That the Intelligence he had with some persons in the Town was discovered; He is since marched with the Troops under his Command towards Count *Tockeley* with a resolution to fight him, or to hinder, his conjunction with the Turks and Tartars which the Grand Visier hath promised to send to his assistance. The Recruits for the Troops of *Bavaria* are gone for *Hungary*; And all the Imperial Regiments that have had their Winter Quarters in *Bohemia* and *Silesia* are marching thither. The Count *de Eslerbass* Palatin of *Hungary* is still here to settle several matters concerning the pay and subsistence of the 8000 Hungarians which he hath undertaken to bring into the Emperors Service. The Viceroy of *Croatia* is come hither to receive the Emperors directions concerning the Troops of that Country, and to give the Emperor an account of the posture the Turks are in on that side.

*Cologne, June 26.* The Infantry of our Electors Troops arriv'd the 20th of this month at *Wersheim*, where they would reside themselves a day or two; The Cavalry marched through *Weteravia*. The Troops of the Upper *Rhine* will now in few days begin their march; And the two Companies which the City of *Frankfort* sends to the Emperors assistance, had orders to leave their Quarters as this day; They are to jyn with the Troops of the Lower *Rhine*.

*Hamburg, June 29.* They write from *Copenhagen* that they had an account that the King of *Denmark* was arriv'd at *Christiana* in *Norway*; And that from thence his Majesty intend'd to go to *Druntheim*, *Bergue*, and other the most considerable places in that Country. The Letters from *Berlin* tell us that an Envoy was arriv'd there from the King of *Poland* to sollicite Succors against the Turks; but that he had not yet had Audience of the Elector of *Brandenburg*. Monsieur *Caniz* who has been some time from his Electoral Highness, endeavour to compose the differences depending between the Duke of *Zell* and this City, parted from hence this week to return home in order to give his Electoral Highness an account of the obstacles he hath met with in his Negotiation. They write from *Warsaw* that the King of *Poland* had repeated his Orders to the Troops to hasten their march to the general Rendezvous near *Leopol*, where his Majesty intends to be in person about the 20th of this month; And that he will have an Army of 50000 fighting men. We hear nothing with certainty of the preparations of the Turks; though the common news is that they will only jyn a body of about 20000 men with the Tartars, to act against the *Poles*, intending to turn their main Force towards *Hungary*.

*Paris, July 7.* The King accompanied with the Dauphin and Dauphiness, and the Duke and Dutches of *Orleans* went the 2d Instant to *Mendon*, where they were entertained by Monsieur *de Louvois* with great magnificence. Monsieur *de Saignelay* makes great preparations for the reception and Entertainment of the Court at *Beaux*. We have advice from *Toulon* that the Chevalier *de Tourville* was gone with the Ships under his command from the Road at *Argiers* to jyn the Fleet commanded by the Marschal

After which my Lord Keeper signifi'd His Majesties Pleasure to both Houses, That they should adjourn to the 4th of August next, with intimation that it was not His Majesties intention that there should then be a meeting, but that the Session should be continued by adjournment till towards Winter, by such Members as should be about the Town, unless His Majesties Service should require their sitting sooner, in which case His Majesty would give timely notice by His Royal Proclamation, that all the Members might then give their attendance. And accordingly both Houses severally Adjourn'd to the 4th of August.
