Buckingham-Palace, August 9, 1845.

Royal Highness Prince Albert, proceeded in state from Buckingham-Palace to the House of Peers, where she arrived at a quarter before two o'clock; and was received, on alighting from her state coach, by the Lord Chancellor, the Lord President of the Council, the Lord Privy Seal, Sir Augustus Clifford, Bart. C. B. Deputy Great Chamberlain (in the absence of the Lord Willoughby d'Eresby), the Earl Marshal, the Lord Steward of the Household, the Duke of Wellington, Garter King of Arms, and the Yeoman Usher of the Black Rod, and proceeded to the robing-room in the customary manner.

Her Majesty was there robed, and the procession moved into the House in the usual order;—the sword of state was borne by the Duke of Wellington, and the cap of maintenance by the Marquess of Winchester.

Her Majesty being seated on the Throne, and Ilis Royal Highness Prince Albert on a Chair on the left side of the Cloth of Estate, the Great Officers of State and others standing on the right and left, James Pulman, Esq. Yeoman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a message

from Her Majesty to the House of Commons commanding their attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, Her Majesty was pleased to deliver the following most gracious Speech to both Houses of Parliament:

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

I REJOICE that the state of public business enables me to release you from further attendance in Parliament.

In closing this laborious session, I must express to you my warm acknowledgments for the zeal and assiduity with which you have applied yourselves to the consideration of many subjects deeply affecting the public welfare.

I have given my cordial assent to the Bills which you presented to me for remitting the duties on many articles of import, and for removing restrictions on the free application of capital and skill to certain branches of our manufactures.

The reduction of taxation will necessarily cause an immediate loss of revenue, but I trust that its effect in stimulating commercial enterprize and enlarging the means of consumption will ultimately provide an ample compensation for any temporary sacrifice. I have witnessed with peculiar satisfaction the unremitting attention which you have bestowed on the measures recommended by me to your consideration at the commencement of the session, for improving and extending the means of academical education in Ireland.

You may rely upon my determination to carry those measures into execution in the manner best calculated to inspire confidence in the institutions which have received your sanction, and to give effect to your earnest desire to promote the welfare of that part of my dominions.

From all Foreign Powers, I continue to receive assurances of their friendly disposition towards this country.

The Convention which I have recently concluded with the King of the French, for the more effectual suppression of the slave-trade, will, I trust, by establishing a cordial and active co-operation between the Two Powers, afford a better prospect than has hitherto existed of complete success in the attainment of an object for which this country has made so many sacrifices.

### Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I thank you for the liberality with which you have voted the supplies for the service of the current year.

#### My Lords, and Gentlemen,

On your return to your several counties, duties will devolve upon you scarcely less important than those from the performance of which I now relieve you.

I feel assured that you will promote and confirm, by your influence and example, that spirit of loyalty and contentment which you will find generally prevalent throughout the country.

In the discharge of all the functions intrusted to you for the public welfare, you may confidently rely on my cordial support; and I implore the blessing of Divine Providence on our united efforts to encourage the industry and increase the comforts of my people, and to inculcate those religious and moral principles which are the surest foundation of our security and happiness.

Then the Lord Chancellor, by her Majesty's command, said:

HEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the eighth and ninth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for granting to Her Majesty, "for a term to be limited, certain duties on sugar "imported into the United Kingdom," it is, amongst other things, enacted, that, from and after the fourteenth day of March one thousand eight hundred and forty-five, until the fifth day of July one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, there should be charged, amongst other duties of Customs, the following, that is to say:

On sugar, the growth and produce of China, Java, or Manilla, or of any foreign country, the sugars of which Her Majesty in Council shall have declared, or may hereafter declare, to be admissible as not being the produce of slave labour, and which shall be imported into the United Kingdom either from the country of its growth or from some British possession, having first been imported into such British possession from the country of its growth, the duties following, that is to say:

White clayed sugar, or sugar rendered by any process equal in quality to white clayed, not being £. refined, for every hundred weight Brown sugar, being Muscovado or clayed, or any other sugar, not being equal in quality to white clayed, for every hundred weight

And whereas by the said Act it is further enacted, that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, from time to time, by any Order or Orders in Council, to declare, with respect to any foreign country or countries, that it having appeared to Her Majesty, upon sufficient evidence, that the sugars of such country or countries are not the produce of slave labour, such sugars shall (from and after a day to be named in such Order) be deemed and taken not to be the produce of slave labour; and, from and after the day so to be named in such Order, the brown, Muscovado, or clayed sugar (not being refined), of the country or countries mentioned in such Order, shall be admissible to entry for home consumption at the said respective duties of one pound eight shillings, or of one pound three shillings and four pence, per hundred weight respectively, in like manner as sugar the growth and produce of China, Java, and Manilla:

And whereas it has appeared to Her Majesty, upon sufficient evidence, that the sugars of Siam are not the produce of slave labour:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that, from and after the first day of July one thousand eight hundred and forty-five, the sugars of Siam shall be deemed and taken not to be the produce of slave labour:

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions accordingly.

" Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches, appointed by virtue of an Act, passed in the fifty-eightly year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An " Act for building, and promoting the building, of "additional churches in populous parishes;" continued by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the seventh and eighth years of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, " and promoting the building, of additional churches "in populous parishes;" and further continued by an Act, passed in the first year of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to prolong, for ten years, " Her Majesty's Commission for building new "churches," beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances attending the parish of Croydon, in the county of Surrey and deanery of Croydon, the peculiar and immediate jurisdiction of the cathedral and metropolitical church of Christ, Canterbury, and locally situate within the diocese of Winchester, it appears to them to be expedient, that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church, called All Saints' Church, at Norwood, in the said parish, under the provisions of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fiftyninth year of the reign of His said late Majesty King George the Third, intituled " An Act to " amend and render more effectual an Act, passed " in the last session of Parliament, for building, " and promoting the building, of additional " churches in populous parishes;" and that such district should be named, " The Chapelry District of All Saints, Norwood," with boundaries as follow:

" On or towards the north by the parishes of Lambeth and Streatham, in the said county of Surrey; on or towards the east by the hamlet of of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the Penge, in the detached part of the parish of

Battersea, and by the parish of Beckenham, in the county of Kent; on or towards the west and south by the remaining part of the parish of Croydon, from which it is divided by a line commencing at the point where the parish of Streatham joins the parish of Croydon in the road leading from London to Croydon, opposite to Leather Bottle-lane; whence it proceeds in a south easterly direction, along the middle of such last-mentioned lane, as far as the footway near Collier's Waterfarm, along which said footway it proceeds into Collier's Water-lane, to the bridge in the said lane over a water course, and runs along the said water course to the point where the Croydon Railway crosses the same; whence it proceeds under the said railway in a direct line struck from the centre of the culvert nearly due east to the water course in the hollow between and below the said railway, and Blind-corner and Woodsidegreen, and then proceeds along the middle of the said water course as far as the parish of Beckenham, as shewn by the map, and thereon tinted

"That banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized and performed in the said church, called All Saints' Church; and that the fees arising therefrom should belong and be paid to the present Vicar of Croydon, during his incumbency of that vicarage, but that, from and after his avoidance thereof, the said fees should be received by and belong to the Minister of the said church, called All Saints' Church:

"That the consents of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend William Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, to whose peculiar jurisdiction the said parish of Croydon is subject, and of the Right Reverend Charles Richard Lord Bishop of Winchester, within whose diocese the said parish of Croydon is locally situate, have been obtained thereto, as required by the above-mentioned section of the said Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His said Majesty King George the Third; in testimony whereof, the said William Lord Archbishop of Canterbury and the said Charles Richard Lord Bishop of Winchester have signed and scaled this present instrument:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the map thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment be accordingly made, and the recommendations of the said Commissioners, in respect of the publication of banns, and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, and the fees arising therefrom, be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Act.

" prolong, for ten years, Her Majesty's Commission " for building new churches," beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances attending the parish of Walsall, in the county of Stafford and diocese of Lichfield, it appears to them to be expedient, that particular districts should be assigned to the consecrated churches of Saint Peter, in the town of Walsall, and Saint John, at Walsallwood, both situate in the said parish of Walsall, under the provisions of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled " An Act to amend and render more effectual an " Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, " for building, and promoting the building, of " additional churches in populous parishes;" and that such districts should be, respectively, named, " The Chapelry District of Saint Peter, Walsall," and "The Chapelry District of Saint John, Walsall-wood," and that the boundaries thereof should be as follow:

" The chapelry district of Saint Peter, Walsall, is bounded on the north by the chapelry district of Bloxwich; on the west by a brook which separates the parish of Walsall from the township of Bentley, along which brook it passes in a southerly direction as far as the turnpike road from Wolverhampton to Walsall; on the south by a line drawn in the middle of the turnpike road, running in an easterly direction till it meets the Pleck-road, across which it passes in a straight line to the bend in the Birmingham-canal, where it branches off in a north westerly and south westerly direction; it then passes the canal and proceeds in an easterly direction, along the south bank thereof, as far as the road leading to Dudley's-wharf; then along that road, taking a north easterly direction, across Marsh-lane, down Park-street, passing by the town-machine, up the passage between Mr. Day and Mr. Gray's buildings, into Saint Paul's row; and then turns in a north westerly direction up the middle of the said row to Wisemore-lane, or street, up the middle of which it proceeds in a north easterly direction to Albertstreet; it then proceeds in an easterly direction along Albert-street into Hatherton-street, up which said street it proceeds in a northerly direction until it terminates in the road leading to Aldridge, crosses the said road and joins the boundary line which separates the parish of Walsall from Rushall; and on the north east by the said parish of Rushall, as shewn on the map hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured pink:

"The chapelry district of Saint John, Walsall-wood, is to consist of the whole of the detached part of the said parish of Walsall which is called or known by the name of Walsall-wood, the same being bounded on the north east by the extra parochial place called Ogley Hay; on the east by the parish of Shenstone; on the south by the said parishes of Aldridge and Rushall; on or towards the west by the chapelry of Pelsall, in the parish of Wolverhampton; and on the north west by the parish of Norton, as the same is more particularly delineated on the map hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured green:

"That banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized and performed in both the said churches, and that the fees arising therefrom should belong to the respective Incumbents thereof:

"That the consent of the Right Reverend John Lord Bishop of Lichfield has been obtained thereto, as required by the above-mentioned section of the said Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third; in testimony whereof, the said John Lord Bishop of Lichfield has signed and sealed this present instrument:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches, appointed by virtue of an Act, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled " An " Act for building, and promoting the building, of " additional churches in populous parishes;" continued by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the seventh and eighth years of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, "and promoting the building, of additional "churches in populous parishes;" and further continued by an Act, passed in the first year of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to " prolong, for ten years, Her Majesty's Commission " for building new churches," beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances attending the parish of Saint Mary Abbotts, Kensington, in the county of Middlesex, and within the diocese of London, it appears to them to be expedient, that an ecclesiastical district should, under the twenty-first section of the said Act, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His said late Majesty King George the Third, as enlarged and extended by the twelfth section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the first and second years of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual the "church building Acts," be divided off from the said parish of Saint Mary Abbotts, Kensington, and formed into a district parish, to be assigned to the church called Saint John's Church, recently erected and consecrated and situate at Nottinghill, in the said parish of Saint Mary Abbotts, Kensington, for the purpose of affording accommodation for attending divine service to the persons residing in the said district, and for enabling the spiritual person serving the said church to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the district attached to the said church, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendence of such district, and the preservation and improvement of the moral habits of the persons residing therein; and that such district should be named, "The District Parish of Saint John, Notting-hill," with boundaries as follow:

" The district is bounded on the north by the consolidated chapelry district of Saint John, Kensall-green; on the east by the parish of Paddington; on the south by a line commencing at the point marked A on the map, where the boundaries of the parishes of Kensington and Paddington meet in the Uxbridge-road, and proceeding along the middle of that road in a westerly direction as far as the Mall; it then proceeds down the middle of the Mall, in a southerly and westerly direction, into Silver-street, along the middle of which street it proceeds southerly, as far as the street in which the Reservoircottages are situate, called Reservoir-place, it then turns westerly, up the middle of that street, to the boundary of the property of the West Middlesex Water Company, and proceeds along the southernmost boundary thereof, until it enters the foot-path leading from Notting-hill to Camdenhill, along which foot-path it then proceeds, in a northerly direction, as far as the road called Notting-hill-grove, which runs south of the gardens, at the back of the houses, on the south side of Notting-hill-square, and continues westerly, in a straight line, along the middle of such road, as far as the entrance-gate of Notting hill-house, whence it proceeds in a direct imaginary line drawn westerly in front of the said house, called Notting-hill-house, until it reaches the fence of Holland-park, along which fence it then proceeds northerly until it again enters the Uxbridge-road, when it turns westerly

down the middle of that road as far as Norlandlane, and on the west by proceeding in a northerly direction, along the middle of Norland-lane aforesaid, until it reaches the premises occupied by William Sherman, the property of Benjamin Edward Hall, Esq. whence it proceeds in an easterly direction, along and parallel with the south side of the said last-mentioned premises, until it reaches the old open sewer and a wooden fence, which fence forms the western boundary of the estate of James Weller Ladbroke, Esq. called the Kensington-park Estate, and the south westerly boundary of the St. Quentin, Esq. and then estate of proceeds along the said fence to the boundary line which divides the parish of Kensington from the parish of Hammersmith, and then proceeds along the said boundary line as far as the consolidated chapelry district of Saint John, Kensall-green, as is more particularly delineated on the map hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured yellow:

"That the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Charles James Lord Bishop of London has been obtained thereto, as required by the above-mentioned section of the said Act, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His said late Majesty King George the Third; in testimony whereof, the said Charles James Lord Bishop of London has signed and sealed this present instrument:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the map thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed division and assignment be accordingly made and carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts.

This day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod,

acquainting them, that The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by Her Majesty, for declaring Her Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act for facilitating execution of the treaties with France and the United States of America for the apprehension of certain offenders.

An Act to facilitate the admission in evidence of certain official and other documents.

An Act to facilitate the granting of leases.

An Act to render the assignment of satisfied terms unnecessary.

An Act for the abolition of certain fees in criminal proceedings.

An Act to facilitate the conveyance of real property.

An Act to amend the laws relating to the removal of poor persons born in Scotland, Ireland, the islands of Man, Scilly, Jersey, or Guernsey, and chargeable in England.

An Act for the better collecting borough and watch rates, in certain places.

An Act to amend the law concerning games and wagers.

An Act for the protection of seamen entering on board merchant ships.

An Act to facilitate the inclosure and improvement of commons and lands held in common, the exchange of lands, and the division of intermixed lands; to provide remedies for defective or incomplete executions, and for the non-execution of the powers of general and local inclosure Acts; and to provide for the revival of such powers in certain cases.

# Buckingham-Palace, August 8, 1845.

This day had audience of Her Majesty, the Baron de Hügel, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary from the King of Wurtemberg, on his return to England, after an absence on leave; Edward Everett, Esq.
