A T the Court at Buckingham-Palace, the 18th day of March 1846,

#### PRESENT.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

THEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to carry into effect, with " certain modifications, the fourth report of the " Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and " Revenues;" and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fourth and fifth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act " to explain and amend two several Acts relating " to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the eleventh day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act "to carry into effect, with certain modifications, "the fourth report of the Commissioners of "Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues;" and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to explain and "amend two several Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England," have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme, for completing the provision intended to be made for the cathedral church of Chester.

"Whereas, under certain provisions in the said Acts in that behalf contained, we prepared and laid before your Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-first day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-one, which scheme was duly ratified by an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the fifteenth day of January, in the following year; and the said Order was duly gazetted:

"And whereas it was by the said scheme and Order provided and ordered, that there should be paid by us, to the treasurer of the said cathedral church of Chester, the annual sum of three thousand pounds, or such proportion thereof as should from year to year become available for that purpose, out of a fund created by means of annual charges upon certain deaneries and canonries in the said Acts mentioned:

- "And whereas it was the intent and object of the said scheme and Order, amongst other things, to carry out the provisions of the same Acts for securing to the dean and canons of the said cathedral church of Chester, as nearly as might be, the minimum average annual incomes specified in the said first-recited Act; and the said dean and canons being, as recited in the said scheme, liable to keep residence according to the provisions of the said first-recited Act, were, therefore reasonably entitled to the benefits of the said Acts:
- "And whereas, by reason of the slow accretion of the fund aforesaid, the annual payment to the said treasurer has been, in every past year since the date of the said Order, considerably less than the full sum so directed to be paid to him by us, and may for some years to come still fall short of the same:
- "And whereas it was by the said Acts enacted, that, for the purpose of fully carrying into effect any of the provisions thereof, any arrangement might from time to time be made, with the consent in writing under the corporate seal of any chapter, for substituting in any case any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments for any money payment, or any money payment for any lands tithes, or other hereditaments:
- "And whereas the said dean and chapter are seised in fee of the several lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments, particularly described in the schedule hereunto annexed, which have been heretofore, from time to time, demised by leases for years, at small annual rents, and upon payment of fines; but the dean and chapter of the said church have declined to renew such deases:
- "And whereas, according to the scope and tenor of the scheme and Order aforesaid, whereby the payment of the said annual sum of three thousand pounds stands limited to the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, it was understood and implied, that the dean and chapter of the said church would not renew the said leases; but it is urged by the said dean and chapter, that it was, on their part, expected, that the annual payments by us to them would more nearly secure to them, respectively, the minimum average annual incomes intended by the said Acts:

"And whereas it accordingly appears to us to be reasonable and expedient, that the following arrangement should be made; and we have satisfied ourselves, by due inquiry, that the value of the before-mentioned lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments is fully sufficient to reimburse the advances hereinafter recommended to be made by us to the said dean and chapter:

- "Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that, notwithstanding any thing in the said scheme and Order contained, and without reference to the amount of the fund aforesaid, there shall be forthwith paid by us, to the treasurer of the said cathedral church of Chester, such sum of money as, together with the monies already paid by us to the said treasurer, under the provisions of the said Order, will make up a sum equal to the full annual sum of three thousand pounds for each and every of the four years ending on the fifteenth day of January now last past; and that there shall also be paid by us, to the treasurer of the same church for the time being, on the fifteenth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-seven, and on the like day in every succeeding year, without regard to the limitation of time by the said scheme and Order fixed, the full amnual sum of three thousand pounds.
- " And we further recommend and propose, that such payment so recommended to be forthwith made by us as aforesaid shall be, in the first instance, charged with the payment of, and the treasurer of the said church shall accordingly pay thereout, all monies which shall be due and owing from the said dean and chapter at the time of his receipt thereof, and that he shall distribute and pay the remainder thereof, after the discharge of such debts, in the same proportions and to the same persons, or to the legal personal representatives of any who may be dead, as and to whom the same would, according to the provisions of the aforesaid scheme and Order, have been distributed and paid, if such remainder had been received on the fifteenth day of January in the several years one thousand eight hundred and forty-three, one thousand eight hundred and forty-four, and one thousand eight hundred and forty-five, and on the said fifteenth day of January last, in four several sums proportionate to the sums which on those four days respectively would have been required

to make up each of the sums then actually paid by us to the treasurer of the said church to the full sum of three thousand pounds; and every such future annual payment to be made by us as aforesaid shall be in all respects subject to the provisions, in the same scheme and Order in that behalf contained.

"And we further recommend and propose, with the consent in writing of the said dean and chapter of Chester hereon written, and under their corporate seal hereto affixed, that, in exchange for so much of all such money payments so recommended to be made by us as aforesaid as shall exceed the amount of monies paid and from time to time payable by us to the treasurer of the said church according to the provisions of the scheme and Order aforesaid, and in order to secure to ourselves and our successors the repayment of such excess with reasonable interest thereon, and also for the further purposes hereinafter mentioned, all those the lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments aforesaid so described in the schedule hereunto annexed, and all estate and interest therein (subject only to the now-subsisting leases thereof), shall upon and from the day upon which any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme and such Order so published, become and be transferred to and vested in us and our successors, and that we and they shall thereupon become and be absolutely seised and possessed of the same in fee.

. "And whereas it is by the said Acts, and by another Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the fifth and sixth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act for enabling ecclesiastical corporations aggregate and sole to grant leases for long terms of years,' in substance provided, that the maximum average annual income of any dean or canon of a cathedral church in England shall be two thousand pounds and one thousand pounds respectively; and that the several deans and canons shall, up to such several amounts but not beyond them, have the benefit of any improvement of the corporate property of their respective chapters, and that the surplus, if any, shall be applicable to the purposes of the Acts herein first recited; we further recommend and

propose, that so soon as we shall have received out of the rents, profits, and net proceeds of the said lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments, over and above such annual sum of three thousand pounds so to be paid by us to the said treasurer from and after the fifteenth day of January in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four sufficient monies to repay to us and our successors the whole of such excess of payments as aforesaid, together with all costs, charges, and expenses to be incurred by us in and about the premises, with interest upon such excess of payment, costs, charges, and expenses, at the rate of three pounds ten shillings for every one hundred pounds by the year, calculated yearly, we shall, subject to the proviso in that behalf hereinafter contained, from time to time, and on the like day of payment as aforesaid, in every year, pay over the remainder of such net proceeds to the treasurer for the time being of the same church, to be divided by him, from time to time as he receives the same, amongst the dean and canons of such church, in the proportion of two-seventh shares to the dean and one-seventh share to each of the canons, unless or until a vacancy shall have occurred in any one of the five canonries now existing, and then in the proportion of one-third share to the dean and one-sixth share to each of the canons; and, in either case, so as to secure, to any member of the chapter who may have resigned, and to the representatives of any who may have died between the days of payment, a proportionate part of any such share or shares as aforesaid; provided always, that between the fifteenth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, and the fifteenth day of January in the year onethousand eight hundred and fifty-five, a new calculation shall be made by us, founded upon such: information as we may require from the said dean: and chapter, respecting their then average annual: revenues; and the monies so as last aforesaid tobe paid by us to such treasurer shall then be limited to such an annual amount as not to raise the respective incomes of the dean and canons of Chester above the maximum sums so named for them respectively in the said first-recited Act.

"And we further recommend and propose, that the surplus, if any, of such net proceeds shall be carried over by us to the fund aforesaid, for the purposes of the said Acts. "And we further recommend and propose, that nothing contained herein, or in the said scheme and Order, or in any Order of your Majesty in Council, for ratifying this scheme, shall prevent us, at any time or times hereafter, from recommending and proposing any other measure relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in conformity with the provisions of the said Acts, or any of them, or any other Act of Parliament; and especially for the re-transfer of the said lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments, or any part or parts thereof, to the said dean and chapter, in fee, subject to any conditions and regulations which the circumstances of the case may render expedient.

#### " SCHEDULE.

" 1. All those two shops fronting Northgatestreet, Chester, on the east side thereof, bounded on the south by a passage leading into the gallery of the Theatre Royal, and on the north side by a line in the passage leading into the Old Linen-hall, and extending in front thirty feet seven inches, and then held by Edward Maddock, butcher, and Edward Lindop, baker; all those twelve shops, buildings, and yard lying behind and adjoining to the said two shops, and extending in depth from Northgate-street seventy-one feet, then held by said William Lindop; and also all those three dwelling-houses and cooperage, with the outbuildings and appurtenances thereto belonging, situate on the north side of Foregate-street, Chester, theretofore in the occupation of Jonathan Wil-Hitchcock, and Simon Hawkins, coxon. and then in the holding of which premises anciently were reputed to be part of a certain district belonging to the dean and chapter of the said cathedral church, known as the bailiwick of Chester, demised by a lease, bearing date the seventh day of June one thousand eight hundred and thirty-two (but erroneously dated the seventh day of June one thousand eight hundred and twenty-two), and made between the Very Revered George Davys, dean of the said cathedral church, and the chapter of the same, of the one part, and Lynch Sidney Cotton, therein described, of the other part, for the term of twenty-one years from the tenth day of May then last, at the rent of two pounds ten shillings and five pence; and which said premises are numbered, respectively, 31,

32, 38, 39, and 40 on the plan deposited in the office of us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England.

" 2. All that messuage, with the stable, garden, and appurtenances, situate on the west side of the Further Northgate-street, Chester, then held by Mary Humphreys, widow, and also the garden belonging to the same premises then converted into a timber-yard, in the occupation of William Cole, builder, who had erected thereon a building for the drying of boards; and also all those dwelling-houses, with the gardens, hereditaments. and appurtenances on the west side of Further Northgate-street aforesaid, in the several occupations therein mentioned, demised by a lease, bearing date the seventh day of June one thousand eight hundred and thirty two, and made between the said George Davys and the said chapter of the one part, and the said Lynch Sidney Cotton of the other part, for twenty-one years from the tenth day of May then, last, at the rent of one pound twelve shillings and six pence; and which said premises are numbered 58 on the same plan.

"3. All that building anciently called the Old Common-hall of the city of Chester, and the ground plots whereon the same stands, situate on the east side of the Lower Northgate-street, Chester, and then known as the Wool-hall, but then converted into two shops, built on the site of an old shop, then in the occupation of Samuel Soorne and his under tenant, and a dwellinghouse behind the said slrops, with a cottage or dwelling-house adjoining the same, in the occupation of the proprietors of the Chester Common Stage Waggon-office, and another part thereof lying behind the said last-mentioned dwellinghouse, then used by the said proprietors, and the upper part of the said edifice had been converted into and was then used as a theatre, and which premises were anciently reputed to be parts of a certain district known as the bailiwick of Chester, demised by a lease, dated the seventh day of June one thousand eight hundred and thirty two, and made between the said George Davys and the said chapter of the one part, and the said Lynch Sidney Cotton of the other part, for twenty-one years from the tenth day of May then last, at the yearly rent of four pounds fourteen shillings and one penny; and which said premises are numbered 33 and 34 on the same plan.

" 4. All that dwelling-house and yard, garden, coach-house, stables, and out-office thereto belonging, situate in a field or parcel of land in Bachlane, within the liberties of the said city of Chester, called the Forelane-end-field, and all that pleasure ground and shrubbery to the same belonging, and then held by the Reverend William Harrison, containing in statute measure three acres one rood and thirty-six perches, or thereabouts, being part of the bailiwick of Chester, demised by a lease, bearing date the seventh day of June one thousand eight hundred and thirtytwo, made between the said George Davys and the said chapter of the one part, and the said Lynch Sidney Cotton of the other part, for forty years from the tenth day of May then last, at the rent of one pound; and which said premises are numbered 144 on the same plan.

" 5. All those fields, closes, or parcels of land situate within the liberties of the said city of Chester, commonly known as the Little Priestfield and the Stone Bridge-field, the Mollingtonlane-field, and the Bachepool-lane-field; then held by Richard Barker and the representatives of Joseph Lewis, their under tenants or assigns, demised by a lease, dated the twenty-fifth day of November one thousand eight hundred and thirtyfive, between the said George Davys and the said chapter of the one part, and Nelson Batty, therein described, of the other part, for twenty-one years from the twenty-fourth day of November one thousand eight hundred and thirty-five, at the yearly rent of one pound fourteen shillings and eight pence.

"6. All those several messuages or dwelling-houses, lands, tenements, rents, tithes, and here-ditaments hereinafter mentioned; that is to say, all that barn called the Hall-barn (now divided into four barns), situate in Bach-lane, Chester, adjoining to a parcel of ground whereon a messuage heretofore called Saint Thomas's Chapel did stand, then held by J. Fletcher, Thomas Ellis, and Charles Colton; all that piece or parcel of ground called the Chapel-yard (adjoining the said barns), then converted into three gardens, on one of which the said J. Fletcher had erected a dwelling-house, which said messuage and three gardens then held by the said John Fletcher alone; all the south side of a piece of land adjoining the garden wall of

Thomas Flintt, Esquire, then held by the representatives of Judith Briggs, or their undertenants; all that piece or parcel of land situate in Bachlane aforesaid, and lying opposite to the said Hall Barns, called Mill Field, late in the occupation of the said C. Colton, as undertenant to the representatives of George Cotton, deceased, heretofore Dean of Chester; all that piece or parcel of land lying opposite to the said Mill Field, called. the Mill Croft, then held by Thomas Ellis; all that small parcel of ground, being part of a garden, with the summer-house or building thereon, in Bach-lane aforesaid, heretofore called the Millhill, then held by Thomas Lowe, watch maker; all that piece or parcel of land situate in Bachjane aforesaid, called the Four Lane End Field, then held by the Reverend William Harrison, excepting such part thereof upon which W. Molineux and his predecessor had erected a dwellinghouse, with the out-buildings, garden, pleasure grounds, and appurtenances; all that close or parcel of land lying in Bach-lane aforesaid, latterly in two pieces, called the Higher and Middle Fowlakes, then held by Philip Humberston and John Kearsley; all that piece or parcel of land on the east side of Bach-lane aforesaid, called the Barn Acre, in the occupation of the representatives of the said G. Cotton, deceased; all that piece of land lying in Bach-lane aforesaid, called Rimmers Field, then in the occupation of Messrs. Dickson, nurserymen; all that parcel of land or ground adjoining the said Rimmers Field, called the Near Bach Dale Flatt, theretofore converted into a nursery garden, and then or late in the occupation of the said Messrs. Dickson; all that parcel of land situate in Bach-lane aforesaid, called the Further Bach Dale Flatt, then held by Thomas, Kelley; all that piece or parcel of ground called the Nearer Pool Hey, on the east side of Bach-lane aforesaid, then held by the representatives of the said G. Cotton; all that pieces or parcel of ground called the Further Pool Hey, on the east side of Bach-lane aforesaid, then held, by John Kearsley; all that piece of land in Bachlane aforesaid called the Goose-field, then held by the said John Kearsley; all that piece or parcel of land lying on the east side of Mollington-laneaforesaid, called Furbers Fowlakes, then held by the representatives of the said Judith Briggs; all that parcel of land called the Nearer Bridge-field,

held by the representatives of the said George Cotton; all those two pieces of land called the Lower Bridge-field and the Pearl Wall Hey, held by the same last-mentioned representatives; all those three pieces or parcels of land situate on the west side of Mollington-lane aforesaid, called the Upper Horse Close, the Lower Horse Close, and the Port Meadow, then held by the representatives of the late Reverend Thomas Ward; all those four pieces or parcels of land situate on the west side of Mollington-lane aforesaid, called Cotton's Intack, Clover Field, Major's Croft, and Major's Field, then held by Ann Pearce, widow; all that piece or parcel of land called Naylor's Close, then held by George Eaton; all those three pieces or parcels of land called the Blacon Cross-field, on the east side of the canal, the Blacon-field on the west side of the said canal, and the Port Poole Meadow on the west side of the same canal, held by the representatives of Mascie Taylor; all that piece or parcel of land called Taylor's Canal-field with the chymistry and a dwelling-house thereon, then held by the representatives of the said Mascie Taylor; all that piece or parcel of land called the Further Great Dee Bank, then held by the Reverend Mascie Domville Taylor; all those two pieces or parcels of land called the Middle Dee Bank and the Little Dee Bank, then held by Ann Pearce; all that piece of land on the west side of Mollington-road, called the Great Priest-field, then held by Benjamin Brassey; all those several butts of land adjoining the said Priest-field, called Furbers-yards, then held by the said Lynch Sidney Cotton; all that piece of land lying in Windmill or Remestry-lane, called Windmill-field, then held by the representatives of the said Thomas Ward: all that piece of land called Whitfield's Croft, then held by the said Ann Pearce; all that garden or orchard lying on the east side of Windmill-lane aforesaid, called Aire's Garden, near the Gorst Stacks, held by the said Ann Pearce; all that parcel of land heretofore called Bull's Croft, lying near the road leading from Chester to Flookersbrook, held by the representatives of the said George Cotton; all that piece or parcel of land called the Flookersbrook Hey, then held by George Maxwell Hog; all that piece or parcel of ground adjoining the Ellesmere Canal Wharf, called the Tower-field, held by L. S. Cotton; all that parcel of land called the Hollow Butts, and warehouse,

cottages, and stables thereon, and part of a basin of water adjoining the Ellesmere Canal, then held by Messrs. Shanklin and Co.; all those stables and cottages adjoining the Ellesmere Canal, and then in the same occupation; all that dwelling and counting-house and yard, and part of a basin of water, also adjoining the before-mentioned premises; all that piece or parcel of land called Crew's-field, then used as gardens, with the summerhouses erected thereon, held by the said L.S. Cotton; all that piece of land called the Dee Lane Croft, then used as gardens, with the summerhouses thereon, held by the said L. S. Cotton; all those gardens lying near Dec-lane, then held by the executors of Thomas Whittle, William Cole, Henry Baker, John Maynard, and John Lancaster; the south part of a garden, then held by Mrs. Barker; all those two parcels of land in Chester; called the Yards, but then used as gardens, with the summer-houses erected thereon, now held by the said L. S. Cotton; all those two pieces of land near Stone-bridge, called the Paddock, and a piece of land separated by the Canal from a field called the Middle Dee Bank, then converted into gardens, with the summer-houses thereon, then held by the said Anne Pearce; all that piece or parcel of land called the Infirmary-field or Lady Barrow's Hey, then held by Messrs. Snape and Company, and the coach-house and garden and pleasure ground belonging to the same; all that garden, with the croft called the Coney Greaves, in Further Boughton, held by the representatives of the said George Cotton; all those three pieces of land and meadow ground called the Shoulder of Mutton and Two Hall Meadow, near the Mollington-road, then held by the representatives of the said Judith Briggs; all that parcel of land lying in Upton, called the Enclosure, in the same occupation; all the tithes of corn, grain, and hay, and all other tithes whatsoever, yearly arising, growing, and renewing within the township of Bach aforesaid, with all rights, privileges, and appurtenances to the same belonging, then in the tenure of the said Lynch Sidney Cotton; all those messuages, barns, stables, orchards, gardens, lands, tenements, butts, portions, and parcels of lands, lying without the North-gate of Chester aforesaid, held by the persons hereinafter mentioned; that is to say, two new erected dwelling houses on the west side of Further Northgate-street, with the stable

and part of a timber-yard lying behind the same, held by William Cole; one dwelling house, or the site thereof, with a small garden and shippon and part of a timber-yard lying behind the same, in the same occupation; one dwelling house, with a small garden and shippon behind the same, then held by William Cotton; one other messuage or dwelling house and small garden, held by John Jones, with a piece of ground lying behind the said two last-mentioned dwelling houses, then held by Margaret Humphreys aand Charles Colton; one dwelling house, out-buildings, and garden, with a coach-house, then held by Gilbert Wilkinson; several dwelling houses, with the cowhouses and garden, late held by widow Colcough; one dwelling house, with the stable, out-buildings, and garden thereunto belonging, then held by John Baker; one dwelling house called the Dublin Castle, and five dwelling houses adjoining the same, fronting to the said Northgate-street, and two dwellings behind, then held by the representatives of William Seller, deceased; ten dwellings and a blacksmith's shop, with the outlets, gardens, and appurtenances, then held by Edward Hodkinson; one dwelling house, with the outbuildings, garden, and appurtenances, then held by John Williamson; one dwelling house, with the outlet and small dwelling behind, late held by William Dale; one messuage, with a small dwelling house and a shippon, lately converted into a dwelling, with a garden, on the site whereof the said L. L. Cotton had lately erected a house and formed a garden for his own residence; one dwelling house, with the out-buildings, gardens, and appurtenances, then untenanted; one messuage, with a garden, then held by William Hough; twelve messuages and gardens, two of them held by Francis Snead and Thomas Whittle, and the remaining ten held by said William Hough; one dwelling house and garden held by William Evans; two cottages or dwelling houses and gardens lately held by Elizabeth Drinkwater and Lucy Ashton, but on the site of the one in which the said E. Drinkwater resided a new messuage or dwelling house has been erected by John Williams, gentleman, and is now held by him; one messuage, consisting of four dwellings, on the east side of Further Northgate-street, with a barn, out-buildings, and garden, then held by Thomas Flintt,

Esq.; one dwelling house, workshop, and garden, held by John Dunning; one dwelling house and part of the ancient garden, then held by Richard Griffiths, and also the remaining part of the said garden, held by Thomas Hall; fourteen cottages, with gardens and stables, then held by the said Lynch Sidney Cotton; one messuage, then in two dwellings, with a bakehouse, stable, and yard, held by William Allen, baker, and Hannah Griffiths (except only a road to the quarry of the said dean and chapter at the east end of the said premises); one messuage, with garden, held by widow Allmark; all which said gardens and outhouses to the premises on the east side of Further Northgate-street extend to Windmill or Remistry-lane, except where the same are cut off by the working of the stone quarry; all that close of land lying behind certain premises on the east side of Further Northgate-street, known as Cokerscroft, held by William Ward, Esq.; all that messuage on the east side of Lower Northgate-street, called the Red Lion Inn, with the stable thereto, then held by Thomas Lewis Baker; all those two dwelling houses on the east side of Lower Northgate-street, with a stable and warehouse, then held by George Burslam and Thomas Moreland; all those two messuages on the east side of Lower Northgate-street, then held by Robert Parkinson; all those four messuages then held by John Bennett, Edward Roberts, Paul Price, and Job Venables; all those two shops, with the rooms over the same, on the east side of Lower Northgate-street, held by Nathaniel Harrison; all that messuage on the west side of Lower Northgate-street, known as the Cross Foxes, with the shops under the same, and four dwellings, with a bakehouse, then held by Elizabeth Seller; all that messuage, with the shop, on the west side of Lower Northgate-street, known as the Union Tavern, held by Seymour Harper; all that messuage behind the Exchange, called the Black Swan, with a coach manufactory and coach sheds, with yard and two stables, then held by Thomas Sandland, Arthur Downes Howell, and widow Hughes; and the site of all that shop in the Mug Market on the west side of Northgatestreet, lately part taken down, and part forming part of the Mitre Inn; all that dwelling house known as the Mitre, situate in the Mug Market,
