And it is hereby further ordered, that Her Majesty's Printer do forthwith print a competent number of copies of the said Form of Prayer and Thanksgiving, in order that the same may be forthwith sent round and read in the several churches and chapels in England and Wales, and in the town of Berwick-upon-Tweed.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues;" and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fifth and sixth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for enabling ecclesiastical corporations, aggregate and sole, to grant leases for long terms of years," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fourth day of March one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, in the words following, that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues;" and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fifth and sixth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for enabling ecclesiastical corporations, aggregate and sole, to grant leases for long terms of years," have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme, for determining the portion of the improved value to be paid to us under a certain lease of glebe lands, with the right of quarrying stone, granted by the Reverend Charles Brackenbury, Clerk, Rector of the parish of Wilsford, in the county and diocese of Lincoln.

"Whereas by the said last recited Act it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for any ecclesiastical corporation, aggregate or sole (excepting as therein is excepted, which exception does not include the case of a rector), from time to time, with the consent or consents in that behalf thereby required, and subject to the provisions in the same Acts contained, to grant or demise by lease, for

any term not exceeding sixty years, any mines, minerals, quarries, or beds belonging to such corporation:

"And whereas, in pursuance of the powers contained in the said recited enactment, the said Charles Brackenbury, as such Rector, with the consents required by the said last recited Act, granted and demised, by a lease bearing date the first day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-four, a certain piece or parcel of land containing three acres, statute measure, being part of the glebe of his said rectory, and situate in Wilsford aforesaid together with the depths and veins of stone thereunder, and the right of quarrying the same, to Charles Kirk, of Old Sleaford, in the said county, builder, his executors, administrators, and assigns, for the term of thirteen years, from the first day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-three, at the yearly rent of thirty-four pounds, payable half-yearly on the first day of January and the first day of July in every year:

"And whereas by the same Act it is further enacted, that, in case of any lease of mines, minerals, quarries, or beds granted thereunder, such portion of the improved value accruing under such lease, as by the authority provided in the first recited Act shall be determined, not being more than three fourth parts nor less than one moiety of such improved value, shall forthwith and from time to time as the same shall accrue, be paid to us, and shall be subject to the provisions relating to monies payable to us:

"And whereas the improved value accruing under the lease so granted as aforesaid is, according to the meaning of the same Act, the whole net amount of the said rent of thirty-four pounds so reserved as aforesaid, after deducting therefrom the sum of three pounds seven shillings and six pence per annum, being the amount of the yearly rent received by the said Charles Brackenbury as such rector as aforesaid, in respect of the said premises, previously to the granting of the said lease:

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, that the annual rent or sum of fifteen pounds six shillings and three pence, being one moiety of the whole net amount of the rent reserved by the said lease (subject to such deduction as aforesaid), shall, from the day of the date

thereof, be paid to us, and shall, during the continuance of the demise thereby created, be directly payable to us, and be paid, in like manner, and on the same days whereon the said entire rent of thirty-four pounds is made payable to the said Charles Brackenbury, and his successors, rectors of Wilsford, without any priority or preference between us and the said rector for the time being; and further, that we shall have full benefit and advantage, either jointly with or separately from the said Charles Brackenbury, and his successors, rectors of Wilsford for the time being, of all or any of the covenants, conditions, and agreements in the said lease contained on the lessee's part, in like manner as if we had been grantors, lessors, and reversioners of the premises thereby demised.

“ And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them in conformity with the provisions of the said recited Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament.”

And whereas notice of the said scheme has been given to the said Charles Brackenbury, as such Rector as aforesaid, in accordance with the provisions of the first recited Act, and he has made no objection thereto :

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct, that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Lincoln.

**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the

third and fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled “ An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues,” duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fourth day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, in the words following, that is to say :

“ We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled “ An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues,” have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme, for fixing the number and emoluments of the minor canons in the cathedral church of Peterborough.

“ Whereas it was by the said recited Act enacted, that so soon as conveniently might be, and by the authority therein provided, regulations should be made for fixing the number and emoluments of the minor canons in each cathedral and collegiate church, provided that there should not in any case be more than six nor less than two, and that the stipend of each such minor canon thereafter appointed should not be less than one hundred and fifty pounds per annum, and that arrangements might, from time to time be made, by the like authority, for securing to any minor canon, not otherwise competently provided for, such annual sum as should make up to him an income as minor canon, not exceeding in any case the said sum of one hundred and fifty pounds:

“ And whereas application has been made to us by the dean and chapter of the cathedral church of Peterborough to fix the number and emoluments of the minor canons in the said church in manner hereinafter mentioned:

“ And whereas it has been represented to us by the said dean and chapter, that the number of minor canons in the said church has, until recently, been four, but is now reduced to three by the resignation of a minor canon, and that it is expedient that there should continue to be three minor canons only in the said church; and further that the said dean and chapter are prepared to assign, out of the revenues of their church, to each

minor canon hereafter appointed, a fixed annual stipend as such minor canon of one hundred and fifty pounds:

“ And whereas it has been further represented to us by the said dean and chapter, that the senior of the three now remaining minor canons, although receiving an annual stipend of fifty-two pounds only as minor canon, is otherwise competently provided for; but that the Reverend Edmund Cory, who is the second, and the Reverend Charles Cookson, who is the third of such remaining minor canons, receive annual stipends, respectively, as such minor canons, of fifty-two pounds only, and are not otherwise competently provided for:

“ Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, with the consent of the said dean and chapter, testified by their having hereunto affixed their chapter seal, that the number of minor canons in the said cathedral church of Peterborough shall from henceforth be three; and that there shall be paid to each minor canon hereafter appointed in the said church, a fixed annual stipend, as such minor canon, of one hundred and fifty pounds out of the revenues of the said church:

“ And we further recommend and propose, that from henceforth, so long as the said Edmund Cory and Charles Cookson shall both continue to be minor canons in the same church, and shall not hold any benefice, the annual sum of fifty-two pounds heretofore paid to the minor canon, who has so recently resigned his minor canonry, shall be equally divided and paid between and to the said Edmund Cory and Charles Cookson, and there shall also be paid to them, respectively, by the treasurer of the said church, as from us and on our account, a further annual sum of seventy-two pounds, by equal half-yearly payments, on the twenty-fifth day of March and the twenty-fifth day of September in each and every year; and that the first of such payments shall be made on the twenty-fifth day of March next; and that when either of the said two named minor canons shall die or otherwise cease to be a minor canon of the same church or shall hold any benefice, the whole of the said annual sum of fifty-two pounds shall be paid to the other of them, together with the further annual sum, as from us and on our account, of forty-six pounds instead of seventy-two pounds as aforesaid, on the days and subject to the con-

ditions aforesaid; provided always, that the said sum of seventy-two pounds or forty-six pounds, as the case may be, shall abate in amount to the extent of any sum which may be or become payable to the said two minor canons, or either of them, in respect of any other office in the said cathedral church.

“ And we further recommend and propose, that the said treasurer shall and may, from time to time, retain, out of any moneys payable to us in respect of any canonry or canonries suspended in the said church, a sum or sums of money equal to such sum or sums as may have been so paid to the said Edmund Cory and Charles Cookson, as from us and on our account.

“ And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measure relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in conformity with the provisions of the said recited Act, or of any other Act of Parliament.”

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct, that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Peterborough.
