A T the Court at Buchingham-Palace, the 6th day of April 1846,

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

Council, that his Grace the Archbishop of Canterbury do prepare a Form of Prayer and Thanksgiving to Almighty God, for the repeated and signal victories obtained by the troops of Her Majesty and by those of the Honourable East India Company, in the vicinity of the Sutledge, whereby the unjust and unprovoked aggression of the Sikhs was gloriously repelled, and their armies totally discomfited; and that such Form of Prayer and Thanksgiving be used in all churches and chapels in England and Wales, and in the town of Berwick-upon-Tweed, upon Sunday the 12th of this instant April, or the Sunday after the Ministers of such churches and chapels shall respectively receive the same.

And it is hereby further ordered, that Her Majesty's Printer do forthwith print a competent number of copies of the said Form of Prayer and Thanksgiving, in order that the same may be forthwith sent round and read in the several churches and chapels in England and Wales, and in the town of Berwick-upon-Tweed.

T is this day ordered by Her Majesty in Council, that all Ministers and Preachers as well of the Established Church in that part of Great Britain called Scotland as of the Episcopal Communion, protected and allowed by an Act, passed in the tenth year of the reign of Her late Majesty Queen Anne, cap. 7, do, at some time during the exercise of Divine Service in their churches, congregations, or assemblies, on Sunday the 12th of this instant April, or on the Sunday after the Ministers or Preachers of such churches. congregations, or assemblies respectively shall be enabled so to do, put up Prayers and Thanksgivings to Almighty God for the repeated and signal victories obtained by the troops of Her Majesty, and by those of the Honourable East India Company, in the vicinity of the Sutledge, whereby the unjust and unprovoked aggression of the Sikhs was gloriously repelled, and their armies totally discomfited.
