**THE COURT FOR RELIEF OF INSOLVENT DEBTORS.**

The following PRISONERS, whose Estates and Effects have been vested in the Provisional Assignee by Order of the Court, having filed their Schedules, are ordered to be brought up before the Court, at the Court-House, in Portugal-Street, Lincoln's-Inn-Fields, on Tuesday the 21st day of April 1846, at Nine o'Clock in the Forenoon, to be dealt with according to the Statute:

William Luke, formerly of No. 149, Church street, Shore-ditch, then of No. 158, Brick-lane, Spitalfields, Cheesemonger and Butterman (and for a short period a Dealer in Coals, Coke, and Wood at No. 157, Brick-lane aforesaid), then of No. 158, Brick-lane aforesaid, and No. 70, Church-street aforesaid, Cheesemonger and Butterman, and late of No. 5, Brunswick-street, Hackney-road, all in Middlesex, out of business.

**TAKE NOTICE,**

1. If any Creditor intends to oppose a Prisoner's discharge, notice of such intention must be given, by entry thereof in the proper page and column of the book kept for that purpose at the Office of the Court, between the hours of Ten in the Forenoon and Four in the Afternoon, two clear days before the day of hearing above mentioned, exclusive of Sunday, and exclusive both of the day of entering such notice and of the said day of hearing; but in the case of a Prisoner, for the removal of whom for hearing in the country an order has been obtained, but not carried into

effect by the Creditors, notice of opposition will be sufficient if given one clear day before the day of hearing.

2. The petition and schedule, and all books, papers, and writings filed therewith, will be produced by the proper Officer for inspection and examination until the last day for entering opposition, inclusive; and copies of the petition and schedule, or such part thereof as shall be required, will be provided by the proper Officer, according to the Act, 1 and 2 Vict. c.110, sec. 105.

3. Notice to produce at the hearing any books or papers filed with the schedule must be given to the Officer having the custody thereof, within the hours above mentioned, on any day previous to the day of hearing.

4. Opposition at the hearing can only be made by the Creditor in person, or by Counsel appearing for him.

THE creditors of Thomas Simpson, late of Low Harrogate, in the county of York, Whitesmith and Publican, an insolvent debtor, who, on or about the 6th day of March 1832, was discharged from the Castle of Knaresbrough, in the county of York, under and by virtue of an Act of Parliament, made and passed in the seventh year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend and consolidate the laws for the relief of insolvent debtors in England," are desired to meet the assignees of the said insolvent's estate, on Monday the 27th day of April 1846, at eleven o'clock in the morning precisely, at the Court-house of the Castle of Knaresbrough aforesaid, to assent to or dissent from the said assignees commencing a suit in equity against Matthew Simpson, and such other person or persons as it may be found necessary to join in such suit, for the purpose of recovering and obtaining payment of a legacy and other interest bequeathed to the said insolvent by the will of his father, David Simpson the elder, deceased, and of taking such other steps for the recovery thereof as may be deemed advisable.
