## PRESENT,

 The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.WHEREAS an Act was passed in the session of Parliament held in the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act "for the general regulation of the Customs," whereby it is, amongst other things, enacted, that the several sorts of goods exumerated in the table therein following, denominated "a table of prom hibitions and restrictions inwards," shall either be absolutely prohibited to be imported, or shall be imported only under the restrictions mentioned in such table :

And whereas, among other sorts of goods, the following are enumerated in the said table, viz.
" Goods of places within the limits of the East India Company's charter, unless into ports approved of by the Lords of the Treasury, and declared, by Order in Council, to be fit and proper for such importation :"

And whereas the port of Preston has been approved of by the Lords of Her Majesty's Treasury for that purpose:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to declare, and it is hereby declared, that the port of Preston is fit and proper for the importation of goods of places within the limits of the East India Company's charter :

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.
