Dublin, 08. 30.

Ere are lately arrived in this Port two Merchants thips from Rotterdam, one French thip and a versel fel from London. Two large thips are now lying out in the way, but the weather to much opposes them that they are not at present able to reach the Harbor; all our Ports begin to be full of Trade, to the great satisfaction of all people, and the Commodities of the Country daily vented.

Pendennis, Off. 31. Here are newly arrived part of a Dutch Fleet of 100 fail of Merchants, with 8 men of War their Convoyes, under the Command of Vice-Admiral Swaers; with thefe, which are about 50 fail, we have now

in Port 150 Veffels, all waiting for a fair wind.

Plymouth, Nov. t. Here are lately put into this Port 16 or 18 fail of Dutch Merchantmen with two Men of War, bound for the Streights, and with them their Conful defigned for Conflantinople; 30 or 40 more with fix Men of War shelter themselves at Falmouth, and will all of them put to Sea again with the first fair wind, as will also several Merchants from London, which were driven in here by contrary Winds.

Newcafile, Nov. r. The great Fleet of Colliers is put to Sea with a fair wind.

Rome, Off. r 5. The Pope is not yet resolved when to leave this place for his divertisement at Castel Gondolfo, the little indispositions of body of which he was some time since very sensible, are now wholly taken off by the arrival of his kindred from Pistoya, with whom he has allotted himself to spend a month in the enjoyment of their company, whom he entertains with all the tenderness and affection imaginable.

The Abby of Chiaravale having been in the late Popes time conferred on Cardinal Chigi his Nephew upon the death of the Cardinal de Medici; his Heirs have upon their complaints remonstrated to the present Pope the damage they have suffered by that succession, Cardinal Chigi having detained all the Cattle and stock found upon it, but of right belonging to them as heirs to the deceased; whereupon his Holineis has for their satisfaction commanded restitution to be made by him, or the sum of twelve thousand Crowns to be paid in lieu thereof.

The Apostolical Chamber have required of the same Cardinal Chigi, that the sum of 25 thousand Crowns which were thence issued out and paid to him towards the expences of his intended Voyage to Complement the Empress at her arrival at Milan in the name of the late Pope his Unckle, be refunded,

he having not performed that Journey.

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oyal was The Pope has by his Brief declared his Nephew Abbot Rofpigliofi his Apostolical Protonorary, who may also be expested here by the end of this Month, at whose arrival his Holiness intends to fill up the five Cardinal ships that are vacant.

Cardinal Litta is gone from hence towards his Archbishoprick
of Milan, the differences that were formerly between the Governor Don Luis Pons de Leon and himself about some pretensions of the Canons della Scala in this City, being composed and ended.

Disto, Off. 22. The Pope being every day more intent upon the composure of the differences between the two Crowns of France and Spain, has lately made choice of Seignior Francistii Nephew to the late Cardinal of that name, to

be his Plenipotenciary for that Mediation.

Our new levies for Souldiers go on vigoroufly, one Com-

pany being already sent away for Dalmatia, and 500 Foot more will suddenly follow them to supply the place of those Companies that have been from thence embarqued for the affiltance of the Venetians in the Defence of the Ille and City of Candia.

Prior Bicki is with the Gallies under his Command returned home and arrived at Givita Vecchia, having left behind him in Candia all the Souldiers and Provisions he could possi-

bly (pare out of his Gallies for that Service.

From Naples We are told, that several French Privateers have been lately cruising upon those Coasts and the Isle of Sicily, and had taken several Barques; that the Dukes Di Matalone, de Popoli, and Di Santto Giorgio were committed to safe custody in Castel Nuovo, for the late Duel in which the Prince della Rocca Filomarino was killed: That the Dutchess di Monte Leon was lately deceased; and that the vice-Roy continues his preparations for War, having lately given out Commissions to Serjeant Major Dominico Magno for the speedy raising of 20 Companies of Foot.

Genoua, Octob. 22. The Senate is daily expecting the return of the Courier fent into France, to exportulate for the late seifing a Merchant Ship of this place bound for Lisbon, for which they require just satisfaction may be made; and in the mean while the Convoy designed for spain and Portugal are stopy: if no satisfactory answer be eturnd them, the Senate is resolved to sit up 5, 6, or 7 of their best Men of War, and send them out to sea for the desence of their Mer-

hants.

Venice, Ott. 29. We are here much flattered with good News from Ancona, which tells us that the Grand Vifier was by some chance or practices on his person, empoysoned; and that his Army, much lessened by the long Siege, but more discouraged by the loss of their General, had less the I own and were retired. A ship arriving at Legorn, gives us also a report that the Turks were gone off from Candia, and that our men had by a lusty Sally fallen upon the rear of them, where they had made a great slaughter, and were returned with much plunder and spoil, but we are not overhasty in the belief of this welcome news, since by our last Letters we were told, that a Pacquet was lately by some of our ships intercepted going from the Grand Visier, demanding Succours and affishance, and with all, professing his Resolution not to leave the place till he had either taken it, or buried all his men in the Trenches.

From Zante we are affured, that a Tartane lately arriving there, had met with two of our Squadrons near Candia, whither they were passing with all sorts of necessaries for the supply of that place, and that more were daily sending after them, that nothing might be wanting for the preservation of a place of so great importance to the Christian World.

Danizick, Off. 29. His Majesty of Poland is resolved to raise all the Forces he is able, to march against the Tartars and Cossacks, who have lately done great spoil upon the Frontiers: One party of Tartars having lately invaded Russia, in which they have, after several Assaults, and the loss of many thousands of their Army, taken the Town of Podas. Another party have blocked up Russe Lemberg, and reduced the General sobieski to great straits, having surrounded him with their Army, and were grown more powerful by the addition of 6000 Cossacks; but the General valiantly issuing out upon them, had broken in amongst them with a great slaughter of the Enemy, and little loss to himself; and with the assistance of some other Forces which are marching towards him for his assistance, 'tis hoped he will speedily quit himself from

the disadvantages of the place in which he is. Hamburgh, Mov. 4. Our Deputies employed at Gluck-Crown of Denmark and this City, are returned, but as yet little progress has been made in that Affair. From Ratisbone we are told, that the Assembly have as te suspended their final Resolution touching the Assairs of the Circle of Eurgundy: The Deputies of the States of the Empire being willing in the first place to observe the issue of the late Overtures of a Mediation between the two Crowns , and to wait for fuch farther Infructions as may be sent to them from their respective Princes and States, In the mean time they are taking into their confideration the pretentions of the House of Nassaw to serveral places which are in the possession of the Duke of Lerrain, of which Restitution is demanded; but this is like to prove a market of much differential and the serverage of the like to prove a matter of much difficulty, and may take up

Amilerdam, Nov. 11. We much fear the miscarriage of the rest of our East India ships, not having yet heard any news of them, either from the Coasts of Norway, nor any other part of the No thern Coasts. The other ships being safely arrived at their respective Ports, care is taking for the sale of the Merchandises which they brought home, and accordingly the Vent of those brought into the Chamber of Zealand is appointed the 25th of this present Month; in this City on December the 8th; in Delft fan. 3. 1668; in Rotterdam fan. 5; in Hoorne the 17th, and in Enchus sen the 19th of the same Month. Hague, Nov. 11. The 7th instant the States of Holland entertained the principal Officers of the Fleet at the Doeles, where De Witt, the Chief Baily of Putten, De Ruyter and Van Ghent, were each of them presented with a Cup of Mas-five Gold, on which were engraven with much Curiosity, the representations of the most signal and eminent services done by them in the late War.

About a Formight hence will be held an Assembly of the States of Holland and West-Friesland, wherein the Military Charges in our intended Army may be disposed of, and tome-what also concluded touching the admission of the Prince of Orange into the Councel of State: At the same meeting the persons are to be nominated to be sent into Germany, Swede-land, Brandenburg, Cologne and Munster, in quality of Ambaffadors; in the mean time the States have ordered the Heers Van der Steen of Gelderland. Asperen of Holland, Staveniss of Zealand, with some other persons deputed from the other Provinces to form instructions for them.

Our Sea Forces are not yet disbanded, nor is it believed they shall be till some certain Resolutions are taken in relation to the Affairs of the Spanish Netherlands. The several Companies that were by the States Order to be drawn out of our old Garrifons for the re-inforcement of our Frontier Towns, are (if the flate of Affairs fhall require it) to be formed into a Flying Army, with new Commissions, to be employed as the States shall think fit.
