A PROCLAMATION.

VICTORIA, R.

**W**HEREAS by our Order in Council of this day's date, we were graciously pleased, for the reasons therein contained, to annul the Royal Proclamation of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, of the third day of February one thousand eight hundred and thirty-six, directing that distribution should be made of the net proceeds of prizes captured from the enemy, of captures and seizures under the several Acts passed relating to the revenues of customs, and to trade and navigation, for the abolition of the slave trade, and for the capture and destruction of piratical vessels, and of the rewards conferred for the same, according to the scheme therein set forth; and it is expedient that provision should be made by us for the future distribution of such proceeds or rewards; we do make known to all our loving subjects, and all others whom it may concern, by this our Proclamation, by and with the advice and consent of our Privy Council, that our royal will and pleasure is, and we do hereby direct, that the distribution of such proceeds and rewards shall be made in the following manner, viz.

That flag officers or officer, commodores of the first class, and captains of the fleet, shall have one sixteenth of the net proceeds arising from prizes captured from the enemy, and from all other captures, seizures, head moneys, grants, and bounties as aforesaid, made by the ships and vessels under his or their command, save and except in the cases herein-after submitted.

That when two flag officers shall be serving together, the chief shall have two thirds of the said one sixteenth, and the other officer shall have the remaining third part

That when there be more than two flag officers, the chief shall receive one half of the said one sixteenth, and the remaining half shall be divided equally amongst the junior flag officers, commodores of the first class, and captains of the fleet.

That no flag officer, or commodore of the first class, or captain of the fleet, not actually present at the capture or destruction of any piratical vessel or privateers belonging to the enemy, shall be entitled to share in the distribution of any head money or bounty granted in respect of the crews of such piratical ships, vessels, or boats.

That no flag officer as aforesaid shall share in any remuneration or reward conferred or awarded as salvage, unless he shall have been actually on board the ship or vessel to which the award shall be made, or have personally aided or assisted in the transaction at the time the service was rendered.

That no flag officer commanding in the ports of the United Kingdom shall share in the proceeds of prizes captured from the enemy, nor in other captures or seizures as aforesaid, made by ships or vessels which may sail from such ports by order of the Lord High Admiral, or the Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral, nor in the rewards, &c. conferred for the same.

That when ships or vessels under the command of several flag officers which belong to separate stations shall happen to be joint captors, each flag officer, under whose orders each ship or vessel may be, shall receive a portion of the flag share of one sixteenth of the net proceeds in proportion to the number of officers and men present under the command of each such flag officer; and the same regulation as to the apportionment of the flag share is to be observed when ships or vessels under orders from the Lord High Admiral, or the Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral, shall be joint captors with ships or vessels under a flag or flags.

And we do hereby further direct, that the following regulations be observed in respect to the distribution of the remaining portion of the net proceeds of prizes, captures, seizures, and rewards before mentioned (after the deduction of the flag

share of one sixteenth), or of the whole amount of such net proceeds in the cases herein-before provided, where no flag officer shall be entitled to share.

First, that the officers and men composing the complements of our ships and vessels be distributed into thirteen classes, and that each officer and man and boy who shall have been actually on board at the time of any such capture, seizure, &c. as aforesaid, shall receive such number or portion of shares as are expressed to each class respectively in the following table:

**First class**—Commodores of the second class, captains, field officers of marines or land forces above the rank of major, when doing duty as field officers above the rank of major, one hundred shares.

**Second class**—Commanders, medical inspectors of hospitals and fleets, field officers of marines or land forces of the rank of major, when doing duty as such, fifty shares.

**Third class**—Secretaries to flag officers commanding in chief, deputy medical inspectors of hospitals and fleets, sea lieutenants, masters, captains of marines or of marine artillery, or of land forces, when doing duty as such, whether having higher brevet rank or not, ten shares each.

**Fourth class**—Chaplains, secretaries to junior flag officers and commodores of the first class, surgeons, paymasters and pursers, naval instructors, mates, lieutenants of marines, of marine artillery, or of land forces when doing duty as such, second masters, assistant surgeons, five shares each.

**Fifth class**—Gunners, boatswains, carpenters, first engineers, clerks in charge, clerks (passed), four and a half shares each.

**Sixth class**—Midshipmen, master's assistants, second and third class engineers, clerks, naval cadets, clerks assistant, three shares each.

**Seventh class**—Ship's cooks, admiral's coxswains, leading stokers, masters at arms, seaman's schoolmaster, sailmakers, ropemakers, gunner's mates, boatswain's mates, carpenter's mates,

caulkers, blacksmiths, serjeants of marines, serjeants of marine artillery, serjeants of land forces when doing duty as such, two and a half shares each.

**Eighth class**—Ship's corporals, captain's coxswains, quarter masters, captains of the fore-castle, captains of the main top, captains of the fore top, captains of the hold, coxswains of the launch, corporals of marines, and of land forces when doing duty as such, corporals and bombardiers of marine artillery, head kroomen, pilots, two shares each.

**Ninth class**—Sailmaker's mates, coopers, armourers, caulker's mates, captains of the mast, captains of the after-guard, captains of the mizen top, yeoman of signals, coxswain of pinnace, second head kroomen, paymaster and purser's steward, one and a half shares each.

**Tenth class**—Able seamen, musicians, stokers and coal trimmers, carpenter's crew, sailmaker's crew, cooper's crew, painters, yeoman of store rooms, flag officer's stewards, flag officer's cooks, flag officer's domestics, captain's steward, captain's cook, subordinate officer's steward, subordinate officer's cook, sick berth attendant, privates and fivers of marines and land forces when doing duty as such, gunners of marine artillery, ordinary seamen, one share each.

**Eleventh class**—Paymaster and purser's steward's mates, cook's mates, barbers, landsmen, kroomen, three fourths of a share each.

**Twelfth class**—Boys of first class, half a share each.

**Thirteenth class**—Boys of second class, three eighths of a share each.

Seamen gunners to share in all captures, rewards, &c. as aforesaid, in the class immediately above that of the class in which their rating is mentioned.

That in all cases in which supernumeraries, whether officers or men, shall be ordered to do duty on board any of our ships by the Lord High Admiral, or by our Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral, or by other proper authority (the orders of the captain or commander, if no senior be present, to be deemed sufficient authority), they shall share according to the class of the ranks or ratings which they hold in the service, if not ordered to do duty in a higher capacity. All persons borne on board our ships

merely as passengers, whether officers or others, and who may be present and not decline to render general assistance in any action that may occur in making any capture or seizure, shall be entitled to share in the eleventh class if above the age of twenty, and in the thirteenth if below that age.

And that in the event of any difficulty arising in respect to the regulations hereby proposed, or any case should occur not herein provided for, or not sufficiently provided for, we are pleased to authorize the Lord High Admiral, or our Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral for the time being, to issue such directions thereupon as may appear just and expedient; and that such directions shall be considered final, and have the same force and effect as if specially provided for in our Royal Proclamation.

Provided always, that the distribution hereinbefore proposed to be made, or directed to be made, shall not be construed to affect any captures, seizures, &c. made within three calendar months from the day of our Royal Proclamation, nor any captures, seizures, &c. which shall be made after that day, and which shall be condemned or adjudged in any of our Courts of Vice Admiralty, or any Court of Mixed Commission, before notice of our Royal Proclamation shall have been received by the Vice Admiralty Court, or Court of Mixed Commission, in which such condemnation or adjudication shall pass; and we do hereby further direct, that the proceeds of all such captures, seizures, &c. made within three months from the day of the date of this our Royal Proclamation, or which shall be made after the date of this our Royal Proclamation, and which shall be condemned or adjudged in any of our Courts of Vice Admiralty, or any Court of Mixed Commission, antecedent to the notice of this our Royal Proclamation having been received in such Courts, together with all rewards aforesaid, shall continue to be distributed in the proportions and manner directed in and by His said late Majesty's said Royal Proclamation, dated the third day of February one thousand eight hundred and thirty-six.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of the reign of His late Majesty, intituled "An Act for carrying into effect the reports of the Commissioners appointed to consider the state of the Established Church in England and Wales, with reference to ecclesiastical duties and revenues, so far as they relate to episcopal dioceses, revenues, and patronage;" and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues;" and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fourth and fifth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to explain and amend two several Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England;" and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fifth and sixth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to alter and amend the law relating to ecclesiastical houses of residence," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-second day of April one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, in the words following, that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of the reign of His late Majesty, intituled, "An Act for carrying into effect the reports of the Commissioners appointed to consider the state of the Established Church in England and Wales, with reference to ecclesiastical duties and revenues, so far as they relate to episcopal dioceses, revenues, and patronage;" and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues;" and of

another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to explain and amend two several Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England; and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fifth and sixth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to alter and amend the law relating to ecclesiastical houses of residence," have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme, for further improving the house of residence belonging to the see of Exeter:

"Whereas we prepared and laid before your Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-fourth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-five, whereby, after reciting that the house of residence then belonging to the see of Exeter was in a very dilapidated condition, and in some parts abutted closely upon the cathedral, and that it appeared to us to be expedient to remove such parts, and in other respects to alter and improve such house; and that there was then, standing in the books of the Governor and Company of the Bank of England, in the name of the Accountant General of the Court of Chancery, to the credit and account of the bishops and see of Exeter, the sum of nine thousand two hundred and three pounds and four shillings Three Pounds per Centum Reduced Bank Annuities, and that it was expedient that three thousand pounds, part thereof, should, upon the conditions mentioned in such scheme, be applied towards the alteration and improvement of such house of residence; and that it had been agreed between us and the said Bishop of Exeter, that such house of residence should be altered and improved according to plans and specifications to be approved by us, and should be completed according to such plans and specifications, and to the satisfaction of an architect to be named by us, within a time to be limited in manner therein prescribed; and that all costs, charges, and expences in and about the completion thereof, over and above the before-mentioned sum, should be defrayed by the said Henry Bishop of Exeter, his executors or administrators:

"We humbly recommend and propose, that, upon the conditions therein set forth, so much of the said sum of nine thousand two hundred, and

three pounds and four shillings Three Pounds per Centum Reduced Bank Annuities, as should be sufficient to raise the said sum of three thousand pounds sterling, should be transferred into our names and to our account in the books of the said Governor and Company, and might from time to time be sold by us, and applied and paid for the purposes aforesaid, to such persons and at such times, and in such manner, as by the said scheme is provided:

"And whereas the said scheme was duly ratified by an Order of your Majesty in Council, on the thirtieth day of the same month of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-five, and the said Order has been duly gazetted:

"And whereas certain alterations and improvements, according to plans and specifications approved by us, are now in progress; and it has been made to appear to us that, upon taking down the portion of the said house abutting on the said cathedral, a greater extent of reparation than was anticipated has been found to be necessary; and that, in consequence of certain of the offices used with the said house having been discovered to be actually under and to form part of the said cathedral, new offices should be provided, and that certain other additional works are essential to the convenient occupation of the said house; and that the cost of the whole of such further additions and works is estimated at the sum of five hundred pounds:

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient, that so much of the balance, now remaining of the said sum of nine thousand two hundred and three pounds and four shillings Three Pounds per Centum Reduced Bank Annuities, as will produce the sum of five hundred pounds sterling should, upon the conditions, and in the manner following, be applied towards the said further additions and works:

"We, therefore, humbly recommend and propose, with the consent of the said Henry Bishop of Exeter, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, that, upon plans and specifications of the said additions and works being approved by us, under our common seal, in like manner and form as by the said scheme and Order was directed with regard to the works now in progress, and an agreement for carrying out such additions and works being in like manner executed by the said Henry Bishop of Exeter and by us, so much of the balance, now remaining of the said

sum of nine thousand two hundred and three pounds and four shillings Three Pounds per Centum Reduced Bank Annuities, as shall be sufficient to raise the further sum of five hundred pounds sterling, and also such further sum as may be sufficient to defray the costs, charges, and expences of and attending the transfer of the said stock, and also of and attending the transfer of the stock so authorized by the said recited scheme and Order, shall be transferred in like manner as directed by the said scheme and Order, and applied by us for the purpose of such additions and works, to such persons, at such times, and in such manner as by the said agreement, and a contract to be entered into with regard to the same, shall be provided; and that all dividends, from time to time arising from the said sum so to be transferred to us, or from any part thereof, shall be accounted for and paid by us to the said Henry Bishop of Exeter and his successors.

And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said recited Acts, or any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Exeter.

third and fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues;" and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fifth and sixth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for enabling ecclesiastical corporations, aggregate and sole, to grant leases for long terms of years," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the eighth day of April one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, in the words following, that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues;" and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fifth and sixth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for enabling ecclesiastical corporations, aggregate and sole, to grant leases for long terms of years," have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme, for determining the portion of the improved value to be made payable to us in a certain lease of a metallic mine and minerals about to be granted by the Lord Bishop of Exeter.

"Whereas by the said last recited Act it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for any ecclesiastical corporation, aggregate or sole (excepting as therein is excepted, which exception does not include the case of a bishop), from time to time, with the consent in that behalf thereby required, and subject to the provisions in the same Acts contained, to grant or demise by lease, for any term not exceeding sixty years, any mines, minerals, quarries, or beds belonging to such corporation:

"And whereas, in pursuance of the powers contained in the said recited enactment, it is proposed by the Right Reverend Henry Bishop of Exeter, with the consent required by the same Act, to grant and demise, by lease, a certain metallic mine, with the produce thereof, belonging

to the see of Exeter, and situate within the manor or lordship of Cargoll, in the county of Cornwall, and called Penhallow Moor Mine :

“ And whereas by the same Act it is further enacted, that, in case of any lease of mines, minerals, quarries, or beds granted thereunder, such portion of the improved value accruing under such lease, as by the authority provided in the first recited Act shall be determined, not being more than three fourth parts nor less than one moiety of such improved value, shall forthwith, and from time to time as the same shall accrue, be paid to us, and shall be subject to the provisions relating to monies payable to us :

“ And whereas the improved value to accrue under the lease so proposed to be granted as aforesaid will, according to the meaning of the same Act, be the whole net amount of the reservation or reservations to be made in such lease so proposed to be granted as aforesaid :

“ Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, that one moiety of the whole net amount of the reservation or reservations to be made in the said lease so to be granted, whether consisting of rent, royalty, or otherwise, shall, by such lease, be made directly payable to us; and that we shall have all the like remedies, in respect of such moiety of any such reservation as aforesaid, as if the same were a separate rent reserved to us as lessors or grantors and reversioners of the premises comprised in such lease, independently of the rights and remedies of the said Henry Bishop of Exeter, and his successors, bishops of Exeter, in respect of the remaining moiety thereof, without any priority or preference between us and the bishop of Exeter for the time being; and further, that we shall have full benefit and advantage, either jointly with or separately from the said Henry Bishop of Exeter, and his successors, bishops of Exeter for the time being, of all or any of the covenants, conditions, and agreements in the said lease to be contained on the lessee's part, in like manner as if we had been grantors, lessors, and reversioners as aforesaid, and as in such lease shall be expressed; and that, for effectuating such objects, the said lease shall and may be framed in such manner, and contain all such clauses and provisions as we shall approve, and shall have full force accordingly, any rule of law, statute, or custom to the contrary notwithstanding.

“ And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us, from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in conformity with the provisions of the said recited Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament.”

And whereas notice of the said scheme has been given to the said Henry Bishop of Exeter, in accordance with the provisions of the first recited Act, and he has made no objection thereto :

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct, that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Exeter.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled “An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes,” duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the eleventh day of April one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, in the words following, *viz.*

“ Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Doncaster, in the county and diocese of York, it appears

to them to be expedient, that a particular district should, under the provisions of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," be assigned to the consecrated church, called Christ Church, situate in the said parish of Doncaster; and that such district should be named, "The Chapelry District of Christ Church, Doncaster," and be bounded as follows:

"On or towards the south by the parish of Cantley, on or towards the west by the township of Hexthorpe with Balby, in the said parish of Doncaster, on or towards the north, by proceeding in a north easterly direction along the middle of the road leading from Sheffield to Doncaster, as far as Saint Sepulchre's-gate; it then proceeds south easterly down the middle of Printing Office-street to Cleveland-street, and crossing that street continues south easterly, down the middle of Wood-street to the Horse-fair; it then turns easterly towards Hall-gate, up the middle of which it proceeds northerly, as far as Princes-street, and then turns north easterly for about ninety-one feet and a half to the north east corner of the house on the north side of Princes-street, next adjoining upon Hall-gate, and passing through the houses on the northern side of that street it then takes a straight line northerly, crossing Chapel-yard and Bradford-row, and continues northerly, between the backs of the houses and premises on the eastern side of Hall-gate and the western side of East Laith-gates, and enters Silver-street at the distance of three hundred and sixty-three feet from the north west corner of East Laith-gates to the west side of the house occupied by Mr. Trains; it then proceeds north easterly, along the middle of Silver-street, as far as East Laith-gates, down the middle of which it turns southerly, as far as the footpath on the south side of Nether-hall; it then proceeds north easterly along the middle of that footpath till it enters Broxholme-lane, which it crosses, and proceeds in a south easterly direction along another footpath into the road leading from Doncaster to Thorne, and passes along the middle of that road, easterly, as far as Armthorpe-lane; it then proceeds down the middle of that lane, in a
