

AT the Court at *Buckingham-Palace*, the

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the ninth day of April one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, in the words following, viz.

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of New Church, in the isle of Wight, and within the diocese of Winchester, it appears to them to be expedient, that a particular district should, under the provisions of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," be assigned to the consecrated church, called Trinity Church, situate at Ryde, in the said parish of New Church; and that such district should be named, "The Chapelry District of the Holy Trinity, Ryde," and be bounded as follows, that is to say:

"On or towards the north by the sea, on or towards the east and south east by the parish of Saint Helen, on or towards the south by proceeding from the said parish of Saint Helen in a straight line in a north westerly direction, continuing along the middle of the road on the southern side of Weeks-buildings, leading to the Stone-quarry; and on the west and north west by the remaining part of the said parish of New Church, from which it is separated by a line drawn in a northerly direction up the middle of the road, west of Weeks-buildings, as far as

another road, north of Weeks-buildings; it then turns easterly along the middle of that road, as far as a line drawn in a north easterly direction, towards Albert-street, continuing up the middle of Albert-street, as far as the road leading to the said parish of Saint Helen; it then turns north, westerly up the middle of the said road, as far as Warwick-street, and passes up the middle of that street to Star-street; then turns north westerly up the middle of Star-street as far as George-street, and then proceeds up the middle of George-street to the sea, as shewn on the plan hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured red:

"That banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized and performed in the said church, called Trinity Church, and that all fees arising therefrom should be reserved for and on account of, and paid to, the present Vicar or Incumbent of the said parish of New Church, during such time only as he shall remain Vicar of such parish, but upon his avoidance thereof the said fees should belong and be paid to the Minister for the time being of the said church, called Trinity Church:

"That the consent of the Right Reverend Charles Richard Bishop of Winchester has been obtained thereto, as required by the Act and section firstly hereinbefore mentioned; in testimony whereof, the said Charles Richard Bishop of Winchester has signed and sealed this representation:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment be accordingly made; and the recommendations of the said Commissioners, in respect of the publication of banns and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, and the fees arising therefrom, be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Act.
