The Majesty in Council was this day pleased to appoint the Right Honourable the Lord President of the Council, for the time being; the Right Honourable the Earl of Clarendon, President of the Committee of Council for Trade and Foreign Plantations; the Right Honourable the Earl of Auckland, First Lord Commissioner of the Admiralty; the Right Honourable John Russell (commonly called Lord John Russell), First Lord Commissioner of Her Majesty's Treasury; the Right Honourable George William Frederick Howard (commonly called Viscount Morpeth), Chief Commissioner of Woods and Forests; the

Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart. one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; the Right Honourable Thomas Babington Macaulay, Paymaster General of Her Majesty's Forces; and the Right Honourable Charles Wood, Chancellor and Under Treasurer of Her Majesty's Exchequer, to be a Committee to superintend the application of any sums voted by Parliament for the purpose of promoting public education.

THEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled " An Act for carrying into effect " the reports of the Commissioners " pointed to consider the state of the Established " Church in England and Wales, with reference " to ecclesiastical duties and revenues, so far as " they relate to episcopal dioceses, revenues, and " patronage;" and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fifth and sixth years of Her Majesty's reign, tituled " An Act to alter and amend the law " relating to ecclesiastical houses of residence," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the first day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, in the words following, that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An "Act for carrying into effect the reports "of the Commissioners appointed to consider the state of the Established Church in "England and Wales, with reference to ecclesiastical duties and revenues, so far as they "relate to episcopal dioceses, revenues, and patronage;" and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fifth and sixth

years of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act" to alter and amend the law relating to eccle"siastical houses of residence," have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme, for adding to, altering, and improving the episcopal house of residence of the see of Bath and Wells.

"Whereas it is by the first-recited Act emacted, that, for the purpose of providing the bishop of any diocese with a more suitable residence than that which at the time of the passing of the same Act belonged to his see, sanction be given where it may be necessary for the borrowing by any bishop of a sum not exceeding two years income of his see, upon such terms as shall appear to be proper; and that the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne be empowered to lend money upon mortgage to such bishop:

"And whereas it is by the said secondly-recited Act enacted, that whenever it shall appear to be expedient to add to, alter, or improve any episcopal house of residence, it shall be lawful, by the authority provided in the first recited Act, with the consent under the hand and episcopal seal of the bishop, to make such arrangements as may by such authority be deemed most expedient for adding to, altering, or improving any episcopal house of residence, and that so much of the said first recited Act, as relates to the providing of any bishop with a more suitable and convenient residence, shall be extended so as to include and apply to the purposes of the said secondly recited Act; and that in case such a deficiency would be created in the average annual income of any bishop appointed after the passing of the said first recited Act, by the effecting of any mortgage or other arrangement under either of the said recited Acts, so as to reduce such income below the average annual income of such bishop named in the said first recited Act, it shall be lawful by the authority aforesaid, out of any monies from time to time standing to our credit and account, being part of payments from the larger sees, respectively, towards the augmentation of the incomes of the bishops of the smaller sees, if it shall be deemed fit, and if such monies, after duly considering all the claims thereon, shall appear sufficient for such purpose, to make any arrangement for supplying such deficiency, or any part thereof, which by the like authority shall be deemed expedient;

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient, with the consent of the Honourable and Right Reverend Richard Bishop of Bath and Wells, in testimony whereof he hath hereunto set his hand and episcopal scal, to effect certain additions, alterations, and improvements in the episcopal house of residence belonging to the see of Bath and Wells; and that, towards this purpose, the sum of three thousand pounds, being less than the amount of income limited by the said first-recited Act, should be provided, by the said bishop borrowing the same by way of mortgage on the security of all or any part of the lands, tenements, and hereditaments of and belonging to his see, according to the provision for that purpose contained in the said first-recited Act :

"And whereas it has been agreed between us and the said Richard Bishop of Bath and Wells, that the said additions, alterations, and improvements shall be made and completed according to specifications and plans to be approved by us, and to the satisfaction of an architect to be named by us, and within a time to be limited in a contract to be made for that purpose, and that all costs, charges, and expenses in and about the completion thereof and incidental thereto and to effecting the said mortgage, over and above the said sum of three thousand pounds, shall be defrayed by the said Richard Bishop of Bath and Wells, his executors or administrators:

"And whereas a deficiency may be created in the average annual income of the said Bishop of Bath and Wells by reason of such mortgage, and the said bishop has been appointed since the passing of the said first-recited Act, and we deem it fit that, out of the monies standing to our credit and account, being part of payments from the larger sees respectively in augmentation of the incomes of the bishops of the smaller sees, provision should be made for supplying such deficiency, if after duly considering all the claims thereon, we shall find that such monies will be sufficient for such purpose:

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, that the said Richard Bishop of Bath and Wells be authorized to borrow from the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and that the said Governors be empowered to lend, under the provisions of the hereinbefore-recited Acts, the sum of three thousand pounds, and, as a security

for the same, that the said Richard Bishop of Bath and Wells do mortgage all or any part of the lands, tenements, and hereditaments of and belonging to his said see to the said Governors, by deed, for the term of thirty-five years, or untilthe said sum of three thousand pounds, with the interest for the same, and all costs and charges which may attend the recovery thereof, shall be fully paid and satisfied; and that such principal sum. shall be repaid, with interest, in manner following, that is to say; from and after the expiration of the first year of the said term, computed from the day of the date of the mortgage, in which year no part of the said principal sum shall be repayable, the said Richard Bishop of Bath and Wells, or his successors, shall yearly and every year, pay to the said Governors, their successors, thirtieth part of the said assigns, one principal sum, until the whole thereof shall be repaid; and shall, at the end of the first and each succeeding year pay interest, at the rate of threepounds and ten shillings per cent. per annum, on the said principal sum, or on so much thereof as shall, from time to time, remain unpaid, and if and when it shall happen that the principal and interest directed to be paid as hereinbefore mentioned shall be in arrear and unpaid for the space of forty days after the same shall become due, it shall and may be lawful for the said Governors, their successors or assigns, to recover the same, and the costs and charges attending the recovery thereof, by distress and sale, in such manner as rents may be recovered by landlords or lessors from their tenants by the laws in being at the time of such distress and sale; and such mortgage. deed shall be in the form and to the effect to be approved by us, and shall bind as well the said Richard Bishop of Bath and Wells as every succeeding bishop of the said see, until the principal and interest, costs, and charges shall be paid off and discharged.

"And we further recommend and propose, that the said sum of three thousand pounds shall be paid to us to be applied to the purposes aforesaid, and that the receipt of our Treasurer for the time being, indorsed on the said mortgage deed, shall be a good and sufficient discharge to the said Governors and their successors for the same, who shall not be bound or required to see to the application thereof; and that, upon the receipt of the

said sum of three thousand pounds, and upon an agreement in writing to the effect hereinbefore mentioned, with such conditions and covenants as may appear necessary for fully carrying into effect the arrangement aforesaid, being executed by the said Richard Bishop of Bath and Wells and by us, and also upon a contract or contracts in writing for making and completing the said additions, alterations, and improvements, containing all usual and proper covenants, conditions, stipulations, and agreements, together with a bond or bonds, in such form and penalty as shall appear to us to be fit and proper, being duly executed by the person or persons employed to complete such additions, alterations, and improvements, there shall be applied and paid by us to such persons, at such times and in such manner as in and by the said agreement and any such contract shall be provided, the whole or any part or parts of such sum in or towards completing the said additions, alterations, and improvements.

"And we further recommend and propose, that the said agreement shall contain a covenant on the part of the said Richard Bishop of Bath and Wells for assuring, and keeping assured, such house of residence from loss or damage by fire during the progress of the said additions and alterations in one of the public offices of assurance in London or Westminster, to be approved by us, in the sum of six thousand pounds in the whole.

" And we further recommend and propose, that, on or before the day upon which the policy of assurance last effected under such agreement shall expire, the said Richard Bishop of Bath and Wells, or his successors, shall, at his or their own personal charge and expense, in like manner, assure such house and premises from like loss or damage; and that he, and every future Bishop of Bath and Wells, shall, from time to time, so assure, and keep assured, the said house and premises in the same sum; and shall, within fourteen days after any premium for such assurance shall have become due and payable, deliver and hand over to us the receipt for such premium; and that, in case of any loss or damage by fire to the said house and premises, any and every sum of money receivable under such policy of assurance shall be paid to and deposited with us by the said Richard Bishop of Bath and Wells, and his successors, bishops of Bath and Wells, in trust, to be applied, and the same, together with any interest and accumulations thereon, shall be applied by us towards the rebuilding or repairing and reinstating of the said house and premises, or of such part or parts thereof as may have so suffered loss or damage, in such manner as shall appear to us, with the concurrence of the Bishop of Bath and Wells for the time being, to be fit and proper.

" And we further recommend and propose, that, upon any application, in writing, being made to us by the Bishop of Bath and Wells for the time being, accompanied by an account under his hand shewing that an actual deficiency has been created by reason of such mortgage in the average annual income named for the Bishop of Bath and Wells in the said first-recited Act, and if it be the first application of the bishop and he shall have been in possession of the see for more years than one, or if more years than one shall have elapsed since the next previous similar application of the same bishop, then also shewing that the deficiency exists upon the whole average net receipts of all such years in the one case or the other, we shall proceed duly to consider all the claims upon the monies hereinbefore and inthe said secondly-recited Act particularly mentioned, and if such monies shall then, or if at any future time or times they shall, upon like consideration, appear to us to be sufficient for the purpose, we shall supply such deficiency, or so much thereof as the circumstances will allow, either by a payment or payments, out of such monies, to such bishop or his representatives asthe case may be, or by allowing a deduction to be made from any payment then due, or next becoming due, to us from such bishop under any Order of your Majesty in Council.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, in conformity with the provisions of the said recited Acts, or any of them."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct, that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Bath and Wells.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for "the spiritual care of populous parishes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fifteenth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, in the words following, that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act" to make better provision for the spiritual care of populous parishes," have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme, for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the parish of Bridgwater, in the county of Somerset, and in the diocese of Bath and Wells.

"Whereas it is by the said Act enacted, that if at any time it shall be made to appear to us, that it would promote the interests of religion, that any part or parts of any parish or parishes, chapelry or chapelries, district or districts, of great extent, and containing a large population, and wherein, or in parts whereof, the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof, or any extra-parochial place or places, or any part or parts thereof, should be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, it shall be lawful, by the authority in the same Act provided (that is to say, by a scheme prepared by us, and an Order

issued by your Majesty in Council, ratifying such scheme), with the consent of the bishop of the diocese, under his hand and seal, to set out by metes and bounds, and constitute a separate district accordingly, such district not then containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship, and to fix and declare the name of such district; and it is by the same Act provided, that the draft of any scheme for constituting any such district shall be delivered or transmitted to the incumbent and to the patron or patrons of the church or chapel of any parish, chapelry, or district, out of which it is recommended that any such district, or any part thereof, should be taken, in order that such incumbent, patron or patrons, may have an opportunity of offering or making to us, or to such bishop, any observations or objections upon or to the constituting of such district; and that such scheme shall not be laid before your Majesty in Council until after the expiration of one calendar month next after such copy shall have been so delivered or transmitted, unless such incumbent and patron or patrons shall, in the mean time, consent to the same; and it is by the same Act also provided, that in every such scheme for constituting any such district we shall recommend to your Majesty in Council that the minister of such district, when duly licensed according to the same Act, shall be permanently endowed, under the provisions of the same Act, to an amount of not less than the annual value of one hundred pounds; and also, if such endowment be of less than the annual value of one hundred and fifty pounds, that the same shall be increased to such last-mentioned amount at the least, so soon as such district shall have become a new parish as thereinafter provided:

"And whereas the said parish of Bridgwater is of great extent, and contains a large population, and the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence therein is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof; and it has been made to appear to us, that it would promote the interests of religion, that the particular part of such parish hereinafter mentioned, such part not at present containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship, should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter set forth:

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, with the consent of the Honourable and Right Reverend Richard Bishop of Bath and Wells, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme, that all that part of the said parish of Bridgwater, described in the schedule hereunto annexed,—all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth in the map or plan hereunto also annexed,—shall be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes accordingly; and that the same shall be named, "The District of Saint John the Baptist, Eastover."

" And we further recommend and propose, that there shall be paid by us, in each and every year, to the minister for the time being of the district so recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed according to the said Act, the sum of one hundred pounds; and upon any building within such district, being duly licensed by the bishop of the diocese for the performance of divine service, according to the same Act, there shall be paid by us, in like manner, to such minister, the further sum of thirty pounds, making in the whole the sum of one hundred and thirty pounds; and that so soon as any church or chapel within such district shall have been duly approved by us, and consecrated as the church or chape of such district, for the use and service of the minister and inhabitants thereof, and such district shall have thereupon become, according to the provisions of the same Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, there shall be paid by us, in each and every year, to the perpetual curate for the time being of such new parish, the sum of one hundred and fifty pounds; and that the said sum of one hundred pounds, one hundred and thirty pounds, or one hundred and fifty pounds, as the case may be, shall be paid, by equal halfyearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year; and that the first such payment, or a proportionate part thereof, shall be made on the first day of May or of November next after the day of the date of the licence of such minister or of such building, or of the consecration of such church or chapel as aforesaid, as the case may be; and that in case a vacancy in the ministry or perpetual curacy of such district or new parish shall happen on any other day than the first day

of May or the first day of November, the amount payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the minister or the perpetual curate making the vacancy, or his personal representative or representatives, and the minister or the perpetual curate succeeding to such district or new parish.

" And whereas it is by the said Act further enacted, that it shall be lawful, by the authority aforesaid, at any time to assign the right of patronage of any such district or new parish as aforesaid, and the nomination of the minister or perpetual curate thereof respectively, either in perpetuity, or for one or more nomination or nominations, to any ecclesiastical corporation aggregate or sole, or to either of the universities of Oxford, Cambridge, or Durham, or to any college therein respectively, or to any person or persons, or the nominee or nominees of such person or persons or body respectively, upon condition of such corporation, university, college, person or persons contributing to the permanent endowment of such minister or perpetual curate, or towards providing a church or chapel for the use of the inhabitants of such district or new parish, in such proportion, and in such manner, as shall be approved by the like authority:

"And whereas a church or chapel has been erected within the said district of Saint John the Baptist, Eastover, herein recommended to be constituted, and such church or chapel has been offered for approval by us, and for consecration as the church or chapel of the said district, for the use and service of the minister and inhabitants thereof:

"And whereas also a sum of three hundred pounds has been deposited with us, upon trust, to be applied in such manner as shall appear to us to be expedient, as a permanent fund, towards the repairs and maintenance of the fabric of the said church or chapel:

"And whereas the present owners of the said church or chapel have, by an instrument in writing under their hands, nominated to us the Reverend John Coombe Collins, late of Wembdon, but now of Eastover, in the parish of Bridgwater aforesaid, Clerk, as the patron of the said district and contemplated new parish for the first turn; and the Bishop of Bath and Wells for the time being as the future patron in perpetuity of the said district or new parish:

"We, therefore, further recommend and propose, that the right of patronage of the said district or new parish, and the nomination of the minister or perpetual curate thereof, as the case may be, shall, for the first nomination only, be assigned to and vested in the said John Coombe Collins; and that after such first nominalion the future patronage of the said district or new parish shall be assigned to and absolutely vested in the said Richard Bishop of Bath and Wells, and his successors Bishops of Bath and Wells for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament.

" SCHEDULE.

"The district of St. John the Baptist, Eastover, being-

"All that part of the parish of Bridgwater, in the county of Somerset, and in the diocese of Bath and Wells, situate on the eastern side of the river Parrett."

And whereas the draft of the said scheme has been transmitted to the incumbent and patron of the church of the parish out of which it is intended that the district therein recommended to be constitued shall be taken, pursuant to the provisions of the said Act; and whereas one calendar month has expired since such draft was so transmitted, and no objections have been made thereto:

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct, that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Bath and Wells.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for "the spiritual care of populous parishes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the seventeenth day of December one thousand eight hundred and forty-five, in the words following, that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act "to make better provision for the spiritual care "of populous parishes," have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme, for authorizing the sale of certain property lately belonging to the prebend of Norwell Overhall, in the collegiate church of Southwell.

" Whereas it is by the said recited Act enacted, that all the same and the like powers and rights of ownership, as are possessed and enjoyed respecting and over any lands, tenements, or other hereditaments whatsoever by any absolute owner thereof, shall be enjoyed by us with respect to and over all or any lands, tithes, rent charges, tenements, and other hereditaments vested in us under certain Acts therein mentioned (being the Acts under which the property hereinafter described is so vested in us), and may, subject to the provisions of the same Acts, and of the now reciting Act, be exercised by us by proper instruments in writing duly executed according to law; with a certain proviso respecting the application of every sum of money received as the consideration or purchase money for the sale, transfer, and conveyance by us of any such lands, tithes, tenements, or other hereditaments, or of any estate or interest therein; and with a further proviso, that none of such lands, tithes, tenements, or other hereditaments be sold, transferred, or

conveyed except by the authority of a scheme prepared by us, and an Order issued by your Majesty in Council, ratifying the same:

"And whereas the messuages or tenements and premises, described in the schedule hereunder written, lately formed a portion of the property and endowment of the said prebend of Norwell Overhall, but are now vested in us, by reason of the vacancy of the said prebend:

"And whereas we have contracted and agreed for the sale of the said messuages or tenements and premises, subject to the determination of a certain subsisting lease for lives, to the purchaser and for the price hereinafter mentioned:

"We humbly recommend and propose, that we may be authorized to sell and duly to convey, according to the provisions of the said recited Act, to Thomas Weightman, of Upton, in the county of Nottingham, governor of the union workhouse there, his heirs or assigns, or as he or they shall direct and appoint, at and for the price or sum of eighty-five pounds, all our estate and interest in the messuages or tenements and premises so described in the said schedule hereunder written.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, in conformity with the provisions of the said recited Act of Parliament, or any other Act.

"THE SCHEDULE.

" All that messuage, cottage, or tenement, situate and being at Norwell, in the county of Nottingham, formerly in the occupation of Samuel Browne, but now used as a public-house, known by the sign of the Plough, and heretofore in the tenure or occupation of the said Thomas Weightman, but now of James Wright; and also all those two cottages or tenements adjoining the last before described messuage or tenement, one of which was heretofore in the occupation of Widow Elvidge, the other having been heretofore a stable, but which are now, or lately were, in the respective occupatious of Amy Rushby and Robert Lambert, with the south side of the homestead adjoining to the said messuages, cottages, or tenements as the same is now divided from the north side thereof (such south side heretofore stated to contain twenty-four perches and a half),

the same being late also in the tenure or occupation of the said Thomas Weightman, but now of the said James Wright; all which said premises contain in the whole, by admeasurement, twentythree perches, or thereabouts, and are situate in Norwell aforesaid, and are part and parcel of the premises mentioned and comprised in and demised by a certain indenture of lease, bearing date the eighteenth day of April one thousand eight hundred and five: together with all buildings, gardens, trees, commons, easements, and appurtenances to the same belonging or appertaining."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct, that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Lincoln.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better pro"vision for the spiritual care of populous parishes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the seventeenth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, in the words following, that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to "make better provision for the spiritual care of po-"pulous parishes," have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme, for authorising the sale of certain property lately belonging to the precentor of the cathedral church of Wells, but now vested in us:

"Whereas by the said recited Act, it is enacted, that all the same and the like powers and rights of ownership, as are possessed and enjoyed respecting and over any lands, tenements, or other hereditaments by any absolute owner thereof, shall be enjoyed by us with respect to and over all or any lands, tithes, rent charges, tenements, and other hereditaments vested in us under certain Acts therein mentioned (being the Acts under which the property hereinafter specified is so vested in us), and may, subject to the provisions of the same Acts, and of the now reciting Act, be exercised by us by proper instruments duly executed according to law; provided always, that none of such lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments as aforesaid, be sold or conveyed except by a scheme prepared by us, and laid before your Majesty in Council, and an Order of your Majesty in Council, ratifying the same:

"And whereas the tenements and premises, described in the schedule hereunto annexed (which schedule we recommend and propose shall be deemed to be part of this scheme), formed a portion of the property and endowment of the dignity or office of precentor, other called chaunter, of the said cathedral church of Wells, and is now vested in us, by reason of the vacancy of the said office:

"And whereas we have contracted and agreed with William Chester Berryman the younger, of the city of Wells aforesaid, wine and spirit merchant, for the sale to him, at or for the sum of one hundred and sixty-three pounds six shillings and six pence, of the said tenements and premises, subject, nevertheless, to the determination of two several leases for lives thereof:

"We, therefore, humbly recommend and propose, that we may be authorized to sell and duly to convey to the said William Chester Berryman, or as he shall direct or appoint, at and for the price or sum of one hundred and sixty-three pounds six shillings and six pence, all our estate and interest in the said tenements and premises, according to the provisions of the said recited Act.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, in conformity with the provisions of the said recited Act of Parliament, or of any other Act.

" SCHEDULE.

" First. All that messuage or tenement situate in a street in Wells aforesaid, called High-street, formerly in the tenure of John Bath, deceased, since of Thomas Parfitt and John Conway, respectively deceased, and afterwards in the occupation of William Knight, as tenant of George Rich and Joseph Lovell Lovell, bounded on the west with the inn, formerly called called the Bell Inn, but afterwards called the Angel Inn, on the east with a house formerly in the possession of the widow Chappell, since of Frances Nicholls, and then of Thomas Grandon, on the south with an outhouse, late belonging to William Rood, goldsmith, since deceased, and afterwards to John Lax: with all lights, ways, passages, easements, profits, commodities, and appurtenances to the same belonging or in any wise appertaining.

"Secondly. All that plot, piece, or parcel of ground, together with the stable and other buildings thereon erected, and lying and being at the south west extremity of a certain tenement situate, lying, and being in a street called High-street, in Wells aforesaid, and heretofore in the tenure or occupation of Humphrey Rowley, afterwards of Jacob Worrall, William Rood, and Thomas Tücker, and late of John Lax, or his enants, and the rights, members, and appurtenances thereto belonging or appertaining."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct, that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Bath and Wells.
