The Speech of the Lords Commissioners to both Houses of Parliament, on Friday, August 28, 1846.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

WE are commanded by Her Majesty to express to you the warm acknowledgments of Her Majesty for the public spirit you have evinced in the discharge of your laborious duties during an anxious and protracted session.

Her Majesty trusts that you will be rewarded by witnessing the beneficial results of the measures, which have been sanctioned by Her Majesty, for the present relaxation, and ultimate repeal, of protective duties on corn and sugar.

Her Majesty entertains a confident hope that the more free admission of the produce of foreign countries into the home market will increase the comforts and better the condition of the great body of Her people.

Her Majesty feels the greatest satisfaction in reflecting that Her Majesty's efforts to settle, in a manner consistent with national honour, the conflicting claims of Great Britain and the United States, with respect to the territory on the north west coast of America, have been completely successful.

Her Majesty continues to receive from all foreign powers the strongest assurances of their desire to cultivate friendly relations with this country.

Her Majesty commands us to congratulate you on the victorious course and happy conclusion of the war in India, and Her Majesty has much gratification in announcing to you that perfect tranquillity prevails throughout the whole of the British possessions in that quarter of the world.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

Her Majesty has observed with satisfaction the care you have taken to prevent permanent loss to the revenue, and to maintain the public faith.

Her Majesty has commanded us to acknowledge the zeal and unanimity with which you assented to the increase in the naval and military estimates, which a regard to the exigencies of the public service induced Her Majesty to propose for your consideration.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

Her Majesty has to lament that the recurrence of a failure in the potatoe crop in an aggravated degree will cause a serious deficiency in the quantity of a material article of food.

Her Majesty has given Her cordial assent to measures by which this calamity may be mitigated in that part of the United Kingdom where the cultivation of the potatoe has hitherto afforded the chief supply for the subsistence of the people.

Her Majesty has seen with pleasure that a considerable diminution of crime and outrage has taken place in those counties of Ireland which had been most disturbed.

Her Majesty is confident that on your return to your several counties you will find a spirit of loyalty generally prevalent. The extension of works of improvement has increased the demand for labour, and the tranquillity of the country has favoured the pursuits of industry in all its branches.

Her Majesty trusts that by a combination of prudence with enterprise, and of a willing obedience to law, with a desire for social progress, Her people will, through the Divine blessing, enjoy the full advantages of peace.

Then a Commission for proroguing the Parliament was read; after which the Lord Chancellor said:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of Her Privy Council, and by virtue of the authority committed to Her by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the seventh and eighth years of Her reign, intituled "An Act to amend the law relating "to international copyright," doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that, from and after the first day of September one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, the authors, inventors, designers, engravers, and makers of any of the following works (that is to say), books, prints, articles of sculpture, dramatic works, musical compositions, and any other works of literature and the fine arts, in which the laws of Great Britain give to British subjects the privilege of copyright, and the executors, administrators, and assigns of such authors, inventors, designers, engravers, and makers, respectively, shall, as respects works first published within the dominions of Prussia, after the said first day of September one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, have the privilege of copyright therein for a period equal to the term of copyright which authors, inventors, designers, engravers, and makers of the like works, respectively, first published in the United Kingdom are by law entitled to; provided such books, dramatic pieces, musical compositions, prints, articles of sculpture, or other works of art have been registered, and copies thereof have been delivered according to the requirements of the said recited Act, within twelve months after the first publication thereof in any part of the Prussian dominions:

And it is hereby further ordered, that the authors of dramatic pieces and musical compositions which shall, after the said first day of September one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, be first publicly represented or performed within the dominions of Prussia shall have the sole liberty of representing or performing in any part of the British dominions such dramatic pieces or musical compositions, during a period equal to the period during which authors of dramatic pieces and musical compositions first publicly represented or performed in the United Kingdom are entitled by law to the sole liberty of representing or performing the same; provided such dramatic pieces or musical compositions have been registered, and copies thereof have been delivered according to the requirements of the said recited Act, within twelve calendar months after the time of their being first represented or performed in any part of the Prussian dominions:

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary orders herein accordingly.

And whereas Her Majesty hath this day, by year one thousand eight hundred an virtue of the authority vested in Her for that in the words following, that is to say:

purpose, declared that the authors, inventors, designers, engravers, and makers of books, prints, and certain other works of art, first published within the dominions of Prussia, shall have the privilege of copyright therein:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of Her Privy Council, and in virtue of the authority committed to Her by the said recited Act, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that, from and after the first day of September one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, in lieu of the duties of Customs now payable upon books, prints, and drawings, published at any place within the dominions of Prussia, there shall be payable only the duties of Customs following (that is to say):

On books originally produced in the United Kingdom, and republished at any place within the dominions of Prussia, a duty of two pounds ten shillings per hundred weight.

On books published or republished at any place within the dominions of Prussia, and not being books originally produced in the United Kingdom, a duty of fifteen shillings per hundred weight.

On prints and drawings, plain or coloured published at any place within the dominions of Prussia,

Single, each, - 0 $0\frac{1}{2}$ Bound or sewn, the dozen, - 0 $1\frac{1}{2}$

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the spiritual "care of populous parishes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-ninth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, in the words following, that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act "to make better provision for the spiritual care of "populous parishes," have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme, for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the parishes of Aberystruth and Bedwelty, in the county of Monmouth, and diocese of Llandaff, and the parishes of Llangattock and Llangunider, in the county of Brecon, and diocese of Saint David's.

"Whereas it is by the said Act enacted, that if at any time it shall be made to appear to us, that it would promote the interests of religion, that any part or parts of any parish or parishes, chapelry or chapelries, district or districts, of great extent, and containing a large population, and wherein, or in parts whereof, the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof, or any extra-parochial place or places, or any part or parts thereof, should be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, it shall be lawful, by the authority in the same Act provided (that is to say, by a scheme prepared by us, and an Order issued by your Majesty in Council, ratifying such scheme), with the consent of the bishop of the diocese, under his hand and seal, to set out by metes and bounds, and constitute a separate district accordingly, such district not then containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship, and to fix and declare the name of such district; and it is by the same Act provided, that the draft of any scheme for constituting any such district shall be delivered or transmitted to the incumbent and to the patron or patrons of the church or chapel of any parish, chapelry, or district, out of which it is recommended that any such district, or any part thereof, should be taken, in order that such incumbent, patron or patrons, may have an opportunity of offering or making to us, or to such bishop, any observations or objections upon or to the constituting of such district; and that such scheme shall not be laid before your Majesty in Council until after the expiration of one calendar month next after such copy shall have been so delivered or transmitted, unless such incumbent and patron or patrons shall, in the meantime, consent to the same; and it is by the same Act also provided, that in every such scheme for constituting any such district we shall recommend to your Majesty in Council that the minister of such district, when duly licenced according to the same Act, shall be permanently endowed, under the provisions of the same Act, to an amount of not less than the annual value of one hundred pounds; and also, if such endowment be of less than the annual value of one hundred and fifty pounds, that the same shall be increased to such last-mentioned amount at the least, so soon as such district shall have become a new parish as thereinafter provided:

"And whereas the said parishes of Aberystruth, Bedwelty, Llangattock, and Llangunider are respectively of great extent, and contain a large population, and the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence therein is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof; and it has been made to appear to us, that it would promote the interests of religion, that the particular part of each of such parishes hereinafter mentioned and described, neither of which parts at present contains within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship, should be together constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter set forth:

" Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, with the consent of the Right Reverend Edward Bishop of Llandaff, and Connop Bishop of Saint David's, in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this scheme, that all that part of the said parish of Aberystruth, and also all that part of the said parish of Bedwelty, and also all that part of the said parish of Llangattock, and also all that part of the said parish of Llangunider, described in the schedule hereunto annexed, -all which parts, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth in the map or plan hereunto also annexed,-shall be together constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes accordingly; and that the same shall be named, "the District of Beaufort;" and that so much and such parts of the said parishes of Llangattock and Llangunider as shall be included in and form part of such district shall be detached and dissevered from the said diocese of Saint David's and the archdeaconry of Brecon, and the same and the

clergy and others therein shall be released from the jurisdiction of the present and every future bishop of Saint David's and archdeacon of Brecon, and shall, to all intents and purposes, become and be permanently annexed and united to and included in and form part of the said diocese of Llandaff and the archdeaconry of Monmouth, as completely as the other portion of such district is now part thereof; and that the whole of such district shall be in the deanry of Abergavenny.

" And we further recommend and propose, that there shall be paid by us, in each and every year, to the minister for the time being of the said district so recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed according to the said Act, the sum of one hundred pounds; and upon any building within such district, being duly licensed by the bishop of the diocese for the performance of divine service, according to the same Act, there shall be paid by us, in like manner, to such minister. the further sum of thirty pounds, making in the whole the sum of one hundred and thirty pounds; and that so soon as any church or chapel within such district shall have been duly approved by us, and consecrated as the church or chapel of such district, for the use and service of the minister and inhabitants thereof, and such district shall have thereupon become, according to the provisions of the same Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, there shall be paid by us, in each and every year, to the perpetual curate for the time being of such new parish, the sum of one hundred and fifty pounds; and that the said sum of one hundred pounds, one hundred and thirty pounds, or one hundred and fifty pounds, as the case may be, shall be paid, by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year; and that the first such payment, or a proportionate part thereof, shall be made on the first day of May or of November next after the day of the date of the licence of such minister or of such building, or of the consecration of such church or chapel as aforesaid, as the case may be; and that in case a vacancy in the ministry or perpetual curacy of such district or new parish shall happen on any other day than the first day of May or the first day of November, the amount payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the minister or the perpetual curate making the vacancy, or his personal representative or representatives, and the minister or the perpetual curate succeeding to such district or new parish.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament.

" SCHEDULE.

- " The district of BEAUFORT, being-
- " All that part of the parish of Aberystruth, in the county of Monmouth, and diocese of Llandaff. and also all that part of the parish of Bedwelty, in the same county and diocese, and also all that part of the parish of Llangattock, in the county of Brecon, and diocese of Saint David's, and also all that part of the parish of Llangunider, in the lastmentioned county and diocese, comprised within and bounded by an imaginary line commencing at a point (marked a on the map or plan hereunto annexed) at the Trevil Machine, in the said parish of Llangunider, and thence extending eastward in a straight direction, one hundred and fifty-one chains and eighty links, or thereabouts, crossing the boundary between the said parishes of Llangunider and Llangattock by Carn Ivor, to a boundary stone (marked b as aforesaid) situate at a distance of sixty-two chains, or thereabouts, from the said crossing at Carn Ivor; and thence southward in a straight direction, fifty chains, or thereabouts, to a boundary stone (marked c as aforesaid) at the north western corner of the district of Nant-y-glo, in the said diocese of Llandaff; and thence along the western boundary of such district to the south eastern corner thereof; and thence westward and in a straight direction, seventy-nine chains, or thereabouts, to Pont Ynis-y-neuadd, on the boundary between the said parishes of Aberystruth and Bedwelty; and thence northward along such last-mentioned boundary to Pont-y-gooe on the Ebbw Vawr river; and thence towards the north west along the middle of Ebbw Vale turnpike road, as far as the middle of the turnpike road to Abergavenny, and thence westward along the middle of such last-mentioned road to a boundary stone (marked d as aforesaid) situate on the boundary between the Ebbw Vale and

Sirhowy Ironworks, at a distance of eighty links, or thereabouts, east of the parish road leading to Mamole, and thence northward in a straight direction to the point where the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the draft of the said scheme has been transmitted to the incumbents and to the patrons of the churches of the parishes, and to the incumbent and patron of the church or chapel of the district, out of which it is intended that the district therein recommended to be constituted shall be taken, pursuant to the provisions of the said Act; and whereas one calendar month has expired since such draft was so transmitted, and no objections have been made thereto:

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct, that this Order be forthwith registered by the respective Registrars of the dioceses of Llandaff and Saint David's.

HEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act" to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the seventh day of August one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, in the words following, viz.

" Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Cheltenham, in the county of Gloucester, and within the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, it appears to them to be expedient, that a particular district should, under the provisions of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled " An Act to amend and render " more effectual an Act, passed in the last session " of Parliament, for building, and promoting the " building, of additional churches in populous " parishes," be assigned to the consecrated church, called Saint Paul's Church, situate in the said parish of Cheltenham, and that such district should be called, " the Chapelry District of Saint Paul, hereinafter Cheltenham," with boundaries as mentioned:

" The boundary commences in the middle of High-street, opposite to White Hart-row, and proceeds in a northerly direction, in a straight line up the middle of White Hart-row, and also of a new and unfinished street or road, situate at the western end of the Cheltenham workhouse, and called the Workhouse-road, as far as the middle of Maidenhorn-lane; and thence, easterly, along the middle of Maidenhorn-lane as far as the road leading to Marl-hill; up the middle of which road it then proceeds, northerly, as far as Weyman'sbrook, where it meets the boundary line of the parishes of Cheltenham and Prestbury; it then proceeds, in a south easterly direction, along the boundary line of the said parishes as far as the Cleeve-road, it then proceeds, in a southerly direction, down the middle of the said road as far as the termination of Pittville-parade, and then turning, north westerly, up the middle of a road leading into Clarence-square as far as Northplace; it then proceeds, south westerly, down the middle of North-place and enters the Back-street, and then proceeds, in a north westerly direction, up the middle of the Back-street as far as Henrietta-street, down the middle of which street it then proceeds, southerly, into High-street; and then, turning north westerly, proceeds up the middle of High-street to the point opposite White Hart-row, where the boundary commenced, as the whole of such district is more particularly

delineated on the map or plan thereof hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured yellow:

"That banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, and churchings, and also burials, so soon as a burial ground shall have been secured for the said district, should be solemnized and performed in the said church of Saint Paul; and that all the fees to arise therefrom should be received for and on account of and be paid to the present incumbent of the said parish of Cheltenham during his incumbency thereof; but, upon the first vacancy of such incumbency, the said fees should be paid and should belong to the minister for the time being of Saint Paul's Church aforesaid:

"That the consent of the Right Reverend James Henry Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol has been obtained thereto, as required by the Act and section firstly herein mentioned; in testimony whereof, the said James Henry Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol has signed and sealed this representation:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment be accordingly made; and the recommendations of the said Commissioners, in respect of the publication of banns and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, and the fees arising therefrom, be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Act.

This day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by Her Majesty, for declaring Her Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act for the more easy recovery of small debts and demands in England.

An Act to amend the law for regulating the hours of receiving and delivering goods and chattels as pawns in pawnbrokers' shops.

An Act for consolidating and amending the laws relating to wreck and salvage.

An Act for the regulation of steam navigation, and for requiring sea-going vessels to carry boats.

An Act to authorize the advance of public money, to a limited amount, to promote the improvement of land in Great Britain and Ireland by works of drainage.

Plan of Retirement for two hundred Captains.

First. The rank of Retired Rear Admiral to be given, by seniority, to such applicants from the 14s. 6d. half pay list, as may be willing to accept it, with the pay of £1 5s. 0d. per day, and the corresponding pension to their widows, under the usual restrictions.

Second. An addition of 7s. 6d. per day to be given to applicants, by seniority, from the 12s. 6d. and 10s. 6d. half-pay lists, being Captains of not less than 20 years standing, and 55 years of age. Officers from both lists to be permitted to assume the title of Retired Rear Admiral at the period when they would have obtained the Flag by seniority, had they remained upon the active list. Their widows to be entitled to a pension of £110 per year; and to the pension of Rear Admiral's widow, when the rank of Retired Rear Admiral has been attained.

Third. The vacancies upon the £1 list to be filled up, in turn of seniority, by Officers now accepting the 18s. Od. per day; but no new admissions to the £1 5s. list to be made until it is reduced below the number of 25, which it is not to exceed afterwards. The permanent retired list to be reduced to 100, by making one appointment for every two vacancies, the first 25 Officers upon the list receiving £1 5s. per day, and the remaining 75 £1 per day, with the right of assuming the rank of Retired Rear Admiral, when entitled to it by seniority.

Fourth. The active list of Captains not permanently to exceed 500. A proportionate reduction to be made in the 14s. 6d. and 12s. 6d. half-pay lists,—the first to consist of 70 Captains, and the latter of 100.

Fifth. Good service pensions to be retained by Captains, until they reach the rank of Rear Admiral, or Retired Rear Admiral.

Sixth. The promotions from the Captain's list to the Admiral's list, in future to be continuous, reserving always the undoubted right of the Crown to select Officers for promotion in the higher as well as the lower ranks, whenever the public interest requires such an exercise of the prerogative.

Seventh. The Admiral's list not permanently to exceed 150 in number, and to be thus distributed:

Thirty Admirals, or ten of each squadron. Forty-five Vice Admirals, or fifteen of each squadron.

And seventy-five Rear Admirals, or twenty-five of each squadron,

but there will be a Flag promotion in the course of the present year, in which the 20 senior Officers upon the Captain's list will be included

Eighth. This plan to come into operation on the 1st of October of the present year, and all letters relating to it, to be treated as strictly confidential.

Officers not in Europe, who may be desirous of accepting the retirement, will not be excluded in consequence of their letters not reaching the Admiralty before the 1st of October next, as a reasonable time will be allowed for such applications.
