AT the Court at *Osborne-House, Isle of Wight*, the 27th day of *August* 1846,

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session holden in the seventh and eighth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the law respecting the office of county coroner," "it is enacted, that when and as often as it shall seem expedient to the justices of any county, that such county should be divided into two or more districts for the purposes of that Act, or that any alteration should be made of any division theretofore made under that Act, it should be lawful for the said justices, in general or quarter sessions assembled, to resolve that a petition should be presented to Her Majesty, praying that such division or alteration be made, and thereupon to adjourn the further consideration of such petition until notice thereof should be given to the coroner or coroners of such county as thereafter provided; and it is thereby further enacted, that the clerk of the peace should give notice of any such resolution to every coroner for such county, and

of the time when the petition would be taken by the said justices into consideration, and the justices should confer with every such coroner who should attend the meeting of the justices for that purpose touching such petition, having due regard to the size and nature of each proposed district, the number of the inhabitants, the nature of their employments, and such other circumstances as should appear to the justices fit to be considered in carrying into execution the provisions of that Act, and such petition, with a description of the several proposed districts, and of the boundaries thereof, with the reasons upon which the petition is founded, should be certified to Her Majesty, under the hands and seals of two or more justices present when such petition should be agreed to, and the clerk of the peace for such county should forthwith give or send a true copy of such petition, certified under his hand, to every coroner for such county; and it is further enacted, that it should be lawful for Her Majesty, if she should think fit, with the advice of Her Privy Council, after taking into consideration any such petitions, and also any petition which might be presented to Her by any coroner of the same county, concerning such proposed division or alteration, or when-

ever it should seem fit to Her Majesty to direct the issue of a writ de coronatore eligendo, for the purpose of authorizing the election of an additional coroner above the number of those who had been theretofore customarily elected to such county, to order that such county should be divided into such and so many districts, for the purposes of that Act, as to Her Majesty, with the advice aforesaid, should seem expedient, and to give a name to each of such districts, and to determine at what place within each district the court for the election of coroner for such district should be holden, as thereafter provided, and every such Order should be published in the London Gazette; and whereas the justices of the peace for the county of Cardigan, assembled in general quarter session on the fourteenth of October one thousand eight hundred and forty-five, did resolve that an humble petition should be presented to Her Majesty, praying that such division or alteration as thereafter mentioned should be made, and did adjourn the further consideration thereof until the general quarter sessions of the peace held on the sixth day of January one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, due notice thereof having been given to the coroner for the said county, as directed by the Act; and whereas the said justices have since presented their petition to Her Majesty, certified under the hands and seals of three of the justices present when the said petition was agreed to, and humbly representing that two coroners only have heretofore been customarily elected in and for the said county; that the said county has been heretofore divided into two divisions, called the Upper Division and the Lower Division; that one of such coroners has usually resided at the town of Aberystwyth, in the upper division of the said county, and that the whole of the inquests in such upper division are held by him; that the other coroner for the said county has usually resided at the town of Lampeterpontstephen, in the lower division of the said county, and the whole of the inquests in the said lower division have been held by him; that, owing to the increase in the population of the said county, the number of inquests holden therein have necessarily been augmented, by reason whereof the office of coroner for the said county hath become of greater importance, and the duties of such officers are more onerous and responsible; that much difficulty and inconvenience result, as well from the residence of the two coroners

at nearly the remotest parts of their respective districts, as also from the great extent of such districts, whereby the holding of inquests is not only frequently delayed beyond a reasonable and proper time, in consequence of the difficulty of obtaining the immediate attendance of a coroner, but a great additional expence is necessarily entailed upon the said county by reason of the heavy travelling and other expences of the said coroners; that the county town of Cardigan is situate in the lower division of the county, and at almost the extreme end of it, being distant from Lampeterpontstephen, the place of residence of the coroner holding the inquests in the lower division of the county, nearly thirty miles; that this circumstance, to a town of the size of Cardigan, containing as it does a population of two thousand nine hundred and twenty-five persons, is frequently a source not only of difficulty and delay in the holding of inquests, but of detriment to the inhabitants thereof; that previous to the passing of the Act 5 and 6 William Fourth, c. 76, a coroner was appointed for the town of Cardigan, but that by the said Act the office of borough coroner was abolished; that at the last general quarter sessions of the peace held in and for the said county, on the fourteenth day of October one thousand eight hundred and forty-five, it was resolved, that a petition be presented to Her Majesty, praying that the said county might be divided into three districts, for the purposes of an Act, passed in the seventh and eighth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the law respecting the office of county coroner," and the consideration of such petition having been adjourned until the general quarter sessions held on the sixth day of January one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, and having been then taken into consideration by the petitioners, after notice thereof given to the coroner for the county, as directed by the said Act, and with a view of removing the inconvenience and expence before stated to be entailed upon the said county, by reason of there being only two coroners appointed for the same, and also for applying a remedy for the evils aforesaid, the petitioners most humbly prayed, that Her Majesty might be most graciously pleased to take their petition into consideration, and, with the advice of Her Privy Council, to direct that the said county might be divided into three districts for the purposes of the said recited Act, and that such

districts might be called, "the Cardigan District," the Lampeter District," and "the Aberystwyth District;" that the Cardigan District might comprise the several parishes and townships of Aberporth, Brongwyn, Blaenporth, Bettws Evan, Saint Mary's Cardigan, Llangoedmore, Llechryd, Llandugwydd, Mount, Pembryn, Tremain, Verwick, Bangor Henllan, Llangynllo, Llandyssil Iscerdyn, Llanfairorllwyn, Llandyfriog, Llanfair-treflygen, Twedryaur, Llandyssiliogogo, Llanllwchaiarn, and Llangranog; that the Lampeter District might comprise the several parishes and townships of Cilie Ayron, Cilcennin, Henfenyw, Llanbadarntrefeglwys, Llanddewyaberarth, Trefilan, Bettws Leicy, Bettws Bledrws, Cellan, Dihewid, Llanwenog, Llanfairclydoga, Llegenydd, Llanerchayron, Llanfihangelystad, Lampeterpontstephen, Llangiby, Llanwnen, Silian, Cydplwyf, Llanarth, Llandyssil uwch Cerdyn, Llanina, Argoed and Ystrad, Blaencaron, Croes and Berwyn, Doithe Camddwr, Doithe Pyscottwr, Gorwydd, Garth and Ystrad, Prysc and Carvan, Treflyn, Caronuwchclawdd, Blaenpennal, Blaenayron, Gwynfil, Gogoyan, Gartheli, Nantewnlle, Llanbadarnodyn, Llangeitho, Llanio, Trecefel, and Trefigoed; and that the Aberystwyth District might comprise the several parishes and townships of Broncastellan, Cyfoethybrenin, Clarach, Cynhillmawr, Caulan and Maesmawr, Elerch, Henllys, Llancynfelin, Scyborycoed, Tyrmynach, Aberystwyth, Cwmrheidol, Issayndre, Melindwr, Parcel Canol, Trefeirig, Uchayndre, Vainor issa, Vainor ucha, Gwnnws issa, Gwnnws ucha, Llanbadarn y Croyddyn issa, Llanbadarn y Croyddyn ucha, Llanilar issa, Llanilar ucha, Llanfihangel y Croyddyn issa, Llanfihangel y Croyddyn ucha, Lledrod issa, Lledrod ucha, Llanafan, Rhostie, Ysptyty Ystwyth, Ysptyty Ystradmeirig, Llansaintffread, Llanddeinol, Llanychaiarn, Llanrhystid Mevenidd, Llanrhystid Haminiog, and Llangrwyddon; and the court for the election of coroner for the Cardigan district might be held in the town of Cardigan; the court for the election of coroner for the Lampeter district in the town of Lampeterpontstephen; and the court for the election of coroner for the Aberystwyth district in the town of Aberystwyth:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken the said petition into consideration, doth, pursuant to the said Act, by and with the advice of Her Privy

Council, declare, order, and direct, that such county shall be divided into three districts for the purposes of the said Act, to be called by the several and respective names following, that is to say, the Cardigan District, and to comprise the several parishes and townships following, that is to say, Aberporth, Brongwyn, Blaenporth, Bettws Evan, Saint Mary's Cardigan, Llangoedmore, Llechryd, Llandugwydd, Mount, Pembryn, Tremain, Verwick, Bangor Henllan, Llangynllo, Llandyssil Iscerdyn, Llanfairorllwyn, Llandyfriog, Llanfair-treflygen, Twedryaur, Llandyssiliogogo, Llanllwchaiarn, and Llangranog; the Lampeter District, and to comprise the several parishes and townships following, that is to say, Cilie Ayron, Cilcennin, Henfenyw, Llanbadarntrefeglwys, Llanddewyaberarth, Trefilan, Bettws Leicy, Bettws Bledrws, Cellan Dihewid, Llanwenog, Llanfairclydoga, Llegenydd, Llanerchayron, Llanfihangelystad, Lampeterpontstephen, Llangiby Llanwnen, Silian Cydplwyf, Llanarth, Llandyssil uwch Cerdyn, Llanina, Argoed and Ystrad, Blaencaron, Croes and Berwyn, Doithe Camddwr, Doithe Pyscottwr, Gorwydd, Garth and Ystrad, Prysc and Carvan, Treflyn, Caronuwchclawdd, Blaenpennal, Blaenayron, Gwynfil, Gogoyan, Gartheli, Nantewnlle, Llanbadarnodyn, Llangeitho, Llanio, Trecefel, and Trefigoed; and the Aberystwyth District, and to comprise the several parishes and townships following, that is to say, Broncastellan, Cyfoethybrenin, Clarach, Cynhillmawr, Caulan and Maesmawr, Elerch, Henllys, Llancynfelin, Scyborycoed Tyrmynach, Aberystwyth, Cwmrheidol, Issayndre, Melindwr, Parcel Canol, Trefeirig, Uchayndre, Vainor issa, Vainor ucha, Gwnnws issa, Gwnnws ucha, Llanbadarn y Croyddyn issa, Llanbadarn y Croyddyn ucha, Llanilar issa, Llanilar ucha, Llanfihangel y Croyddyn issa, Llanfihangel y Croyddyn ucha, Lledrod issa, Lledrod ucha, Llanafan, Rhostie, Ysptyty Ystwyth, Ysptyty Ystradmeirig, Llansaintffread, Llanddeinol, Llanychaiarn, Llanrhystid Mevenidd, Llanrhystid Haminiog, and Llangrwyddon: and it is hereby further declared, ordered, directed, and determined, that the courts to be holden for the purposes of the election of any coroner of any one or more of the said districts, when and as often as the same shall become necessary, under the provisions of the said recited Act, shall be as follows that is to say, for the Cardigan District, to be at Cardigan, and the poll to be taken there; for the Lampeter District, at the town of Lampeterpont-

stephen, and the poll to be taken there; and for the Aberystwyth District, at the town of Aberystwyth, and the poll to be taken there: and it is hereby further declared, ordered, and directed, that this Order shall be published in the London Gazette.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the spiritual care of populous parishes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twelfth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, in the words following, that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the spiritual care of populous parishes," have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme, for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the parish of Bradford, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon:

"Whereas it is by the said Act enacted, that if at any time it shall be made to appear to us, that it would promote the interests of religion, that any part or parts of any parish or parishes, chapelry or chapelries, district or districts, of great extent, and containing a large population, and wherein, or in parts whereof, the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof, or any extra-parochial place or places, or any part or parts thereof, should be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, it shall be lawful, by the authority in the same Act provided (that is to say, by a scheme prepared by us, and an Order

issued by your Majesty in Council, ratifying such scheme), with the consent of the bishop of the diocese, under his hand and seal, to set out by metes and bounds, and constitute a separate district accordingly, such district not then containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship, and to fix and declare the name of such district; and it is by the same Act provided, that the draft of any scheme for constituting any such district shall be delivered or transmitted to the incumbent and to the patron or patrons of the church or chapel of any parish, chapelry, or district, out of which it is recommended that any such district, or any part thereof, should be taken, in order that such incumbent, patron or patrons, may have an opportunity of offering or making to us, or to such bishop, any observations or objections upon or to the constituting of such district; and that such scheme shall not be laid before your Majesty in Council until after the expiration of one calendar month next after such copy shall have been so delivered or transmitted, unless such incumbent and patron or patrons shall, in the meantime, consent to the same; and it is by the same Act also provided, that in every such scheme for constituting any such district we shall recommend to your Majesty in Council that the minister of such district, when duly licensed according to the same Act, shall be permanently endowed, under the provisions of the same Act, to an amount of not less than the annual value of one hundred pounds; and also, if such endowment be of less than the annual value of one hundred and fifty pounds, that the same shall be increased to such last-mentioned amount at the least, so soon as such district shall have become a new parish as thereafter provided:

"And whereas the said parish of Bradford is of great extent, and contains a large population, and the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence therein is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof; and it has been made to appear to us, that it would promote the interests of religion, that the particular part of the said parish hereinafter mentioned and described, such part not at present containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship, should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter set forth:

" Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles Thomas Bishop of Ripon, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme, that all that part of the said parish of Bradford, described in the schedule hereunto annexed,—all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth in the map or plan hereunto also annexed,—shall be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes accordingly; and that the same shall be named, " The District of Manningham."

" And we further recommend and propose, that there shall be paid by us, in each and every year, to the minister for the time being of the district so recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed according to the said Act, the sum of one hundred pounds; and upon any building within such district, being duly licensed by the bishop of the diocese for the performance of divine service, according to the same Act, there shall be paid by us, in like manner, to such minister, the further sum of thirty pounds, making in the whole the sum of one hundred and thirty pounds; and that so soon as any church or chapel within such district shall have been duly approved by us, and consecrated as the church or chapel of such district, for the use and service of the minister and inhabitants thereof, and such district shall have thereupon become, according to the provisions of the same Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, there shall be paid by us, in each and every year, to the perpetual curate for the time being of such new parish, the sum of one hundred and fifty pounds; and that the said sum of one hundred pounds, one hundred and thirty pounds, or one hundred and fifty pounds, as the case may be, shall be paid, by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year; and that the first such payment, or a proportionate part thereof, shall be made on the first day of May or of November next after the day of the date of the licence of such minister or of such building, or of the consecration of such church or chapel as aforesaid, as the case may be; and that in case a vacancy in the ministry or perpetual curacy of such district or new parish shall happen on any other day than the first day of May or the first day of November, the amount

payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the minister or the perpetual curate making the vacancy, or his personal representative or representatives, and the minister or the perpetual curate succeeding to such district or new parish.

" And whereas it is by the said Act further enacted, that it shall be lawful, by the authority aforesaid, at any time to assign the right of patronage of any such district or new parish as aforesaid, and the nomination of the minister or perpetual curate thereof respectively, either in perpetuity, or for one or more nomination or nominations, to any ecclesiastical corporation aggregate or sole, or to either of the Universities of Oxford, Cambridge, or Durham, or to any college therein respectively, or to any person or persons, or the nominee or nominees of such person or persons or body respectively, upon condition of such corporation, university, college, person or persons contributing to the permanent endowment of such minister or perpetual curate, or towards providing a church or chapel for the use of the inhabitants of such district or new parish, in such proportion, and in such manner, as shall be approved by the like authority :

" And whereas a sum of three thousand pounds has been contributed and deposited with us by John Hollings, of Manningham, Esquire, upon trust, towards providing a church or chapel within the district herein recommended to be constituted, for the use and service of the minister and inhabitants thereof, and a permanent fund to be applied, in such manner as shall appear to us to be expedient, for the repairs and maintenance of the fabric of such church or chapel; and it has been proposed to us, and it appears to us to be expedient, that, in consideration of the aforesaid contribution, the two first nominations of a minister or perpetual curate to the said district or new parish as aforesaid, should be assigned to the said John Hollings.

" We, therefore, further recommend and propose, that the right of patronage of the said district of Manningham, and so soon as the same shall have become a new parish as aforesaid, the right of patronage thereof, and the nomination of the minister or perpetual curate of such district or new parish, as the case may be, shall, for the two first such nominations only, be assigned to and vested in the said John Hollings, his heirs and assigns:

" And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament.

" SCHEDULE.

" The district of MANNINGHAM being—

" All that part of the township of Manningham, in the parish of Bradford, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon, comprised within and bounded by an imaginary line, commencing at a point (marked *a* on the map or plan herewith annexed) in the middle of Lumb-lane, opposite to the middle of a certain road or lane at the back of a row of houses called Green-lane, and thence extending westward along the middle of such road or lane as far as the western end of the same, and thence towards the south west in a straight direction to a point (marked *b* as aforesaid) in the middle of Toller-lane opposite to the eastern end of Wheatley-footpath, and thence first towards the south west along the middle of such footpath to Wheatley-lane, and thence towards the north west in a straight direction to the extreme north eastern corner of a certain house (marked *c* as aforesaid) called Gurlingtons, the property of Mary Brougham and Reverend Thomas Austen, trustees of James Brougham, deceased, and Ann Idle, and thence in a straight direction northward to a point (marked *d* as aforesaid) in the middle of Duckworth-lane, and at a distance of one hundred and ten yards, or thereabouts, from the point where such lane joins Toller-lane aforesaid, and thence towards the north east along the middle of Duckworth-lane aforesaid to the middle of Toller-lane, and thence also towards the north east in a straight direction to a point (marked *e* as aforesaid) in the middle of the Heaton-road opposite to the middle of Jumble's-lane, and thence in the same direction along the middle of such last-mentioned lane to a point (marked *f* as aforesaid) opposite to the middle of Hesp-lane, and thence towards the south east along the middle of such last-mentioned lane as far as the middle of the Bradford and Keighley turnpike road, and thence southward along the middle of such turnpike road to the northern boundary of the district of Saint Jude in the said parish, and thence westward along such

boundary to the middle of Lumb-lane aforesaid and thence southward along the middle of such last-mentioned lane to the point where the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the draft of the said scheme has been transmitted to the incumbent and to the patrons of the church of the parish out of which it is intended that the district therein recommended to be constituted shall be taken, pursuant to the provisions of the said Act; and one calendar month has expired since such draft was so transmitted, and no objections have been made thereto :

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct, that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Ripon.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled " An Act to make better provision for the spiritual care of populous parishes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twelfth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, in the words following, that is to say :

" We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, intituled " An Act to make better provision for the spiritual care of

"populous parishes," have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme, for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the parish of Doncaster, in the county and diocese of York.

"Whereas it is by the said Act enacted, that if at any time it shall be made to appear to us, that it would promote the interests of religion, that any part or parts of any parish or parishes, chapelry or chapelries, district or districts, of great extent, and containing a large population, and wherein, or in parts whereof, the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof, or any extra-parochial place or places, or any part or parts thereof, should be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, it shall be lawful, by the authority in the same Act provided (that is to say, by a scheme prepared by us, and an Order issued by your Majesty in Council, ratifying such scheme), with the consent of the bishop of the diocese, under his hand and seal, to set out by metes and bounds, and constitute a separate district accordingly, such district not then containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship, and to fix and declare the name of such district; and it is by the same Act provided, that the draft of any scheme for constituting any such district shall be delivered or transmitted to the incumbent and to the patron or patrons of the church or chapel of any parish, chapelry, or district, out of which it is recommended that any such district, or any part thereof, should be taken, in order that such incumbent, patron or patrons, may have an opportunity of offering or making to us, or to such bishop, any observations or objections upon or to the constituting of such district; and that such scheme shall not be laid before your Majesty in Council until after the expiration of one calendar month next after such copy shall have been so delivered or transmitted, unless such incumbent and patron or patrons shall, in the meantime, consent to the same; and it is by the same Act also provided, that in every such scheme for constituting any such district we shall recommend to your Majesty in Council that the minister of such district, when duly licenced according to the same Act, shall be permanently endowed; under the provisions of the same Act, to an amount of not less than the annual

value of one hundred pounds; and also, if such endowment be of less than the annual value of one hundred and fifty pounds, that the same shall be increased to such last-mentioned amount at the least, so soon as such district shall have become a new parish as thereafter provided:

"And whereas the said parish of Doncaster is of great extent, and contains a large population, and the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence therein is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof; and it has been made to appear to us, that it would promote the interests of religion, that the particular part of such parish hereinafter mentioned, such part not at present containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship, should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter set forth:

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Edward Archbishop of York, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme, that all that part of the said parish of Doncaster, described in the schedule hereunto annexed,—all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed,—shall be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes accordingly; and that the same shall be named, "the District of Balby with Hexthorpe."

"And we further recommend and propose, that there shall be paid by us, in each and every year, by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November, to the minister for the time being of the district so recommended to be constituted, and so soon as such district shall have become, according to the provisions of the said Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, to the perpetual curate thereof, the sum of one hundred and fifty pounds; and that the first such payment, or a proportionate part thereof, shall be made on the first day of May or of November next after the day of the date of the licence of such minister or of such perpetual curate as aforesaid, as the case may be; and that in case a vacancy in the ministry or perpetual curacy of such district or new parish shall happen on any other day than the first day of May or the first day of No-

venner, the amount payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the minister or the perpetual curate making the vacancy, or his personal representative or representatives, and the minister or the perpetual curate succeeding to such district or new parish.

"And whereas it is by the said Act further enacted, that it shall be lawful, by the authority aforesaid, at any time to assign the right of patronage of any such district or new parish as aforesaid, and the nomination of the minister or perpetual curate thereof respectively, either in perpetuity, or for one or more nomination or nominations, to any ecclesiastical corporation, aggregate or sole, or to either of the Universities of Oxford, Cambridge, or Durham, or to any college therein respectively, or to any person or persons, or the nominee or nominees of such person or persons or body respectively, upon condition of such corporation, university, college, person or persons contributing to the permanent endowment of such minister or perpetual curate, or towards providing a church or chapel for the use of the inhabitants of such district or new parish, in such proportion and in such manner as shall be approved by the like authority :

"And whereas an annual sum of one hundred and fifty pounds has been permanently secured to us by Elizabeth Goodman Banks, of Saint Catherine's, near Doncaster aforesaid, spinster, by means of a perpetual rent-charge, to be issuing out of certain land, tenements, and hereditaments in the parish or township of Loversall, in the said county of York, towards such permanent endowment as aforesaid of the minister of the district so therein recommended to be constituted, and, so soon as such district shall have become a new parish as aforesaid, of the perpetual curate thereof; and it has been proposed to us that, in consideration of the said rent-charge being so secured as aforesaid, the right of patronage of the said district or new parish should be assigned in the manner hereinafter mentioned :

"We, therefore, further recommend and propose, that the right of patronage of, and the nomination of the minister or perpetual curate to, the said district or new parish of Balby with Hexthorpe, shall be absolutely assigned to, and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Elizabeth Goodman Banks, her heirs and assigns, for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament.

" SCHEDULE.

"The district of BALBY WITH HEXTHORPE, being—

"All that part of the parish of Doncaster, in the county and diocese of York, comprised within the township of Balby with Hexthorpe, otherwise called Hexthorpe with Balby, and such portion of the township of Doncaster, in the same parish, as is situate on the western side of an imaginary line commencing at a point (marked *a* on the map or plan hereunto annexed) on the western boundary of such last-mentioned township, and in the middle of the Sheffield and Doncaster turnpike road, and thence extending towards the north-east, along the middle of such turnpike road to a point (marked *b* as aforesaid) opposite to the middle of a certain lane and road leading to the river Dun, at Isabel Wath, and thence northward along the middle of such lane and road as far as the said river."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct, that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of York.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues," have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme, for relieving the present canons of the cathedral church of Exeter from the performance of additional duty, by reason of the suspension of canonries in the said cathedral church.

"Whereas it was by the said Act enacted, that, out of the proceeds of the suspended canonries in any chapter, provision might, from time to time, be made, by the authority therein provided, for relieving the then existing canons of such chapter from the performance of any additional duty by reason of such suspension, by the employment of substitutes to be approved by the respective bishops :

"And whereas application was made to us, in the month of December in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-four, by the Dean and Chapter of the cathedral church of Exeter, to make provision for a substitute or substitutes, to be employed and approved according to the said Act, to perform the duties which, by reason of the present

suspension of one canonry, and the future suspension of two other canonries in the said church, would otherwise be imposed upon the remaining canons:

"We, therefore, humbly recommend and propose, that, until the said Chapter shall consist exclusively of canons, appointed after the passing of the said recited Act, the said Dean and Chapter be empowered, from time to time, to appoint a substitute or substitutes, to be approved by the Bishop of Exeter for the time being, to perform the duties of a canon in residence, for such calendar month or months in each year, as shall remain unprovided for after the periods of statutable and customary residence by all the existing canons shall have been fixed.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the third and fourth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation of the duties of postage," power is given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, from time to time, by warrant, under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British postage or inland postage payable by law on the transmission by the post of foreign or colonial letters or newspapers, or of any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in such warrant; and, from time to time, by warrant as aforesaid, to alter or repeal any such altered rates, and make and establish any new or

other rates in lieu thereof; and, from time to time, by warrant as aforesaid, to appoint at what time the rates which may be payable are to be paid; and it is provided, that the power thereby given should extend to any increase or reduction or remission of postage:

And whereas, in consequence of a communication opened with the Post-office of Denmark, it is considered expedient to alter the rates of postage payable on letters conveyed by packet boat or private ship between that country and the United Kingdom direct, or via Heligoland, or any port or place in the river Elbe:

Now we, the undersigned, being three of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, do, in exercise of the power or authority in us for such purpose vested in and by the said recited Act, and of all other powers and authorities enabling us in this behalf, direct, that on every letter, not exceeding half an ounce in weight, posted in or addressed to any part of the kingdom of Denmark, and transmitted between any part of the United Kingdom and any place in Denmark, (conveyed between the United Kingdom and Denmark by packet boat or private ship direct, or via Heligoland, or any port or place in the river Elbe,) there shall be charged and taken, in lieu of any rates of British postage now payable by law on such letters, an uniform rate of British postage of six pence.

And we direct, that it shall be optional for the sender of any such letter as hereinbefore is mentioned, posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to Denmark (registered letters excepted), to allow the whole of the postage thereof, British and foreign, to be charged to the receiver of the letter in Denmark, or to prepay all such postage at the time of posting the letter, but such sender shall not have the option of paying the British postage thereof only, and leaving the foreign postage to be paid in Denmark.

And we direct, that on every letter, not exceeding half an ounce in weight, posted in or addressed to any part of Denmark, transmitted by the post between Denmark and any of Her Majesty's colonies, or any foreign country through the United Kingdom, (conveyed by packet boat or private ship between the United Kingdom and Denmark direct, or via Heligoland, or any port or place in the river Elbe,) there shall be charged and taken, in lieu of any rates of British postage now payable by law on such letters, an uniform rate of British postage of six pence, for the conveyance of every such letter between Denmark and any part of the United Kingdom; and also such a further or additional rate of British postage, for the conveyance of every such letter between the port in the United Kingdom of the departure or arrival of the packet or ship conveying the same and the colony or foreign country to or from which the same shall be forwarded, as shall from time to time be charged and payable for British postage on letters, not exceeding half an ounce in weight, posted or delivered at the port in the United Kingdom of the departure or

arrival of the packet or ship conveying the same, and transmitted direct between such port and such colony or foreign country.

And we direct, that it shall be optional for the sender of any such letter, as lastly hereinbefore mentioned, posted in any of Her Majesty's colonies where posts have been or shall be established by Her Majesty's Postmaster-General, addressed to Denmark (registered letters excepted), to allow the whole of the postage thereof, colonial, British, and foreign, to be charged to the receiver of the letter in Denmark, or to prepay all such postage at the time of posting the letter, but such sender shall not have the option of paying the colonial and British postage thereof only, and leaving the foreign postage to be paid in Denmark.

And we further direct, that on every letter transmitted as is mentioned in this warrant, exceeding half an ounce in weight, there shall be charged and taken progressive and additional rates of postage, according to the scale of weight and number of rates in the said Act contained as to letters, estimating and charging each additional rate at the sum which any such letter would be charged with under this warrant, if not exceeding half an ounce in weight.

And we further direct, that such printed newspapers, as are hereinafter mentioned, may be sent by the post free of postage, or liable to postage according to the regulations and rates hereinafter set forth, that is to say,

British newspapers sent from the United Kingdom to Denmark (the conveyance between the United Kingdom and Denmark being direct or via Heligoland, or any port or place in the river Elbe), by packet boat free, and by private ship one penny each.

Newspapers published in Denmark, in the Danish language, sent from thence to any part of the United Kingdom (the conveyance between Denmark and the United Kingdom being direct or via Heligoland, or any port or place in the river Elbe), by packet boat free, and by private ship one penny each.

And we further direct, that the Postmaster-General may cause the postage on any such printed newspapers to be paid on the same being put into the post-office.

And we further direct, that every printed supplement, or additional sheet to any newspaper, shall, for the purpose of charging the postage under this warrant, be deemed a distinct newspaper, unless sent in the same cover or together with the newspaper to which it is a supplement or addition.

And we further direct, that no printed newspaper shall be conveyed by the post, under the regulations of this present warrant, unless the same shall be sent without a cover, or in a cover open at the sides, or in open bands, and unless there be no word or communication printed on the paper after its publication, or upon the cover or band thereof, and no writing or mark upon it, or upon the cover or band of it, except the name and address of the person to whom sent, nor any

paper or thing enclosed in or with the same; and every such newspaper shall be forwarded under and subject to such other conditions, regulations, and restrictions as by the said recited Act are directed in respect of newspapers sent by the post.

And we further direct, that nothing herein contained shall be deemed or construed to extend to any letters or newspapers passing by the post between the United Kingdom and the kingdom of Denmark, via France, Belgium, or Holland.

And we further direct, that nothing herein contained shall be deemed or construed to annul, prejudice, or affect any of the exemptions and privileges granted by the said recited Act, or by an Act made and passed in the first year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the management of the Post-office," and that all such exemptions and privileges shall remain in full force.

And we further direct, that the terms and expressions used in this warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning, in all respects, as they would have had if inserted in the said Act of the third and fourth years of the reign of Her present Majesty.

And we further direct, that this warrant shall come into operation on the 1st day of October 1846.

Provided lastly, and we hereby declare and direct, that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury, or any three of them, by warrant under their hands, at any time hereafter to alter or repeal any of the rates hereby altered, or the regulations hereby made, and to make and establish any new or other rates or regulations in lieu thereof, and from time to time to appoint at what time the rates that may be payable are to be paid.
