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Genoa, August 21.

THe, 18th Instant the Doge having finished the time of his Government, went, according to custom, on foot from the Palace to his own House, accompanied by all the Nobility and other Persons of Quality. Since there have been several meetings of the Nobility about the Election of a new Doge; and in all appearance Signior *Pietro Durazzo* will be chosen. Three days ago arrived here four French Gallies from *Tripoli*, by whom we have an account that the Fleet commanded by the Marshal *Estre* was gone from thence for Tunis. This week sailed from hence the *Samuel* and *Thomas*, the *Mauritania*, the *Elizabeth*, and the *Suedes* for Leghorn. The *Floet* is now in this Port, bound for Palermo.

Milan, August 15. Our Government has Reformed the Regiment of Swiss in the Service of this State, having given them 14000 Crowns for a month and an halfs Pay, according to the Capitulation that was made with them when they were raised. The Neapolitan Regiment commanded by the Marquis *Gracola* is likewise Reformed, and the Soldiers Incorporated in that whereof *Marco Antonio Colonna* is Colonel. We are told from *Turin*, that the Duke of *Savoy* has named the Count *de Magliano* to go and make his Compliments to the Emperor upon the Marriage of the Elector of *Bavaria* with the Arch Duchess.

Venice, Aug. 25. The Master of a Vessel, which arrived here two days ago, reports, that touching at *Corfu* he heard there, that the Forces of this State had made themselves Masters of the Town of *Coron*, but that the Castle, which was very strong, held out still, notwithstanding the Count *de St. Paul* had with 6000 men defeated 8000 Turks which came to relieve them; 1500 of the Enemy being killed upon the place, and several pieces of Cannon and all their Baggage taken. The same Account we have by the way of *Otranto*. This week likewise arrived here a Vessel from *Spalatro*, bringing Letters for several Merchants of this City, which speak of Signior *Molina's* having obtained a great Victory over the Turkish Fleet; and add, that the Captain *Bassa* was dangerously wounded in the Fight; but notwithstanding the several Confirmations we have of these happy Successes of the Arms of the Republick, the Senate have not yet received any account of them from their Generals. Several new Gallies are fitting out here, which will be sent with the next Convoy to the Fleet. The Senate it is said are treating with the Elector of *Saxony* for more of his Troops. On Sunday last Signior *Villar Correr* had conferred upon him the Dignity of Procurator of *St. Mark*, he paying 25000 Ducats for the same.

Constantinople, August. The last Letters from *Leopol* gave a sad account that there were then about as many of the Forces of this Crown at the Redoubtus near *Glinian*, and that the rest of the Troops were marching thither with great diligence. When the Crown General commanded the Army; which would, we say be joyed by the Forces of *Einbuzia*: though there is a report that these pretend to separate under their own General, in case the King does not come himself into the Field. They write from *Polludia*, that the Signior *Lezniki* has defeated a great Party of Tartars who had made an Inquisition into that Country, that about 300 of them were killed upon the place, and a great many Christians, whom they had made Slaves, were redeemed. When the *Bassa* of *Moldavia* has written to the Governors of the most considerable places belonging to this Crown in *Poland*, to propose a restraint of all disturbances on both sides, which ruins the Country; which may advantage to the Prince their Masters. It is also written from *Adolph*, that the Cais are invited to enter into the League sworn to the Emperor, the Crown, and the Venetians. And that they have agreed to lay to the Consacks which are subject to them, together with those in the Service of this Crown against the Turks.

Prasburg, Aug. 19. We have Letters from the Imperial Camp before *Esperes* of the most pleasant which tell us, that the Besieged make a very obstinate defence; but that the Besiegers were notwithstanding advancing to the Ditch, which they had begun to fill with Fagots and Sackels of Wood; that their Bombs had done great execution in the Town; that their Cannon had made two large Breaches; and that they would in a day or two make an Assault upon the place. That Count *Terkely* was daily abandoned by those of his Party. That his whole strength consisted but in 1500 men; and that he had not with all his solicitations been able to obtain any assistance from the Turks.

Vienna, Aug. 26. We have an account that the Seraskier having rallied his Forces, and caused two *Bassas* and four *Agas*, with several other Officers who had not well behaved themselves in the Battle of *Graz*, to be Strangled; he marched to *Buda*, and passed the *Danube*, there declaring he would relieve *Newbensch* whatever it cost, but not long after he received the News that the place was taken by Assault; however having formed a new Train of Artillery of 20 Pieces which he took out of *Buda*, and being reinforced with several fresh Troops, he marched towards *Vaccia*; and according to our last Advice was encamped between that place and *Fest*. The Duke of *Lorrain* being informed of the Enemies motions, repassed the *Danube* with the Imperial Army the 24th Instant near *Comera* and advanced towards them, upon which the Elector of *Bavaria* has changed the thoughts he had of returning thither.

this week, being resolved not to leave the Army as long as there is a prospect of any considerable Action. The Emperor has made the Count de Serckfenberg Governor of *Newbrusel*; a good Garrison is put into the place; and the Country People of the Neighbourhood are summoned in to help to repair the Fortifications ruined in the Siege; The Bissa, who commanded there, is dead of his wounds; We are assured, that near 6000 persons were killed at the taking of that place; some Turkish Women and their Children who were made Prisoners, have been brought hither. We have an account from *Croatia*, that General *Leslie* was come back to *Pirovitzza*, where he would rest his Troops, after which, and that the 3000 Croats he expected had joined him he would undertake some fresh action, and that it was said he designed to attack *Poffega* the Capital City of *Sclavonia*. They write from Upper *Hungary*, that the Town of *Esperies* makes a very desperate Defence, and that they have endured three Assaults, with considerable loss of Men on both sides. It is said the Duke of *Lorraine* will send four or 5000 Men to reinforce General *Schultz*; though it is not doubted but he will have taken the place before they can join him. The news we had of the Turks having abandoned *Novigrad*, is not confirmed; They were indeed in so great a Consternation upon the blowing up of their Magazine, followed with the news of the defeat of their Army near *Gran*, that they were about leaving the Town, but that the *Viceroy* of *Buda* sent them positive orders to remain there, with a promise to supply them with whatever they wanted. The Princes de *Conti* and de la *Rochesur-Yon*, have taken their leave, in order to their return home. The Letters from *Cracow* tell us, that the Polish Army is in the Field, and that its said they will attack *Barrand Meidzibos*, to block up *Caminiec*.

Hamburg, Aug. 31. The Letters from *Leopol* of the 9th Instant tell us, that the Polish Army was marched from *Gumari* towards the *Nister*; That it was said their design was to attack *Miedzibos*; and that the Crown General had been informed by some Prisoners he took, that a great Body of Tartars commanded by their Cham, was marching to join with 12000 Turks, in order to make head against the Poles. From *Warsaw* they write of the 17th, that the Court was still at *Villa Nova*, the King having put off for some days the journey he intended to take towards *Leopol*; but that his eldest Son Prince *James* was going to the Army. That the Polish Envoy at *Moscow* hath given the King an account, that the Czars had consented that Commissioners be appointed on both sides to meet at some convenient place on the Frontiers, amicably to adjust the Differences depending about the Limits. We are told from *Berlin*, that the Heer *Groot* was arrived there; being sent by the Duke of *Hanover*, to make some Proposals to his Electoral Highness, in order to the accommodating the Differences between the Duke of *Zell* and this City.

Cologne, Sept. 4. Yesterday arrived here the Commissioners appointed by the Elector of *Trier* and the Duke of *Fuliers*, in pursuance of the Authority given them by the Emperor for the examining and settling the Affairs of this City, which have been of late in so much disorder; They were received at their coming into the Town by many of the principal Inhabitants, and were afterwards Complimented in the name of the whole Magistracy. This day they have begun to inquire into the late Disturbances, and for that purpose summoned several Persons to come before them, who appeared accordingly. The

Bishop of *Strasbourg* is still here. They write from *Strasbourg*, that the Princes de *Conti* and de la *Rochesur-Yon* arrived there the 30th past from *Hungary* in their return to *France*.

Amsterdam, Aug. 30. The 28th Instant arrived here a Galiot, which parted on Thursday last off of *Holland* with three East India Ships, viz. the *Exchange of Amsterdam*, the *Sambi*, and the *S. Martin*, which came on the 8th of February last from *Batavia*, and the 18th of May from the Cape of Good Hope; The first of these is for the account of the Chamber of *Rotterdam*, the second for that of this City, and the third for the Chamber of *Zeeland*.

Hague, September 7. The Troops that are to be at the review on the *Veluwe*, which will be on the 11th or 12th Instant, are marching thither. The States of *Holland* and *West Friesland* will reassemble the 13th; And then its believed they will come to a resolution about the State of the War which has been so long before them. The *Seur Guldensteepe* is very suddenly expected here in Quality of Envoy Extraordinary from the Crown of *Sweden*, we have an account of his departure from *Stockholm*; Its believed that upon his arrival the Alliance concluded between the King of *Sweden* and this State about three years since, which is now going to expire, will be renewed. The States General have named the Heer *Goes* to go and reside on their part at the Court of *Denmark*. The Heer *Van Delf* Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of *Brandenburg* parted from hence yesterday for *Cleves*. The Letters from *Vienna* of the 26th past tell us, that the *Serassquier* Bassa had caused seize, all of the principal Officers of his Army to be strangled for not doing their duty in the late Fight near *Gran*; That he had passed the *Danube* at *Buda*, and being reinforced with several fresh Troops, marched towards *Vuccia*, and that the Duke of *Lorraine* having advice of it, repass'd the *Danube* with the Imperial Army the 24th near *Comorra*, and advanced towards the Enemy.

Paris September 7. The Court parted the third Instant from *Versailles* for *Chambor*. The same day the Princes de *Conti* and de la *Rochesur-Yon* returned hither from *Hungary*, and the next morning they followed the Court to pay their Duty to the King.
