WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-sixth day of October one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, in the words following, viz

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent to

your Majesty, that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Paddington, in the county of Middlesex, and within the diocese of London, it appears to them to be expedient, that a particular district should be assigned, under and by virtue of the power for such purpose contained in the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," to the consecrated church, called Trinity Church, situate in Bishop's-road, in the said parish of Paddington, and that such district should be called, "The Chapelry District of the Holy Trinity, Paddington," and be bounded as hereinafter mentioned:

"The chapelry district of the Holy Trinity, Paddington, commences at the south end of the
