REGULATIONS TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S DRAWING-ROOM.

The Ladies, who purpose attending Her Majesty's Drawing-Room, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *legibly* written thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance in the Presence-chamber, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to Her Majesty.

And those Ladies, who are to be presented, are hereby informed, it is absolutely necessary that their names, together with the names of the Ladies who are to present them, should be sent in to the Lord Chamberlain's-Office, *before twelve o'clock* on Monday, 22d March, in order that they may be submitted for the Queen's approbation; it being Her Majesty's command, that no presentation shall take place unless the name of the Lady presenting, together with that of the Lady to be presented, shall appear on the card to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, which names shall correspond with those previously sent in to the Lord Chamberlain's-Office.

It is particularly requested, that in every case *written cards only* be delivered.

The Queen has been pleased to appoint Henry-Edward Fox Young, Esq. to be Lieutenant Governor of the Eastern Districts of the Colony of the Cape of Good Hope.

Her Majesty has also been pleased to appoint Hugh Edwards, Esq. to be Puisne Judge, and Joseph L. Bindon, Esq. to be Coroner, for the island of Antigua.

Her Majesty has further been pleased to appoint William Walter Raleigh Kerr, Esq. to be Auditor General of Accounts for the island of Mauritius.

Whitehall, February 1, 1847.

The Queen has been graciously pleased to grant unto Charles-Cornwallis Michell, Esq. Lieutenant Colonel in the Army, Captain in the Portuguese Army, and Knight of the Royal Hanoverian Guelphic Order, Her royal licence and permission, that he may accept and wear the insignia of a Knight of the Royal Portuguese Military Order of St. Bento d'Avis, which the Queen of Portugal hath been pleased to confer upon him, in consideration of his long and faithful services under the Crown of Portugal; and that he may enjoy all the rights and privileges thereunto annexed; provided, nevertheless, that Her Majesty's said licence and permission doth not authorize the assumption of any style, appellation, rank, precedence, or privilege appertaining unto a Knight Bachelor of these realms:

And also to command, that Her Majesty's said concession and especial mark of Her royal favour be registered, together with the relative documents, in Her Majesty's College of Arms.
