Islington, otherwise Isleden, and formerly in the several tenures or occupations of William Bass, Thomas Yapp, Thomas Atkins, Samuel Durant, Silvester Lowden, James Cullow, John Hammond, Robert Collingridge, George Masters, Nelson Stratton, John T. Williams, David Adams, Samuel Nicholson, Thomas Drim, Charles Foxley, John Hammond, Samuel White, Abraham Longhurst and Wright, with the appurtenances.'"

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct, that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of London.
