

case We desired a Negotiation of Peace, ought to send Letters to which you might give Credit, for this cause these Presents have been Written and sent to You; And as We Your Friends desire hereby, for the service of the Creatures of God that means may be found to restore the Tranquillity of the Subjects on both sides, and a good order and regulation in this Kingdom, and that our Reputation, and that of those who shall have part in this action may be spread over the whole Earth by the Acclamations of the People, seeing We desire not the destruction of the Poor, nor the Ruin of Countries. What We now say, as well as what We shall do in pursuance of Our word, has been approved of (for God would have it so) by the Majesty of Our Resplendant, Puissant and Formidable Emperour and King of the Superficies of the Earib. Wherefore we have sent to you the said Acem: Deschekbi, to whom We have entrusted certain things to impart to you by Word of Mouth. If consequently you will send to Us a Trusty Person on your part to Treat a Peace and the Re-establishment of the Publick Quiet, We hope to enter into Conference, Whereupon salute in the Name of him that follows the true Direction.

 After which the Aga prayed his Highness to contribute all he could on his part towards the putting an end to a War, which had caused the effusion of so much Blood, and the ruine of so many poor People. saying that he thought his Highness after so glorious a Campaign ought the more readily to consent to a Peace. And offering in that Case, in the Grand Signiors name, to abandon Count Teckelej, and even to deliver to the Emper the Hostages he has now at the Port. To which the Duke of Lorraine answered, That a Victorious Army was not to be amused with Overtures of Peace, and that he had no Instructions to hearken to any; but that he would acquaint his Imperial Majesty with the Serasquier's Proposals.

Hamburgh, Sept. 20. The Duke of Hanover arrived the first instant at Zell in his return from Italy; The 7th the Duchess his Wife passed through that place in her Journey to Berlin, where she arrived the 12th to visit her Daughter the Electoral Princess, who is near her time of Lying in. The Sieur Chauve General of the Troops of Brunswick, which are in the Imperial Army in Hungary hath sent an Express to acquaint the Dukes of Zell and Hanover with the Proposals that have been made to him by the Duke of Lorraine about Winter Quarters. The differences between the Duke of Zell and this City cannot yet be accommodated, new difficulties arising daily. These Magistrates are sending two Deputies to Vienna to Compliment the Emperour upon the Marriage of the Elector of Bavaria with the Arch-duchess his Daughter.

Cologne, Sept. 25. One of the Imperial Sub-Commissioners who went the last week to Coblenz to give the Elector of Trier an account of their proceedings here, is come back, and has since had several meetings with his Colleague about the Affairs of this City, in the which they are yet come to no determination. The Deacons, who were put out of their Places about three years ago, make great application to the Commissioners to be restored, but they will hardly obtain it for that the old Magistrates would then pretend to be likewise restored. The Letters from Vienna of the 13th instant tell us that the Imperial Army was encamped near the River Ipol, having sent Detachements towards Esperies, Agria, and Croazia: And that the Serasquier who was encamped near Buda had not with him above 15000 Horse, and that he had sent a second time to the Duke of Lorraine to propose a Treaty of Peace.

Brussels, Sept. 28. Our Governour General returned hither the 25th instant from Flanders. The next day arrived the Spanish Letters, by which his

Excellency had an account that His Catholick Majesty hath conferred the Office of Secretary of State and War in these Countries upon Don Fernando Perez de Olmedo; And a promise that Bills for 150 thousand Crowns should be sent hither by the next Ordinary. Sir Richard Bulstrode Envoy from His Majesty of Great Britain at this Court had this day his Publick Audience of his Excellency, by whom he was receiv'd with particular Marks of respect. The States of the Province of Namur have granted his Excellency a Subsidy of 80000 Florins, which is more then they have given at a time to any of the late Governors. The 26th instant one Teltiet who was a Captain in the late Rebellion in England, and made his escape into these parts, was by the means of Captain Slater and Ensign Bulier seized at Malines with leave of the Governor, and secured in the Common Prison of that place. The Letters from Vienna of the 16th instant inform us that the Imperial Army was encamped between Novigrad and Barkan, and that the Duke of Lorraine was disposing things in order to put the Troops into Winter Quarters.

Hague, October 2. The Treaty lately concluded between this State and the Elector of Brandenburg is Ratified by the States General, and the Ratifications will be exchanged in a day or two by the Sieur Diez in the absence of the Sieur Fuchs. The Count d'Avaux Ambassador from France, having leave from his Most Christian Majesty to return home, to look after his private affairs, parted from hence the 30 past with two or three Servants only, intending to be here again in a month or six weeks. The Letters from Vienna of the 19th instant give an account of the surrender of Esperies.

On the 29th Instant a Post will be sent from the General Letter Office in London, to Edgworth, to Barmham, by way of Hemsted, to Ailsbury by way of Tring, and to Buckingham, on the usual Post nights three times a Week, and return in like manner the usual Post days.
