The Queen has also been pleased to nominate the Reverend James Banks to the district church of Christ Church, in the Forest of Dean, in the county of Gloucester, and diocese of Gloucester and Bristol.

And also to command, that Her Majesty's said concession and especial mark of Her royal favour be registered, together with the relative documents, in Her Majesty's College of Arms.
