The district is bounded by a line drawn at the junction of York-street, Morley-street, and Richmond-street, and proceeds in a northerly direction up the middle of York-street to its junction with Bell Vue-place and Cobourg-street; it then proceeds in a north westerly direction up the middle of the road to Saltash, as far as the stream running into the mill lake; along which stream it proceeds westerly as far as the Tea-house at Pennycombe-quick; it then proceeds in a straight line south westerly from the southern corner of the said Tea-house, to the north western corner of Claremont-place; and then proceeds along the western side thereof to the rear of that place, and proceeds southerly down enclosures of the back of the houses on the western side of Claremontstreet, to the western side of Cambridge-lane West, at the western side of Cambridge-street, and proceeds still southerly down the said lane, as far as the turning into Cambridge-street, up the middle of which street it then proceeds northerly as far as Morley-street, along the middle of which street it then proceeds easterly to the point at the junction of the same with York-street and Richmondstreet, where the boundary commenced, and as such district is more particularly delineated on the plan thereof hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured pink:

"That banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, and churchings, and also burials, upon a burial ground being provided for the said district, should be solemnized and performed in the said church, called Christ Church; and that all the fees to arise therefrom should be received for, on account of, and paid to, the present Vicar or Incumbent of the said parish of Saint Andrew, Plymouth, during his incumbency thereof; and that from and after his avoidance of such incumbency the said fees should belong and be paid to the Minister or Incumbent, for the time being, of the said acchurch, called Christ Church:

"That the consent of the Right Reverend Henry Lord Bishop of Exeter, as Bishop of the diocese, has been obtained thereto, as required by the Act and section hereinbefore mentioned; in testimony whereof, the said Henry Lord Bishop Exeter has signed and sealed this representation:

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously

pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment be accordingly made; and the recommendations of the said Commissioners, in respect of the publication of banns and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, and the fees arising therefrom, be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Act.
