CONTRACTS FOR RAISINS, PEAS, AND TOBACCO.

Department of the Comptroller for Victualling and Transport Services, Somerset-Place, December 16, 1847.

THE Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland do hereby give notice, that, on Thursday the 23d instant, at one o'clock, they will be ready to treat with such persons as may be willing to contract for supplying and delivering into Her Majesty's Victualling Stores at Deptford, the under-mentioned articles, viz.

Raisins (New Black Smyrna), 80 tons; half to be delivered in three weeks, and the remainder in three weeks afterwards.

Peas, 500 quarters; half to be delivered in a fortnight, and the remainder in a fortnight afterwards.

Tobacco (Virginia), 20 tons; half to be delivered in a fortnight, and the remainder in a fortnight afterwards.

The Raisins and Tobacco to be exempted from the Customs' duties.

Samples of the raisins (not less than three pounds) and of the peas (not less than two quarts) must be produced by the parties tendering, and a sample of the tobacco, together with the conditions of the contracts, may be seen at the said Office.

No tender will be received after one o'clock on the day of treaty, nor any noticed unless the party attends, or an agent for him duly authorized in writing.

Every tender must be addressed to the Secretary of the Admiralty, and bear in the left hand corner the words, "Tender for" and must also be delivered at Somerset-place, and those for raisins must be accompanied by a letter, signed by a responsible person, engaging to become bound with the person tendering, in the sum of £25 per cent. on the value, for the due performance of the contract.

A tender may be made for the whole contract, or for the quantities required for any one or more of the yards, but not for less than the full quantities of timber, thickstuff, plank, and treenails required for any one yard.
