

Malton and Driffield Junction Railway.

NOTICE is hereby given, that, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the present session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to give further time for making certain railways," the Malton and Driffield Junction Railway Company have made application, in writing, to the Commissioners of Railways, setting forth, that the Malton and Driffield Junction Railway Company are desirous that the period of time limited by "the Malton and Driffield Junction Railway Act, 1846," for the completion of the branch railway, commencing from and out of the Bridlington Branch of the Hull and Selby Railway, at or near to Great Driffield, and terminating at or near to Frodingham-bridge, in the township of Brigham, and parish of Foston-on-the-Wolds, in the east riding of the county of York, and the works thereby authorized to be made, should be extended for the further period of two years, from the expiration of the period so limited by such Act; and also that the period of time limited by the same Act for the compulsory purchase of lands for the purpose of constructing the said branch railway and works should, as to such of the lands mentioned and described in the plans of the said branch railway, and the books of reference thereto, deposited with the Clerk of the Peace for the east riding of the county of York, as are situate within the several parishes, townships, and extra parochial and other places following (that is to say), Great Driffield, Nafferton, Wansford, Brigham, and Foston-on-the-Wolds, be extended for the further period of two years, from the expiration of the period so limited by such Act.

And notice is hereby further given, that any persons who may think themselves aggrieved by such proposed extension of the time for the completion of the said branch railway and works, and for the compulsory purchase of the said lands, and who desire to object thereto, may bring such objections before the Commissioners of Railways, by sending a written statement thereof, by post, on or before the 6th day of March next, addressed to the Secretary of the Commissioners of Railways, Whitehall, London.—Dated this 28th day of January 1848.

The Society for Annuities Increasing to the Survivors.—Established 22d May 1769.

Class 1.—Century 1.
