WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the ninth section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for the further amendment of the "church building acts," or under or by virtue of any other power or authority for that purpose vested in the said Commissioners under the church building Acts, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-first day of December one thousand eight hundred and forty-seven, in the words following, viz.

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parishes of Saint Michael and Saint Chad, in the city and diocese of Lichfield, it appears to them to be expedient to unite and consolidate certain contiguous parts of the said parishes into one consolidated chapelry, for all ecclesiastical purposes, for the consecrated church, called Christchurch, situate in the said parish of Saint Michael, under and by virtue of the power or authority for such purpose contained in the ninth section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for the further amendment of the "church building Acts," or under or by virtue of any other power or authority for this purpose vested in your Majesty's said Commissioners

under the church building Acts; and that such proposed consolidated chapelry should comprize the south western part of the said parish of Saint Chad, and a portion of the western part of the said parish of Saint Michael, and should be called, "The Consolidated Chapelry of Christchurch, Lichfield," and that the same should commence opposite Fosseway-house, and take the boundary of the Wall district, in a north westwardly direction, until it joins the Burntwood district, and then proceed along the boundary of that district, in a north westwardly and in an eastwardly direction, to the corner of Leamonsley-mill, at which point it leaves the Burntwood district, and proceeds in an eastwardly direction through the parish of Saint Chad, along the middle of Leamonsley-brook to the corner of a plantation adjoining the Beacon-house lawn, and then takes the fence of the said plantation, in a northwardly direction, till it reaches Upper Shaw-lane, up the middle of which it extends about halfway, and then takes the boundary of the Beacon-house pleasure grounds, in a south eastwardly direction, till it reaches the carriage-drive to Beacon-house, up the middle of which it proceeds to Beacon-street, and then down the south side of the said street to the top of Shaw-lane, down the middle of which it goes, and crossing at the bottom, extends along a fence in a southwardly direction, till it again joins the Leamonsley-brook, along the middle of which it proceeds in a south eastwardly and eastwardly direction to Bird-street, opposite the Minster-pool, into which the same brook runs, and then extends along the south west side of Bird-street to the boundary of Saint Chad's parish, against Saint Mary's parish, and then in a south westwardly direction, keeping the said boundary of Saint Chad's parish against Saint Mary's parish, and proceeding to a public foot-road leading from the Bowling-green into the city of Lichfield, down which it proceeds in a westwardly direction, taking the Friary-grounds for its boundary, and turning abruptly, in a south eastwardly direction, still keeping the Friary-grounds for its boundary, for the length of one field, and then continuing in the same direction along a fence, between lands in Saint Michael's parish, till it reaches the Bowling-green-lane, down the middle of which it extends to the Birmingham
