partly out of the chapelry district of Saint John, Paddington, and that the same should be called, "The Chapelry District of All Saints, Paddington," with boundaries as hereinafter mentioned:

" The chapelry district of All Saints, Paddington, commences at the south west corner of the Grand Junction Canal at the point marked A on the map or plan hereinafter referred to, and proceeds along the south side of the said canal to the centre of the road at the east end thereof, and from thence in a south eastwardly direction to the centre of Praed-street, then proceeding south westwardly along the centre of Praed-street to Bouverie-street, south eastwardly along the centre of Bouverie-street to Star-street, and north eastwardly along the centre of Star-street to Upper Southwick-street, then again south eastwardly along the centre of Upper Southwickstreet to Somers-mews, and from thence south westwardly along the centre of Somers-mews to Somers-street, then south eastwardly along the centre of Somers-street and Radnor-place to Southwick-place, then proceeding south westwardly along the centre of Southwick-place and Gloucester-square to Sussex-place, and continuing north westwardly along the centre of Sussex-place and Devonport-street to Grand Junction-street, then again proceeding south westwardly along the centre of Grand Junction-street to Spring-street, and north westwardly along the cenre of Springstreet and Eastbourne-terrace to the intersection of Charles-street, then returning north eastwardly across the ground belonging to the Great Western Railway Company, in a straight line from the centre line of Charles-street, to the south end of the Paddington Canal, from thence it proceeds north westwardly along the boundary fence dividing the properties of the Grand Junction Canal Company and the Great Western Railway Company to the point marked A on the said map where the district commenced, and as the same is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured red and yellow, the portion coloured red being that taken from the said chapelry district of Saint John, Paddington:

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent, that it also appears to them to be expedient, that banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms,

and churchings should be solemnized or performed in the said church called All Saints
Church, and that the fees to arise therefrom
should be equally divided between the Incumbent
thereof for the time being and the Reverend
Archibald Montgomery Campbell, the present
Incumbent of the said parish church of Paddington, during the existing incumbency of such
parish church, and that, upon the first or next
avoidance of such parish church, the whole of the
said fees should belong to the Incumbent for the
time being of the said church called All Saints
Church:

"That the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Charles James Lord Bishop of London (as Bishop of the diocese within which the said parish of Paddington is situate), has been obtained to the assignment of the said proposed district, and also to the appropriation of the said fees, as required by the two before-mentioned Acts and sections; in testimony whereof, the said Charles James Lord Bishop of London has signed and sealed this representation:

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment be accordingly made; and the recommendations of the said Commissioners, in respect of the publication of banns, and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, and churchings, and the fees arising therefrom, be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts.
