CEREMONIAL observed at the BAPTISM of HER ROYAL HIGHNESS PRINCESS LOUISA CAROLINE ALBERTA, Fourth Daughter of HER MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY and HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS PRINCE ALBERT, on Saturday the 13th instant, in the Chapel within Buckingham-Palace.

THE Foreign Ministers, Cabinet Ministers, and others, invited to the Solemnity, assembled in the Old Dining-Room, at Buckingham-Palace, at six o'clock; and, soon after their arrival, were conducted to Seats provided for them in the Chapel.

The Archbishop of Canterbury, the Bishop of London, the Bishop of Norwich (Clerk of the Closet), the Bishop of Oxford (Lord High Almoner), with the Reverend Henry Howarth (Rector of the parish of St. George, Hanover-square), the Honourable and Reverend Charles Leslie Courtenay (Domestic Chaplain to Her Majesty), and the Reverend Lord Wriothsley Russell (Chaplain to His Royal Highness Prince Albert), assembled in the room adjoining the Old Dining-Room, and took their places at the Communion-Table shortly before the Procession moved.

Her Majesty the Queen, and the other Royal Personages, having taken their seats, the Great Officers of the Household, the Mistress of the Robes, the Groom of the Stole to His Royal Highness Prince Albert, with the Vice Chamberlain, and the Lord and Groom in Waiting to the Queen, and the Lord and Groom in Waiting to His Royal Highness Prince Albert, took their places near the Queen and His Royal Highness.

The Treasurer and the Comptroller of the Household took their places behind the Sponsors.

Others of the Household, the Officers of Arms, and the Attendants upon the Royal Family arranged themselves on either side of the Chapel.

The Service then commenced with the performance of Sacred Music.

When the music had ceased, the Lord Chamberlain, accompanied by the Groom of the Stole to His Royal Highness Prince Albert, conducted the Infant Princess into the Chapel; Her Royal Highness being carried by the Head-Nurse, and attended by the Dowager Lady Lyttelton.

The Dowager Lady Lyttelton handed the Infant Princess to the Archbishop, and received the Princess from him again when she had been baptized.

After the Baptismal Service, Her Royal Highness the Infant Princess Louisa was re-conducted from the Chapel in the same way.

The Ceremony concluded with the performance of Sacred Music.

As soon as the Ceremony was concluded, Her Majesty, His Royal Highness Prince Albert, Her Majesty the Queen Dowager, the Sponsors, and the other Royal Personages, with their respective Attendants, and the Visitors, proceeded from the Chapel, up the Grand Staircase; Her Majesty and the other Royal Personages entered the Throne-Room, the remainder of the Company continued in the Green Drawing-Room.

Her Majesty was conducted, at eight o'clock, to the Banquet, in the Picture-Gallery, accompanied by the Royal Family, the Foreign Ministers, the Cabinet Ministers, and the other Persons who attended the Ceremony, the Band playing "GOD save the QUEEN."

After the Banquet, the Lord Steward gave the following Toasts, viz.:

"Her Royal Highness the Princess Louisa."

"Her Majesty the Queen Dowager."

"The Queen and the Prince."

The Queen then rose from the Banquet, and proceeded to the White Drawing-Room, accompanied by Her Majesty the Queen Dowager, Her R. H. the Duchess of Gloucester, Her R. H. the Duchess of Kent, Her R. H. the Duchess of Cambridge, Her R. H. Princess Mary of Cambridge, Her S. H. the Grand Duchess of Saxe Weimar, Her S. H. Princess Anne of Saxe Weimar, Her S. H. Princess Amelie of Saxe Weimar, and the other Ladies present. Soon after which His R. H. Prince Albert, His R. H. the Prince of Prussia, His R. H. the Count of Syracuse, His S. H. the Grand Duke Bernard of Saxe Weimar, His R. H. the Duke George of Mecklenburgh, His S. H. Prince Frederic William of Hesse, His S. H. Prince Edward of Saxe Weimar, and the other Guests, proceeded to the Music-Room, when the doors of the White Drawing-Room were opened, and the Queen received an Evening Party, at which other persons attended in addition to those who were present at the Ceremonial and Banquet.

The Gentlemen at Arms lined the approaches to, and the entrance of, the Chapel. The Yeomen of the Guard were stationed in the Grand-Hall of the Palace, in the passages leading from the Old Dining-Room to the approach to the Chapel, and upon the Grand Staircase.

The Knights of the several Orders present at the Solemnity wore their respective Collars. The Foreign Ministers, Cabinet Ministers, and other Visitors, appeared in full-dress Uniform.
